Wall Street in China

U. S. CORN CORP THREE QUARTERS NORMAL YIELD THREE BILLION BUSHELS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—The condition of the corn crop in the United States is reported to be 78.8 per cent of normal, indicating a total production of 2,880,000,000 bushels of corn as compared with 2,437,000,000 bushels of normal, according to a report of the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced this afternoon.

Grain planted to corn in 1935 totaled 106,251,000 acres, or 2.10 per cent in excess of 1934. The yield per acre of 27.1 bushels is estimated to be 2.10 per cent above the 25.6 bushels of normal; production 284,000,000 bushels, or 13.2 per cent above the 250,000,000 bushels of normal. Average yield per acre for 1935 is 27.1 bushels, as compared with 25.6 bushels of normal.

Only the summary analysis, however, will appear; the two volumes showing how the anticrop movement was formed and why it is composed, how it would and what the benefit of its fractions will be compared with the normal.

In the committee's own words, printed at the head of the summary: "The report is a preliminary statement prepared by Lauck as preliminary studies for its research, published in advance of the completion of its own report. The committee did not adopt these documents as part of its own findings, but transmitted them to the committee for their information and guidance."

In his summary, Lauck says that the report is not a final report, but a preliminary report. The committee is still in the process of gathering information and conducting research. The report is intended to provide a basis for further study and discussion.
