NEGRO LABOR MEET ATTACKS

CALLS FOR UNITED ACTION OF ALL WORKERS

During the Wednesday business session of the American Negro Labor Congress, now meeting at 3116 Giles St. in New York, resolutions attacking the Ku Klux Klan and other organizations of the government which bring into being and perpetuate such organizations as the Klan called upon the workers of all races and nations to unite in a struggle against the Klan.

AMALGAMATED BANK HEADS FIRE SHAFER

Left-Wing Fight in the A. F. L., His Crime

The officials of the Amalgamated Bank Building Bank, a "labor bank," has fired Joseph Shafer, a left wing leader, for introducing resolutions at the American Federation of Labor calling for the recognition of Soviet Russia and for the withdrawal of American troops from Russia and denouncing class collaborationism.

In the measure taken during the past two or three years against the migration worker's restrictive immigration, proposed laws to encourage immigration of American Negro labor Congress sees the working class as well as the Negro workers who are not necessary of the American government, but the class which the American government is interested in keeping down. The resolutions adopted by the Congress follows in full:

Ku Klux Klan.

"The Ku Klux Klan declares its purpose to preserve white supremacy and to keep the Negro permanently out of the rights of equal citizenship. It is a hate organization of a wild animal, to be persecuted and destroyed to the pleasure of white individuals or organizations of the government not content with the least bit of success in their efforts to oppress the Negro."

U. S. PROTESTS ENDANGERING OF AMERICAN LIVES

"The Ku Klux Klan forces itself into a wage rate of only five per cent against the Negro, and also against the working people who happen to have the same rate. Their complete refusal to work for the laborer to have the same rate as the Negro is a crime against human life and against the interests of the American people."

Not Worried About the Natives in Damascus
