### "AMERICAN LEGION CONVENTION"WHIL NOT BE TOLERATED." DECLARE FRENCH NEWSPAPERS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (FP) .- Bitter French opposition to the proposed Franco-American festivities and the American Legion parade through Paris Sept. 19 is revealed in editorials in leading newspapers.

Quotidien: "Let there be no more talk of it. The cruel end of Sacco and Vanzetti rules it out. Such a festival would look, like a mockery of universal mourning." It could not be tolerated."

Paris Soir: "Last night's events (mass protests) ought to open the eyes of the guardians of public order. They prove that you cannot defy public opinion without risk. They prove too, that if the authorities obstinately insist on holding this parade of the American Legion they will be incurring grave responsibilities. The people of Paris, we assert, will not only refuse to make a Franco-American festival of September 19, but will not tolerate this procession of the American Legion. This festival ought not to take place; it cannot take place."

#### (Special To The DAILY WORKER.)

PARIS, Aug. 26 .- With the meeting of the cabinet council of the die-hard Poincare government to consider plans for the reception of the American Legion here September 19th, French workers have agreed upon a systematic boycott of American goods and films.

Leading the drive to prevent the opening of the Legion concention and parade on the Champs Elysees, L'Humanite, Communist daily, today published a large photograph of a souvenir ash tray representing in bas relief a drunken American soldier dancing with a nude French girl. The ash trays are being widely circulated.

The arrest of Deputy Vaillant Couturier, one of the editors of L'Humanite, is being demanded by die-hard dailies here because Couturier is urging a war on the Legion convention, and the setting aside of September 19 as a "Day of Mourning" in memory of Sacco and Vanzetti,

The anti-Legion drive is growing rapidly despite the opposi ion of die-hard dailies and of the Poincare government.

French workers are taking a great deal of interest in the opposition on the part of Berlin labor to the visit of Mayor 'Jimmie" Walker of New York City. Walker's visit, reports from Berlin indicate, is stirring the same opposition among workers there that the Legion convention is arousing here.

### Wilbur's "100 Per Cent Increase" in Naval Armament.

Secretary of the navy Wilbur has denied that he gave out an interview stating that he would recommend to the coming session of Congress "a 100 per cent increase" in the navy building program. Yet this statement was carried by all of the influential Pacific coast papers and sent out by the press services.

It is probable that Wilbur simply spoke out of his turn and voiced the intentions of the militarists before a sufficient amount of preparatory publicity work had been done.

The Wilbur statement undoubtedly embarrassed the Coolre administration which is still clinging formally to its economy program and this is probably the reason for the hasty denial but we can be sure that the sharpening of the rivalry between Britain and America disclosed at Geneva will be utilized to the limit to over a huge naval program.

### Effective Defense of Victims of Class War.

The manifesto of the Central Executive Committee of the best traditions of the revolutionary movement, inasmuch as it not only properly stigmatizes the murder crew in Massachusetts Every act of the murderers of Massachusetts, who personify and extends the denunciation to the national government, but also fearlessly criticizes the weaknesses, the hesitations and vacillations and open treachery of the so-called labor and liberal ele-

> In the front ranks of those alleged spokesmen of labor who serve the interests of the assassins of the working class must be placed the name of William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, who refused to use his office to aid the two champions of the working class; those valiant Italian workers who without pay or any hope of reward except the approval of the workers among whom they toiled, fought a battle that Green and his ilk would shrink from fighting. Undoubtedly a word from Green would have resulted in nation-wide demonstrations that would have embraced not only the three million organized workers, but millions of unorganized. The executive council of the American Federation of Labor had the power to stay the hand of the executioner, yet it refused to use that power for the reason that its role is that of defender of the capitalist class and assistant executioner of the working class. The manifesto of the Party points unerringly to the destiny of the corrupt labor bureaucracy as sinking ever lower in the service of capitalism as the class struggle sharpens.

Closely akin to this venal bureacracy is the officialdom of The more open spokesmen of imperialism are already speakthe workers to a determined struggle. This sort of insipid propaganda became. in this case, positively murderous, as it tended to spread defeatism and despair among the ranks of the working class.

## Liberty in Boston

To those not actually taking part in the swift my ying chain of events revolving around the burning of Sacco and Vanzetti, it would be difficult to comprehend and correctly analyze the complete significance of the distorted and half-told stories which were blazoned in huge headlines in the capitalist press thru the nation.

The kept press of Boston with few exceptions, has gone out of it's way, since Gov. Fuller white-washed Thayer & Co., to whet the appetities of its readers for the approaching execution by placing side by sine pictures of the martyred workers and pictures of a juror's house which was "mysteriously" bombed last week.

Police terrorism was complete in every detail, their job being to vigorously suppress every voice, be it ever so meek, that was raised in protest agai st the carrying out of the last act in this tragic ho'scanist.

I was one of a group that comprised the second platoon of pickets in front of the State House. The sidewalk was literally swarmed with police both in "barness" and civilian clothes, while mounted police reds leisurely up and down the street. Hordes of newspaper reporters and camera-men made traffic difficult and the crowd which filled the north-west corner of Boston Common was rapidly growing in size and was forced back to the center of the Common by the police repeatedly.

Our picket line was given the usual order to disparse, but being firm in the conviction that we were exercising our rights of peaceful persuasion as gigranteed by law, we continued to move along the cobing in an orderly, determined manner holding our placards high.

A detail of reserves swung around the corner and were loudly applauded by a group of legionnieres, just leaving the State House after going Abru some form of ceremonial hocus-pocus, and in a few seconds we were pounced upon and rushed aginst a stone wall. The police were ordered by their superiors to "take a good look at these people, so you will know them when you see them again, which was followed by the "grand march" to the Joy Street Station. Several times during the long walk to the jail we were cheered and applauded by mpathetic workers and liberals from Beacon Hill. The noble blue-coat who escorted me was of a opestioning turn of mind. He inquired if I believed in god and on receiving an answer in the negative thirst out: "That's what the trouble is with all you, people, no respect for god's laws and no respect for courts." He suggested that I should read Pope Pious' Encyclical and learn something. I agreed on condition that he familiarize himself with the writings of Marx and Engels, as I believed as two memsers of the wage-earning class we should share ogh literary views.

5 Once lincd up in the station house we were searchect and booked and I was relieved of my copy of The DAILY WORKER by an understrapper who berked out that "papers like that don't belong in TgIS country." While being assigned to our cells were given a rousing welcome by our fellowwerkers of the first picket line. Some one raised "his voice to the tune of "Solidarity Forever" and all hands responded with a vigor that made our filthy old cell-rooms ring. Meanwhile the women, parti-ularly those comrades of foreign birth, were hended in the guard-room where they were forced put up with all sorts of insults and indignities from the cops. These girls were not to be bested, hewever, and when asked by the "brave officers' when they were going back to "Rooshia" they were geick to reply "When is the Boston police force gring back to Ireland?"

More and more pickets were brot in, each new

group being given the same welcome cheers. When the cheering subsided the first question asked our newly arrived comrades was: "How many of you were taken in this time and how many more are waiting to go on the line?"-Evidently the thundering challenge of our many

o'ces chanting the "Internationale" was more than our hosts could endure for three cops walked to the end of the cell-corridor where they stopped for a bit and then walked out grinning sheepishly. Our noses soon discovered the meaning of their mysterious mission when the sickening fumes of a "sti bomb" was wafted into our close, damp cells. By the way, this is a crime under Boston "law," but after all weren't we only workers? What difference? The ladies in the smoke-filled guard room were also given a taste of chivalry as practised by Bostons' stink bomb-throwing guardians of law and order. Perhaps this was not enough, for when several of the ladies requested the privilege of using the toilet they were ushered into our cell room section and in plain view of the male occupants of the cells they were told to use the vile accommodations of an empty cell where all the scum of the underworld are confined.

Later in the day Powers Hapgood arrived and was locked up in our section. After hastily outlining the situation "outside" he joined us in singing and cheering until he was suddenly taken from his cell and whisked away to the Psychopathic Hospital where he was ... eld for some time incommunicado.

Perhaps the most interesting part of our sojourn behind the bars was the sifting out of two strange "fellow-prisoners" who were suspected of being stool-pigeons. Just before the last line of pickets was brot in, a roll-call of each cell was suggested. Everyone was asked to give his cell-mates, his name, address, occupation and reason for being on the picket line. All were able to give a satisfactory account of himself excepting one stranger on each side of the jail. These two had been busy thruout the early part of our "visit," while our bail was being arranged, in asking all sorts of trick questions, etc., and had aroused suspicions. One of these fellows was found, I was told by one of the pickets, with a gun on his person and was later observed chatting with an officer before being assigned to one of the cells, which held from four to five prisoners. When he was asked point-blank by his cell-mates, why he was in Boston, he replied, "I was sent by a certain organization to do a certain thing." What the organization was and what the "certain thing" could have been is best answered by the fact that he was nowhere to be seen when the pickets were arraignd in court Tuesday morning.

After being arrested for carrying a placard on the Common. William Patterson, president of the American Negro Labor Congress, was told by the arresting officer that "this is the first I have seen a Nigger bastard who is a Communist." Patterson singled out by a mounted policeman who tried to ride him down, only the fact that he, (Patterson) dodged around a tree saved him from the sharp hoofs of the horse. After being released on bail Patterson took his place on the State House picket line and soon found his way into jail where once more he was the object of the vicious race-prejudice of thick-skulled police.

These are only a few instances of some of the examples of rabid fascism prevailing in Boston, they are the facts which never see the light of day in the capitalist papers until given the "proper" angle by labor-hating editors. I have also tried to portray the splendid spirit of solidarity of the workers who carried on their unflinching protest in the face of the most ruthless repression known to Boston since the days of the Boston massacre.



Big realtors, who rake in profits exceeding those guaranteed by the easure, fought the bill on the ground that it had "not been certificated as an emergercy measure."




