SYNOPSIS.—The official report of the British trade union delegation Soviet Russia described the workings of foreign trade, transportation, industry, finance and agriculture in the Soviet Union. Workers have their own hospitals on the job, first aid equipment, schools for their children, gymnasiums and recreation grounds. Medical attention is provided for the workers and special efforts are made to protect the health of their children. Monthly reports are given regarding the progress of each child coming under the care of those in charge of the children's hospital and Baby Care Center.
