Reply of Workers Party The Better Government Association, 711-15 Chicago Temple, Dear Sirs:

In reply to your questions submitted by your organization we assert first that the title of your only misleading unless you stand for the overthrow of the capitalist system...

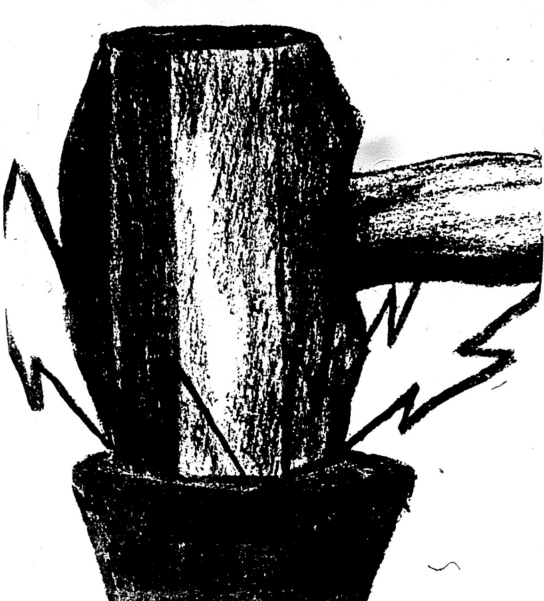

Conciliators and Garment Strikers

Two developments in the strike of garment workers in New York City.

First, federal conciliators are on the job trying to arrange a "settlement" the usual accompaniment of strikes of any size.

Second, pickets are snugged and arrested. Here are the two chief methods of the boss-owned government.

Violence against the strikers in an effort to cow those who cannot be fooled by the smooth-tongued agents of the employers.

No honest and intelligent worker can fail to see the way in which these two methods dovetail together and work in the interest of the enemies of the working class.

The left wing, led by the Communists, can do effective work in such cases. In addition to being the most active fighters on the picket line, the most ardent organizers of the offensive against the bosses, they also show to the workers the intimate connection between government and boss.

Any efforts of the part of government or any other brand of conciliators to get the workers back to their machines pending a settlement must be fought mercilessly.

We Tremble

The Federation News, organ of Chicago labor "leadership," at last has its warrant.

It features in its issue of Feb. 23rd, first, the Chicago Tribune's story of \$250,000 sent from Russia for Communist propaganda in the United States.

We tremble, we are worried. We are afraid that the daily leaders of the Federation News, the few hundred paid and unpaid editors who run the Federation for the money there is in it, will believe this story.

If they do, there is going to be a lot of those second-story articles who suddenly will develop a great sympathy for the Communist program and love for the Communists.

Three of a Kind We publish today, coincident with the C. P. P. convention, two new stories of the greatest importance to the labor and revolutionary movement.

These are exclusive stories dug out of the jungle of the labor movement by the DAILY WORKER staff and they are damning evidence of the double crossing and betrayal that are inevitable accompaniments of the schemes for "class peace" and "reintegrating" labor put forward by high officials of the labor movement.

Bill Johnston of the Machinists' Union and William Green, head of the American Federation of Labor.

These officials are supposed by superficial observers to represent three different tendencies in the labor movement.

Actually all three stand for the same thing—the handing over of the union, bond hand and foot, to the capitalists and the capitalist state.

In West Virginia, Warren Stone, an officer of a stock company composed of members of his union, runs a scab coal mine.

In Delaware, against the policy of the other rail-road expressed in the official organ, Labor, he supports a "union" but not the war mongering munition maker and labor hater and officer of the Morris Plan Bank—the biggest loan shark concern in America.

"B" and "C" Bill Johnston, president of the International Association of Machinists, is the sponsor of the Baltimore and Ohio company union scheme that has turned the railway shop crafts on that system over to the tender mercies of the railway company.

More than that, we publish today the first hand information of the extension of this scheme to all other unions on the B. and O., including the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. Johnston has done a good job—for the bosses. He and Stone can chuckle together in their luxurious offices over the way they have put it over on the men who pay their wage salaries.

William Green, at the last meeting of the executive committee of the American Federation of Labor, held in Miami, Florida, announced that he stood for "conciliation and understanding" and against "any kind of strikes." He wants labor to "understand" capitalist in their own way that Warren Stone and Johnston do—by trying to play the boss' game of becoming capitalists.

Read the stories dealing with the studied attack on the labor movement coming from all other cliques of capitalists that we carry today on the front page.

Read the program of the C. P. P. A., which Stone and Johnston formed to further additional labor "settlement" in the name of the working class, the measure of the treachery of these labor "leaders" is understood.

Then read the program of the Workers' Communist Party of America.

The Child Labor Law—Its Lessons

The Michigan state legislature has defeated the child labor amendment by passing the Child Labor Restriction Act.

Michigan, with its best sugar industry, is a noisome hotbed of child slavery. Charles Warren, the Cadillac choice for attorney general, is also an attorney for and a director of a number of large sugar companies in Michigan, just as Communists.

With the exception of some women's organizations who were attracted to the child labor amendment because of its humanitarian character, the only ones who opposed the bill were the labor unions and the Michigan Exploiters of Labor and their partners were against the measure. Labor organizations for it.

War—the Constant Danger

Those who remember the months preceding the outbreak of the world war in August, 1914, will recall that the air of the capitals of the great powers was filled with news of scandals in their army and navy departments, with charges and counter charges of inefficiency, graft, "unpreparedness," etc.

Hand in hand with these hickering aims as today there are rumors of more international conferences on auxiliary armaments.

One more straw. In Chicago day before yesterday the department heads of the Illinois Central railroad gathered in a conference with the national army reserve and discussed the problem of supplying armed forces with the necessary supplies. All over the nation similar gatherings are being held.

Militarism, the right hand of imperialism, is always at work. We live always on the verge of war. Militarism is prepared, the workers are not. Let the nearby danger of another bloody struggle be on the order of business of every working class meeting.

HERRIOT CALLS ON MORGAN FOR UNITED FRONT

PARIS, France, Feb. 29.—Premier Herriot, the "socialist" is calling frankly for a P. Morgan to help bring the tottering Herriot regime with a loan of \$200,000,000.

When it is announced, the finance minister was shown an official denial by the United States treasury department, that the American government was contemplating a loan to France.

Francis Clement said, "It is the United States I mean American bankers, not the American government."

Clement said that the United States would aid France to halter the falling French franc with a large loan.

Clement, however, meant Morgan, whom he recognized as the real power in America.

Interest to Morgan.

Louis Edcheux, one of France's capitalists, speaking in the chamber of deputies, declared that France is paying regularly one and one-half billion francs for the settlement of her commercial debt to America.

The great trouble of the government is that it never has any cash on hand," said Louchet. "I recommend the immediate efforts to float a loan of \$200,000,000. The money from the recent Morgan loan should be kept in tact to protect the franc."

On the new French exchange Herriot government bought French franc heavily, as a result the franc gained four points during the day.
