Demand Popular Referendum On Issue of War or Peace

By FARRELL DOBBS and GRACE CARLSON SWP Presidential and Vice-Presidential Candidates

The United Nations is meeting in Paris in an ominous atmosphere. The American imperialists have had the audacity to aunch another war scare a bare month before the voters go to the polls. The Berlin dispute has been thrown into the Security Council; and the entire capitalist press, at this signal, has cast aside all restraint in pounding the drums of war.

The insolence of the Wall Street rulers stems from their assurance that they will continue to monopolize the government for another four years whether Truman or Dewey sits in the White House. That is why American imperialism does not give a damn what the people think between now and election day.

Who made the decision to stage another war scare? A tiny clique of Brass Hats and Wall Street representatives who run the State Department and dominate the White House.

A Small, Sinister Clique

In other words, the question of war or peace, the fate of 140 million people of the United States, not to mention the fate of the peoples of the whole world, are being determined-not by democratic discussion and vote-but by a small, sinister clique of bankers, industrialists and Brass Hats operating behind closed doors.

What was the reaction of Truman and Dewey to the war moves of this irresponsible, power-drunk clique? Did Truman summarily remove them from the posts to which he appointed them? Did Dewey denounce their actions and promise to kick them out if elected? Not at all.

Truman hastened to give them an approving pat on the back. 'We must keep our bullets in order and our powder dry," he told the press at San Antonio, Texas.

Dewey added his rubber-stamp "me too" to the latest war moves of the White House back-porch guard and called on the people of "every land who share our aims to unite our prayers for peace." This is really ominous! When a Wall Street politician calls on the people to "pray" for peace-watch out! The danger of war must indeed be great.

Hasn't it become perfectly clear that all the promises made by the rulers during World War II were nothing but lies and deceptions? They promised us democracy. And there is less of it in the world today than there was in 1939. Right here in the United States the drive to break down the rights of the American people is proceeding at blitzkrieg speed.

They promised us security, "freedom from fear.", But more hunger, insecurity and fear exist in the world today than before

Greatest fraud of all was the promise of "enduring peace." The Underlying Cause

What is really at bottom in the dispute over Berlin? The squabble over the currency, over the City Administration, over the "blockade" and over the "air-lift," are only the immediate issues. The underlying cause of the dispute is this: American imperialism faces a catastrophic depression. It is confronted, furthermore, with the disintegration of capitalism on a world scale, the break Berman, SWP candidate for up of the centuries-old colonial system and the rising danger of workers' revolution.

In an attempt to meet these threats, Big Business is pouring tens of billions of dollars into the war machine to help keep up the Although the party organization fabulous rate of profit to which it has become accustomed. Expansion of the war industries will prolong the unnatural boom and defer depression. And finally American imperialism hopes to smash the Soviet Union and conquer the whole world, thereby prolonging its outlived and decaying social system.

In accordance with this blueprint, the Marshall Plan was set up to convert western Europe into a spring-board for the projected war on the USSR. Part of the plan calls for the rehabilitation of German capitalism. Consequently Anglo-American imperialism

moved ahead to set up a Western German puppet regime. But to prop up German capitalism, you have to give aid and comfort to the former Nazis and their backers, since all the important German capitalists supported Hitler. That is why, in a calculated political gesture to all the Nazis, the American military authorities commuted the sentence of Ilse Koch, the Buchen-

wald monster who made lamps out of tattoed human skins. Where do Wallace and the Stalinists stand on this life-anddeath question of foreign policy and war? The whole foreign policy of Wallace and the Stallnists boils down to a call for a deal with Stalin. They want to carve up the world between the imperialists and the Kremlin. This is simply a tactical variation of the Wall Street program, a postponement of the showdown struggle. It has nothing in common with a genuine peace program.

When war does break out, Wallace has already promised to jump on the band wagon. That will be the end of Wallace's "fight"

Program and Record of SWP

You can't end the danger of war with that kind of program or human material. To lead the struggle against imperialist war, men and women of stamina are required, leaders capable of sticking to principle. Against Wallace's shameful record as -a salesman of World War II and his promise to support a new war once it begins, contrast the firm, principled stand of the Socialist Workers Party.

We denounced the war as a crime against humanity and the promises of the war-mongers as fraudulent. We continued the fight even after the U.S. entered the war. White House, Washington, D. C.

Dear Mr. President:

On Sept. 25 your Attorney General, Mr. Tom Clark, made public an expanded list of so-called "subversive" organizations. For the second time, the Socialist Workers Party has been included on this political blacklist.

Your listing of the Socialist Workers Party as a "subversive" organization, in the midst of the election campaign in which I am designed to intimidate and prejudice voters against my candidacy.

directly notified of this action. We learned of it through the public press. We were never given a hearing on the very serious attach to the word "communist." charges implied by inclusion on the "subversive" list; nor have we even been informed upon what specific acts the listing was

wrote you on Aug. 26 to request an open hearing on the charges Attorney General disagrees. You yourself have repeatedly promade by your Department of Justice. I informed you that members and supporters of our organization were being victimized on their jobs as a consequence of the subversive list.

I also informed you that in response to my written request for a hearing, I received a reply on Aug. 16, signed by Assistant Attorney General Alex Campbell, which said: "In the absence of provision therefor in the Executive Order,

the Department [of Justice] does not contemplate holding hear-

ings in such matters, with or without specifications or charges." This reply also made clear that the "subversive" list was drafted on your express order as President and that this order, in violation of all democratic precedent and the Bill of Rights, as you, I am publicly campaigning to win the popular majority denies a fair and open trial to members of organizations publicly vote. We do not now seek, and never have sought, to secure the condemned of what, by implication, are criminal actions.

The list printed in the Sept. 26 N. Y. Times names the Socialist Workers Party three times under three different headings. We are listed under "Communist," "Subversives" and "Organizations which 'seek to alter the form of Government of the United States by unconstitutional means."

I state categorically that this listing is false in every particular and criminally slanders my party and its members.

I do not propose to enter upon a discussion of Marxist doctrine and theory with the Department of Justice. It suffices to point out the ignorance or malicious intent displayed when such diametrically opposed organizations as the Socailist Workers Party and the Communist Party are lumped together under the general listing running as a Presidential candidate of this party, is a gross abuse of "Communist." 

The Convention chose a new name for the organization. "The Revolutionary Communist Party of China."

War in Philippines **Continues Against** The Hukbalahaps

The capitalist press has given little publicity to a war in the back yard of the United States that has taken at least 1,000 lives in the past 40 days. This is the war conducted by Wall Street's puppet government of the Philippine Islands against the 100,000 Hukbalahaps who resisted the Japanese imperialist forces during World War II and who are now resisting the domination of American imperialism.

Recently, the leader of this movement, Luis Taruc, accepted an amnesty proposal from the government for the movement. The rank and file Hukbalahaps, however, did not approve of this surrender, since the terms of the their arms.

Trust Busting or Vote-Catching?

After almost 16 years of continuous promises to "bust the trusts" and "drive the money-changers from the Temple," the Democratic Administration has issued a virtual confession that the trusts and the money-changers are flourishing as never be-

That is the sole real significance of the sudden interest-six weeks before the national eelctions—shown by Truman's Department of Justice in anti-trust law violations by a few of the big monopolies.

On the heels of the anti-trust suit against the "Big Four" meat packers comes the announcement of an investigation of the DuPont industrial empire and the serving of subpoenas for various books and records.

The Department of Justice's announcements are so crudely obvious a pre-election bid for votes, that it is scarcely necessary to belabor the point. After suspending all antitrust prosecutions during the war, after swelling the biggest monopolies like DuPont and the Aluminum Corporation with billions in war contracts and government-built war plants, after feeding more billions in tax rebates to the trusts—the Democratic Administration now solemnly assures us that it's really going after these same trusts-if you just vote for Truman.

We've had anti-trust laws and anti-trust investigations and suits for more than 50

years. Yet under Republican and Democratic administrations alike, the giant corporations and combines have grown steadily. By the end of the Second World War, the 250 largest corporations owned two-thirds of all the industrial means of production.

The trusts and monopolies are an inevitable outgrowth of capitalism, the profit system. Under this system, the strong devour the weak; the rich devour the poor; the large devour the small. The Gorgon's head of private monopoly cannot be destroyed without destroying the whole of capitalism.

The platform of the Socialist Workers Party is dedicated to the task of mobilizing the working masses of America to wipe out monopolies root and branch. Plank No. 9 entitled, "Government Ownership of Industry" calls on the workers and working farmers to:

"Nationalize the basic industries, all war plants, all natural resources, and operate them in the interests of the producers and consumers by democratically-elected committees of workers and technicians! Nationalize the banks! Institue a planned economy of abundance, based on production for use, not for profit!"

Any party or candidate that promises to "bust the trusts" by doing less than this, is perpetrating conscious fraud against the

Potofsky's Announcement

The top CIO and AFL bureaucrats are making a big pretense of enthusiasm over the re-election of Truman. They are haranguing their members to register and above all give a dollar bill to the CIO-PAC or the AFL-LLPE. But the dollar bills are coming in very slowly and union officers are finding it all but impossible to steam up the rank and file for strikebreaker Truman.

The more socially alert of the labor bureaurats now realize that their present election policy is nothing more than a stopgap. The disintegration of the Democratic party and the growing resentment against the old line politicians have rendered the labor bureaucrats' policy of hog-tying the labor movement to the capitalist parties increasingly untenable.

It was in response to this development that Walter Reuther, President of the CIO auto union, recently issued a pronouncement, discussed in the Aug. 30 Militant, in which he declared that labor will have to work for a new political realignment after the 1948 elections. Reuther's statement was deliberately ambiguous and vague on the exact nature of this realignment.

Now comes Jacob S. Potofsky, President of the CIO Amalgamated Clothing Workers and spells out even more clearly the intentions of the socially more alert sections of the union bureaucracy. Potofsky proposes that immediately after the elections a conference of all labor leaders from the AFL, CIO and Railroad brotherhoods be held to make plans for "revitalizing" the Democratic Party or establishing a full-fledged labor party.

These pronouncements are not just publicity gags. Reuther, Potofsky and the other more experienced bureaucrats, realizing that their present policy, if continued, is liable to boomerang against them, want after the elections to embark on a more aggressive policy to convert the Democratic party into a liberal, New Deal outfit along the lines of the "Americans for Democratic Action." Failing that, they will canvass the possibilities of setting up a new political party. That is the thinking of the Reuthers, Potofskys and Dubinskys on political action.

The Militant has often explained that we favor a labor party based on the unions and would give such a party critical support but we oppose the organization of a Peoples Front type of party where actual power is vested in the hands of an uncontrolled clique of liberal capitalist politicians and top union bureaucrats responsible to no one but them-

Militants in the unions will be watchful of the moves of the top union officials and will utilize the increasing interest in political action to push for the setting up of a genuine Labor Party — with deep roots in the labor ranks and responsible to and controlled by

The Attack On Thompson

The red-baiting drive against civil liberties and the rights of political minorities is moving into its next inevitable stage: Physical terrorism.

On Tuesday night, Sept. 21, Robert Thompson, state chairman of the New York Communist Party and one of the 12 CP leaders indicted under the infamous Smith "Gag" Act, was attacked by three unidentified men, brutally beaten and stabbed. No effort was made to rob him. It was clearly an attempt at assassination.

Regardless of who directly ordered the murder-attempt on Thompson-the political responsibility for this crime rests squarely on the Democrats and Republicans in Washington who have created the atmosphere for such political terrorism and have incited such violence against political minorities.

The capitalist press in New York cynically tried to cover up this crime. The Big Business dailies even printed false reports — later denied by the police—that the police doubted that Thompson was attacked at all and that this was some kind of publicity gag to get public sympathy.

When an obscure Republican ward-worker was murdered several years ago in Congressman Marcantonio's district, the police put on one of the greatest man-hunts in New York

history. The press — without an iota of evidence—literally screamed for the blood of the Communist Party members. No such police activity, no such press outcry is being made in this clear-cut case of attempted assassination of Thompson.

This is not the only act of terrorism against labor and political minorities that has been carried out under the cloak of the anti-labor and anti-red drive. Only last week armed hoodlums entered the New York headquarters of the Ladies Garment Workers union and badly injured several organizers. Later, they turned brass knuckles on a number of ILGWU pickets. Last spring, CIO auto union president Walter Reuther was almost killed by shot-gun wielding assassins. Henry Wallace was pelted with eggs and threatened repeatedly on his Southern tour.

These are not episodic acts. They are part of a growing pattern of fascist-like terrorism. Today, it is directed mainly against an unpopular minority like the Stalinists. But tomorrow, it will threaten all labor.

Let the labor movement take heed. Let it mobilize a protest against the murderous attack on Thompson and the witch-hunt that inspired this attack. And let the unions organize their defense guards now to let the fascist elements know that they will continue terrorist acts only at their peril.

adoption of our program other than by the expressed will and consent of the majority.

These are the facts, Mr. President, and we contend that your Department of Justice, acting on your orders, is subverting the truth and denying us even the most elementary of civil rights: The right to confront our accusers; the right to a fair and open hearing; the right to be presented with specific charges and to answer them with evidence and witnesses.

How do you square this with your present campaign pledges regarding civil rights? How can you reconcile Mr. Tom Clark's illegal and unconstitutional "subversive" political blacklist-a practice borrowed directly from the arsenal of the totalitarianswith your recent praise of Mr. Clark as a man "who is working all the time for the Constitution and the Bill of Rights."

I am again protesting the inclusion of the Socialist Workers Party on your "subversive" list and requesting that you use your powers to accord us an open hearing on the false charges made against us. I am again denouncing the whole practice of "subversive" political blacklists as alien to the democratic traditions of this country.

I call on you, Mr. President, to immediately rectify the wrong you have perpetrated in this case. To that extent, at least, you will be paying the cause of civil rights more than lip service. I await your early reply.

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

We drew lots to determine the order in which the speakers would be introduced. I got the middle spot. Each speaker had 10 minutes, with

an official time-keeper holding a watch on him. The Progressive Party spokesman opened with a dull presentation of Wallace's "do-good" panaceas calculated to make capitalism "progressive."

The Socialist Workers Party is a Marxist party, a revolutionary anti-capitalist party," I began. "We fight for the creation of a socialist society. We are an anti-war party. Eighteen leaders of our party were jailed for opposing the second world war just as Eugene V. Debs was jailed for opposing the first world slaughter."

After years of experience, a speaker develops an intuition about audience reaction. Before I had completed the fourth sentence I knew the convention was listening to me.

I continued with an account of our predictions about World War II and how quickly they have been confirmed. There is no peace. Civil rights are under attack. Living standards are sapped by inflation. Jim Crow blights the lives of the Negro people. And we are being plunged toward World War III.

Then I tore into the lying capitalist politicians of all stripes, who have repeatedly deceived the Negro people. I demonstrated why capitalism itself is responsible for inflation, depression, war, race hate and lynch murder.

Frequent nods of approval greeted my explanation of the need for the working people and the oppressed minorities to break with the capi-Farmers government.

"Unite with the Socialist Workers Party," concluded, "in the fight to abolish brutal capitalism and build a socialist society where men and women of all races and colors, in all lands, can walk together in peace and freedom and know the full iov of an abundant life."



DETERMINED METHODS

Using more determined methods to strengthen the strike and force the employers to negotiate, the membership of ILWU local 1-10, at their last regular meeting on Wednesday night, Sept. 22, voted to cancel their contract with Mutual Stevedoring company unless the Army discontinues use of strikebreakers.

There are about 200 scabs nired by the Army before it signed with Mutual to handle work on its docks. These scabs went to work as civil service employes behind ILWU picket lines at the Oakland Army base and were continuing to work on the docks even after Mutual took over the job with union longshoremen.

This demand by the membership of the powerful San Francisco local stands in sharp contrast to the policy pursued by the Stalinist leadership of the strike.
