Truckmen Win Wage Raise, Shorter Hours From **Twenty Independent Firms**

Twenty independent firms have admitted defeat in the strike of the 7,000 truckmen who walked out early Wednesday morning, and have settled with the union on the latter's terms. This includes the winning of the eight-hour day, an increase of \$5 a week in pay, and \$1.25 an nour for overtime instead of \$1 which was the scale prevailing before the strike.

The police fired 12 shots into a crowd of over 500 strikers at Second avenue and Houston street yesterday morning when efforts were made to persuade scabs from acting as strikebreakers on a number of trucks of the United States Trucking Corporation, of which Gov. Smith is said to be a large shareholder.

Using the same tactics that were common during the strike of paper box makers, cloakmakers, and furriers, the police tore into the crowd and viciously attacked the strikers with clubs.




