## AS WE SEE IT By T. J. O'FLAHERTY.

CHARLES EVANS HUGHES will not direct the course of the United States' foreign policy after next March 4, the date on which the Massachusetts little bug, Butler, takes over the White House for Wall Street, than the compliant title of the "New Deal" which Hughes' letter of resignation leaves nothing to be desired in the way of diplomatic references. The resignation is a confession that the politician is not getting his share of the spoils in this case. That there is more to this case than the usual resignation.

HUGHES is a capitalist statement in the Wilson speech. He could not have been more explicit in his point of the interests of capitalism as a whole. His extremely hostile attitude toward Soviet Russia, his willingness to surrender points to England in order to see that country's dignity in the interests of a united front for the exploitation of the world by the big robber powers; his desire for peace with Japan, not for any unfortunate suggestion to a previous Japanese ambassador on the immaturity of the present peace treaty, but to get a more substitute for the league of nations that could be put over in the United States; all these references indicate that Hughes had the aim of bringing about an international alliance among the big capitalist powers for the common exploitation of the world. In this regard, the program of the workers' and farmers' party and presents of Russia figured prominently.

PERHAPS the question of Soviet recognition is at the bottom of the Hughes' act. # FACISM'S SEEN IN GERMAN CABINET MOVE

## Moderates Giving Way to Monarchists

(Special to The Daily Worker)  
BERLIN, Jan. 11.—The efforts of Finance Minister Hans Luther to form a right wing cabinet in Germany have not met with the approval of the Reichstag. Chancellor Marx, who gave up attempts to form a moderate coalition cabinet after five unsuccessful trials.

The monarchists have claimed four-fifths of the Reichstag. Luther is trying to form, and are certain to be given three. The failure of the moderate parties demonstrates the fact that the German government favor the right wing, and points to the probable rise of a fascist government in the near future, in order to prevent possibility of a coalition in which the monarchists take part.

Chancellor Marx, leader of the Catholic party, and Foreign Minister Brüning, head of the people's party, are now tight enemies, having tried to work together after months of "friendly" relations. Luther, the Catholic party of deserting their republican views and of stabilizing the position of the fascist government with the monarchists. The moderate party refuses to participate in the cabinet.

## REACTION IN TRADES AND LABOR ASSEMBLY OF MINNEAPOLIS SHUTS OUT TWO LOCAL UNION DELEGATES

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Jan. 11.—At the last session of the Trades and Labor Assembly here, two of the most progressive leaders of the working class movement were excluded from the central body on the grounds that they held membership in the Workers (Communist) Party of America.

William Mauneth, Machine's Local 91, and Dan Stevens, Painter's Union 188, were the two who faced the onslaught of the reactionary bourgeoisie. Under the rules the accused must appear before a committee appointed to hear the charges. The chairman of the local assembly, himself a staunch reactionary, took extreme care in naming the committee to be that only conservatives served on same. Filion of the Pressmen, famous for his "red baiting" activities, Nelson of the Carpenters, and Manley of the Retail Clerks, compose the committee.

The advocates of the open shop in Minneapolis have reason for their joy and excited chuckles. Four years ago, a cabinet was organized in increased behind prison walls because of his indignity loyalty to the cause of the laborer. W. P. Bennett, business agent of Painters Local 186, demanded that he be given the floor in defense of his fellow workers. The local assembly refused to grant him the floor.

Bennet said in part, "If you object to one of our delegates you must object to them all. This is a breach of faith to do as you wish when we are our representatives to this assembly. I believe our interests are at stake as we sit in this. It is Stevens' sacred right to believe you are not to be denied."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Capitalist imperialists made three shrewd moves yesterday in the cabinet of the strike-broker, Cal Coolidge.

Charles Evans Hughes stepped out of the secretaryship of the state department; Frank B. Kellogg, ambassador to Britain, now acting United States plenipotentiary in the allied financial conference at Paris was named as Hughes' successor, and Charles Becher Warren was appointed as the new attorney-general.

# The Bloody History of the Estonian White Terror

(Special to The Daily Worker)

REV. GEORGE DUNN, editor of the "Estonian Worker," writes: "The Estonian shopkeepers and professors, who were the mainstay of the bourgeois government, are the persecutors of the revolutionary workers of Estonia. This is the record of those years."

As soon as they got into power, the capitalist rulers of Estonia celebrated the birth of the "new nation" under fatherland" by a series of outrageous murders. In the autumn of 1919, the police and secret service men raided the first congress of the Estonian trade unions, arresting 102 delegates of the workers, representatives of the different trade unions, 71 of whom were driven to the Russo-Estonian border and shot in the very front of the battle line and compelled to run forward, towards the Red Army.

At the same time, firing was started by artillery in the direction of the Russian border in order to provoke the Russian army to attack Estonia. It was only a happy chance that the Estonian comrades managed to escape to the Soviet Union in safety. The remaining 26 were arrested labor leaders were brought to court and sentenced to death or long terms of imprisonment by the Estonian main court.

In view of the growing revolutionary consciousness among the working class, the Estonian government suppressed a number of trade union organizations, and at Revel, Doon, and other parts of the country, labor leaders were thrown into jail.

Other revolutionary workers were arrested by the secret police, and in the summer of the same year 112 workers of the labor movement, trade union, cooperative, sport and other labor organizations were put on trial. The majority of these workers were sentenced by the military district court to eight, ten and twenty years' penal servitude.

Japan agrees to evacuate her troops from Russian soil as soon as physical conditions permit. Questions of debts and claims are to be left to future conferences.

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
