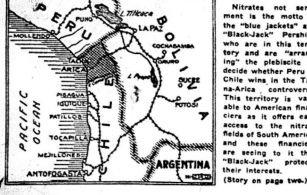

The success of American football is measured in terms of accounts of the games played and the pictures of new gridiron heroes, or stars that still manage to shine. The football hero starts his place with the champion prize fighter.

In the center of the limelight of the football idol worshippers stands Harold E. ("Red") Grange, his qualifications are that he is fleet of foot, and that he is quick and sure in kicking an inflated piece of pigskin, thus helping to pile up the scores and win games for the University of Illinois that he attends.

But there is another interesting phase of this cross section of American life. Some of the Grange idolators are circulating petitions to get names to have his name placed on the State's ballot for congress in the fall of next year's election.

The case of "Red" Grange going into politics is not new in itself. It is only one instance of the perversion of sports under capitalism and the hoodwinking of the workers and farmers, who constitute the overwhelming mass of the nation's athletes.

Sports and athletics are not deprecated in Soviet Russia. It is the few athletes in the United States who are drawn into health-giving exercises. Workers and peasants in the Soviet Union are not foolish enough to become professional athletes, because they can run or jump, to some political office.

Let the workers and farmers of Illinois remember this as the political bosses try to lure them into support of the football "hero" of the day. The pigskin pet of the parasites may be able to give a higher education to the children of labor who are sent into industry, must not become an election day idol of any considerable number of those who do not only build their own class strength politically, but must also pick their own standards from their own ranks.

Now that the 12-week strike of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America against the International Tailoring Co. has been won, the officials of the latter company are trying to take credit for the victory about which they are back and forth. Seventy-Five Per Cent Cancellation

When Secretary of the Treasury Mellon announced on Thursday that the Mellon family trust had been granted any debtors' pardon, his language was too reserved. The terms of the settlement amount to a 75% cancellation, counting interest, of the entire amount due his country.

Just as we predicted, the House of Morgan secures domination of Italy and stands back of the Mussolini tyrant. On the field of international politics it means that Italy, like France, is to be an ally of this country in its world-wide struggle against Great Britain.

Practical reasons for imperialism are already revealed. While the terms are so easy that Italy only needs to pay \$5,000,000 per year for the next five years, the program, according to Wall Street advice in the capitalist press, is to grant a floating of \$200,000,000 loan to the Italian government, and at least \$50,000,000 worth of industrial bonds to shortly follow.

When bank capital penetrates a nation the object is not to realize a principle but to establish a public hand. Italy is no exception. Already Wall Street dominates the Italian government and with the debt settlement now realized the complete domination of the Italian finance capital over all Italian industry will soon also be realized.

The political reflex of the settlement in Italy was instantaneous. Not only was the Greek revolution crushed, but the Greek revolutionaries themselves have been enacted that extend the power of Mussolini to the point of abolishment.

The settlement embraces a period of 62 years. To the revolution in Italy is ironic, for the working class of both the United States and Italy—and the rest of the world—will write fine to the rule of the Mussolinis and Morgans long before that time has expired.

Berry Heard From

George L. Berry, dress parade major, and head of his personally conducted-International Printing Press, and Assistants' Union, is perfectly at home among the yokels of the fundamentalist belt. The "difference being that the government would not feel itself bound to delude a happy congregation, trying to deprive them of a means of livelihood by filling their pockets with union seals and so on."

It is laughable to hear this capitalist lackey talk of antidotes to autocracy. He fears Communism because he knows the growing independence of the Communist movement. He knows that the Communist is a part of his regime, when he will have to depend for pay on the Communist class that he serves, instead of bludgeoning days out of his pocket who are so unfortunate as to find themselves under his despotic rule.
