

BROWDER TO SPEAK ON C.I. CONGRESS IN GARDEN THURSDAY NIGHT

How can the forces of American labor, the farmers and middle class be united in the struggle against fascism?
This question will be answered by Earl Browder, general secretary of the Communist Party, at Madison Square Garden, Thursday night.

Browder was one of the speakers at the recent Seventh World Congress of the Communist International, which placed the question of unity against fascism at the very center of its discussions.
There has been a steady increase in the use of violence on the part of employers in their efforts to

throttle the struggles of American labor to maintain decent living standards. This is a warning signal that the few hard-won democratic rights of the masses may soon be overwhelmed by the advance of fascism.
Never was the need for the unity of labor and

all progressive forces against reaction so great. This fact gives Browder's report the greatest possible importance.
The New York District Committee of the Communist Party has issued a special invitation to all members of the Socialist Party and to all trade unionists to attend. There will be questions and discussion at the close of Browder's address.

A. officials assured a committee representing relief workers of New Haven that a 10 per cent increase in wages and a reduction in hours from 140 to 120 a month would go into effect immediately.

ECONOMIC News and Views

The threat of another world war continues to stimulate the munitions makers, the speculators and all the rest of the unholy crew who make money out of the slaughter of millions.

The present upturn has so far turned out to be smaller than business ballyhoo predicted. The Federal Reserve Board reports that production had a seasonal increase during August, but its index remained unchanged at 86 per cent of the 1923-25 average.

The volume of business and production during the final quarter of this year is expected to be about 10 per cent higher than last year. Manufacturers and business men are looking forward to very high profits.

Higher production will be concentrated in auto and machine tools. Although plagued by surplus cars and huge accumulation of used autos, the manufacturers are extending their volume of operations.

The machine tool industry is also flourishing and its rate of operation is at the highest point since 1929. The causes of the present activity in machine tools are many.

The increase in the efficiency of the new machines has been very large. McGraw-Hill reports that coal cutters are 50 per cent more effective; core drills, more than 100 per cent.

Another factor in the advance of the machine tool market is heavy purchases by the Soviet Union. Still another factor is the buying of new machinery by companies who wish to keep up with their competitors.

The machine tool boomlet is an indication of the slight degree of internal capitalist recovery that is taking place. But it is not a sign of genuine recovery on a large scale.

Farmers Union In Michigan Condemns AAA

Big Gains Are Reported to 1,500 Delegates to State Convention

(Daily Worker Michigan Bureau) OWOSSO, Mich., Sept. 29.—Among the decisions made by 1600 delegates to the Michigan convention of the National Farmers Union which has just ended its two-day session here, were resolutions condemning the State sales tax; the A. A. A. crop destruction program, especially the coming potato control; opposition to war and military training in schools, C. C. C. camps and for Boy Scouts.

President Roosevelt, Secretary of Agriculture Wallace came in for bitter attacks from farmers and leaders of the Union some of whom had previously been supporters of the "New Deal." Edward H. Everston, National president of the Farmers Union said:

This business of making you grow one bushel of wheat where you grew two before is for the sole purpose of allowing those who had mortgages on your farms to take them over. The administration is putting the farmer through a wringer in behalf of Wall Street.

Big Growth Reported Chester Graham, secretary of the Michigan organization reported that 67 new locals were established since last year's convention and the state membership grew from 17,000 to 25,000.

Fred Wentworth, secretary of the Illinois organization, who was one of the speakers, stated that the "county agricultural agents were agents for Wall Street."
