Work vs. Wealth

The keystone or main feature of the new structure is the creation of a power of personal worth by the destruction of the power of private wealth. In order to effect this, the reacquisition of yower by individant acquisition of wealth and the amassing of money by private persons is rendered, not only unnecessary, but unlikely, although not in principle impossible.

(a) The Worker

This is accomplished in the following manner, In the first place, all real property, industry and capital wealth are vested in the State by nationalization, the State being composed of men who have obtained their position by other means than the influence of wealth.

Secondly, sowher is granted a minimum wage according to the category in which his duties or profession place him first minimum wage is really only intended to cover the actual risk minimum wage is really only intended to cover the actual quirements in life, social recreation, travelling, rearly holdes, medical and insurance benefit, education and upbringing of his family, housing, etc., accrue to him in the form of benefits supplied by the State.

These benefits increase in value as the worker rises, by his own efforts, from a lower to a higher category. A member of the Government, even a Cabinet Minister, for instance, receives only (20 per month.
