#### Shoe Workers' Wages

Shoe Workers' Wages

The shoe capitalists in Massachusetts are getting ready to cut ages. Their excuse is the moss-grown one of "high labor costs." This only an excuse and not a reason, for workers should never figure at their wages are too, high simply because the boss is not making much profit as he would like to.

In 1916 it took 1 hour and 42 minutes of a shoe worker's time produce one pair of shoes.

Today, 1925, it takes but 54 minutes.
