TARL BROWDER, Commu-L nist candidate for President of the United States, is required to take a literacy test in Yonkers, N. Y., or face a challenge of his right

The Fifteenth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution, adopted after the Civil War,

"The right of the citizens shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude."

But — there's nothing prohibiting the States from denying the right to vote to citizens with blue eyes, or who happen to be tenants instead of houseowners, or who are illiterate, or whose grandfather was a slave. Wasn't I myself denied the right to vote because 12 months ago I was on the armored cars, every conceivable wrong side of the Hudson

In the South the use of the "grandfather" clause was used widely to prevent Negroes from voting. Something like Hitler's ban on people who had a grandma that was a Jew. Nowadays, it's the "literacy test."

If a white Democrat wants to vote in darkest America, and he looks sort of backward, the examiners ask him to spell "cat." If a Negro wants to vote, they ask him to spell hexamentalinetetrahyde. If he can't, he don't

int Program of Varied Groups Opens Way for Vast Growth of Organized Peace Movement, Delegate Declares-Sees Unity in U. S.

By Theodore Repard

A Congress which broke new and fertile ground for the peace movement both in America and in the world at large is how Clarence Hathaway, cditor in chief of this paper, yesterday described the first World Peace Congress, held in Brussels, Belgium, Sept. 3 to 7.

Hathaway was one of the 54 members in the American delegation, the most broadly representative U. S. delegation ever to attend any similar gathering.

"If it were only a matter of adding together the existing peace organizations, this development would not be so significant." Hathaway said. "But the coming together of these many peace organizations will give the peace movement the possibility of attracting to itself many more millions of workers, farmers and middle class groups.

"Therein lies its greatest sig-

'What was noteworthy about the breadth of the representation was not only the numbers but primarily the character of the organizations represented. It was really the first time in history that all the currents of the peace movement on a world scale were brought together."

REALLY REPRESENTATIVE

A glance at the roster of delegates and organizations at the Congress bears this out. This certainly held true for the American two trends, one concentrated around the National Peace Congress and the other about the American League Against War and Fascism.

The National Peace Congress is itself a federation of every peace organization outside the American League, including religious pacifist organizations, the League of Nations Association, National Council for the Prevention of War and others.

The Congress was prepared step by step in advance as was necessary to unite such a variety of

groups on a common minimum program. Some obstacles cropped up, of course. Reservations to the general four-point program were voiced by some delegations. It was finally agreed to give the various national movements leeway in applying the Congress decisions in terms of the specific needs and conditions in each country

But the main program held fast. Four basic points were agreed upon:

FOUR BASIC POINTS

"1. Recognition of the sanctity of treaty ob-

"2. Reduction and limitation of armaments by international agreement and the suppression of profit from the manufacture and trade in

"3. Strengthening of the League of Nations for the prevention and stopping of war by the organization of collective security and mutual as-

"4. Establishment within the framework of the League of Nations of effective machinery for remedying international conditions which might

Within the American delegation itself, the chief reservation was the degree to which Point 4 might be construed as committing the delegation to a campaign for the entrance of the United States into the League. The reservation was accepted with the understanding that the substance of the point remained in force. "At the adjournment of the Congress, any doubts

"My belief is that conditions today are more favorable than ever before for the collaboration of these organizations, and judging from the spirit of all the delegates at Brussels, we can be assured of a large and successful Peace Congress in the near future," was Hathaway's opinion.

U.S. Supreme Court and Federal Judges to Hear 2 Legal Battles

CHICAGO, Oct. 18 .- The Communist Party over the week-end pushed its Illinois ballot fight on a dual legal front, simultaneously asking the United States Supreme Court and a special Federal Court to order inclusion of the Communist candi-

dates on the printed ballots. Decision on an application for a writ of certiorari, entered Saturday, is expected in Washington this week, possibly tomorrow. The write filed by attorney John F. Finerty, who is counsel for Tom Mooney, would make possible a review by the Supreme Court of the case now on appeal in an Illinois Circuit Court, in which an injunction is asked to prevent printing of the ballots unless the Communist candidates are placed on them.

The Supreme Court has the power, the Daily Worker was informed by legal experts yesterday, to review he case on the certiorari writ and pass on it before election day. To do this, the Court will have to waive its rules under which decision would therwise be delayed until after

In scorching letters to Governor Davey of Ohio, Governor Kump of West Virginia and to Weir himself, Murray demanded action against the thugs, who beat up six steel union organizers recently.

"Mr. Ernest T. Weir" declared Murray, is "personally responsible for these brutal attacks."

Murray's letter to the governor, which follows, is a devastating expose of the lord of 20,000 steel workers in the unincorporated town of Weirton, West Virginia; in Steubenville, Ohio, and in Michigan.

The letter has political importance in a region where Weir and his \$35,000 contributions to Landon symbolize the Republican Party. And it puts two pussyfooting Democratic governors on the spot, while hundreds of thousands of steel workers watch to see whether they will continue to let Weir's thugs ride roughshod over workers' bodies

Murray's letter, which lists Weir's recent outrages, one after the other,

'During the past three months there has occurred the most flagrant and shameful flouting of law enforcement in the towns of Weirton, W. Va., and Steubenville, Ohio. A campaign of terror has been instituted, in such towns, at the immediate instigation of Mr. Ernest T.
Weir, chairman of the Board of the Weir, chairman of the Board of the National Steel Company, which has steel mills in both of these towns.

"I am not going to rest on mere generalities. The following are the specific cases which have occurred under this reign of terror and where the presentation of clear evidence against the armed thugs have proven to be of no avail in the courts dominated by Mr. Weir and (1) The Case of Claude R. Kramer,

On July 30 Mr. Kramer, an organizer for the Steel Workers Organizing Committee, formerly Director of Public Safety in the City of Massilon, Ohio, was taken into West Virginia, and finally ordered out of town. When returning to his hotel room in Steubenville he was set upon by eight thugs, warned not to raise an outcry. taken to the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Station, put on an eastbound train and threatened that if he were to return he would receive severe punishment. These facts were brought to the attention of the Governor of West Virginia, but no relief was secured. (2) The Case of Paul Rusen.

On July 31 Paul Rusen, an organizer for the Steel Workers Organizing Committee, while in an automobile in company with John Haver, proprietor of a garage in Steubenville, Ohio, was attacked in the 100 block of Dock Street, Steubenville, Ohio, by another group of thugs. The identity of his assailants was established and the entire matter submitted to the Prosecuting Attorney of Steubenville, Ohio, but to date all that has resulted has been further in-

vestigation of the witnesses. (3) The Case of Richard Riser And Anthony Kowalsky. On Sept. 2, these two members

of the staff of the Steel Workers Organizing Committee were taken into custody by the Holidays Cove police without any warrant whatever, detained for a half-hour for questioning, and then ordered out of town. Leaving Holidays Cove enroute for Steubenville, they were set upon by the occupants of three cars and badly beaten. There is no doubt but what the Holidays Cove Police Officers entered into a conspiracy with these armed thugs and held Kowalsky and Riser at Headquarters in order to send word to the thugs to

(4) The Case of Steve Barron.

On Sept. 6. Steve Barron, a member of the staff of the Steel Workers Organizing Committee, was standing in front of Hen Barmer's Place at Main and 10th Streets in Weirton, W. Va., when a car with five men drove up and stopped on the opposite side of the street. These men then attacked Barron and attempted to drag him into the car. The names of the occupants of the car are known. On Sept. 8, warrants were issued for the arrest of the thugs but in spite of the clear evidence submitted to the Grand Jury showing the identity of the assailants, including the impartial testimony of seven bystanders, the Grand Jury refused to issue an indictment. New York State Secretary Hears Men on Ships The drive to reach and bring into Are Eager to Know What Party Platform Is and Are Ready to Become Active Members

> The following is an interview held by Charles Krumbein, New York State Secretary of the Communist Party, and a young American seaman (name withheld) on the problems of recruiting new members into

Krumbein: How long have you been in the Party? A. Six months.

How did you come to join the Party.

A. During the New York port strike, last spring, I was on the finance committee and the most active members of the committee were, I found, the guys who were doing all the work were Communists. I was against the Party when I came out on strike. I didn't know the program and as a matter of fact I didn't think I needed to belong to any organization. I was a member of the I.S.U. and I was backward enough to think I could get my demands only through the union. I was never in contact with Party members. I found out, after a lot of thinking, that only through strong organization could we get any-

STRONGER UNION MAN

Q. Then you realized that besides trade union organization you need political organization?

A. Yes. I realized that the most active people were the Party members. I found that as a Communist, learning how to work organizationally, I was able to better myself and better everybody with whom I came into contact,

Q. You feel that you are a stronger worker in the union as a result of being a Communist?

A. I am. Very much, because being a Party member, I learned organization. I was able to apply what I was taught in the Party, in the union, and as a result I was able to apply it on the ships, and it was through the training I got in the Communist Party that I was able to organize the ship I was on in the strike.

Q. Are you in contact with many seamen?

Q. What do the seamen generally think about our Party? A. The seamen are naturally radical. Not these new kids that are just coming to sea. But take the average seaman, my age, a man who has been going to sea 10 to 12 years. They are eager to learn, and better their conditions. They are not all ready to join the Party but they will work with the Party 100 per cent, providing the Party

the Party is working for. Q. Do you think that there are a large number that would joinif properly approached?

A. Yes. Positively!

Why is it, in your opinion, that more of them are not in the

A. I don't think they have been contacted properly. I find in approaching a seaman, that if they like baseball, then play baseball with them. One kid I brought into the Party was a Navy man, He was a 100 per cent American, in the reactionary sense of the word. I broke that down with a little pamphlet called "Who Are the Americans?" It hit him just like that. It broke down the red scare immediately. This kid was a chauvinist, and he didn't like Jews. That one pamphlet started him thinking, and by keeping in contact with him, through more pamphlets and discussions-the kid finally became a good Communist.

Q. Do you think that because many of our comrades are reluctant to ask workers to join-therefore many of them don't join.

A. I think so. A lot of Communists are afraid to say they are Communists. Of course on the ship I have had to repeatedly conceal the fact that I was a Communist because the red scare was still on the ship. But those I wanted to talk to, why I told them I was a Com-

FEW SHORE CONTACTS

Q. That is, you carry on day to day work on the ship, see how the individuals react and when you see individuals who are more advanced and closer to us than the average, then you personally talk to them, give them literature, and bring them into the Party.

Q. Do you come in contact with workers from any other industries.

A. Very seldom. Only shore-side people.

Q. You mean teamsters, longshoremen? A. Yes. I talk to longshoremen every time I get a chance. Many of them are afraid to join the Party. A lot of them are ready, but

they are afraid of losing their jobs. Q. From this it should follow that proper literature should be gotten to them to dispel these doubts. Clearing up these questions would be very effective in recruiting them into the Party, especially if we assure them that our methods of work are such that they don't openly expose themselves and lose their jobs. Isn't that correct?

A. Yes. For instance, in talking with the Italian longshoremen I find that they don't savvy. The greatest part of them are foreign born and the Party could be explained in their own language much better than in English. They are interested, but they haven't a clear picture of what it is all about. If it could be put out in Italian it would hit home much more directly than the literature they are getting. BECOME ACTIVE IN PARTY

Q. Since you joined the Party how do you feel within the Party.

Is it everything you expected? A. When I went into the Party I was a little bit timid. I wasn't quite sure what it was all about. I was a little timid about opening up on how I felt about things. But after a few meetings I found out the other comrades felt the same way as I did and when I suggested something it was considered like everybody's suggestion,

Q. Do you think you are getting much more enlightenment about the problems of the working class in the Party than you did before? A. Yes. I have never been able to get these things outside of the Party.

Q. Do you think this still could be improved?

A. Yes. I think so. There is so much activity there isn't enough time devoted to new Party members. We have young fellows coming in all the time and some of them are not drawn inco the movement enough. They're anxious to learn and be active but they don't know who to turn to. They're afraid they'll pop off and say the wrong things. They're a little reluctant to speak. Our section leaders work hard, day and night, but there must be more attention paid to the new Party member-to the individual.

Q. We are trying to make a drastic change in the whole inner life of the Party by making it possible to carry on educational work, so that our Party membership will know the whys and wherefores of ALL IN RECRUITING MASSES everything they are doing. 



Demand Aid for Spanish People's Fight

· Is British imperialism refusing to call the non-intervention committee meeting to act immediately on the Soviet Union's demand to blockade Portuguese ports as a fascist open door to Spain because the reports are true that London is ready to recognize fascist General Franco if and when he captures Madrid?

The masses of the Soviet Union, backing the energetic fight of their government, are demanding that the non-intervention committee act quickly-or that it be thrown overboard before it has sunk Spanish democracy. Let us here in the U.S. do all in our power to establish a working class blockade to stop the shipment of arms to the Spanish

On the matter of "neutrality," some of the officials in the U.S. State Department have been the most ardent supporters of the Spanish fascist insurgents. We read in the Merry-Go-Round, daily Washington column of Messrs. Pearson and Allen, Oct.

"Some of Mr. Hull's career boys (in the U. S. State Department) are not such staunch believers in democracy. Behind the scenes they have been exerting informal but powerful influence to prevent the sale of arms and ammunition to the Spanish government. . . . The neutrality act gives the State Department no power to prevent arms shipments to Spain."

The blockade against the legal, popular government of Spain must be broken.

Let us, in this gravest hour in Spain's truggle for freedom, do all in our power to smash the "neutrality" scandal that is helping the fascist Gen. Franco not only to murder Spanish democracy but to bring our own country nearer to fascism and war.

Roosevelt Speeches Lack Real Pledges to Masses

· President Roosevelt spoke in Detroit only two days after Governor Landon. One must say that there was a difference in the two speeches. Roosevelt didn't fawn on the automobile magnates. He didn't hail the union-busters as the exponents of economic

On the contrary, he told them that they weren't paying high enough wages; that the hourly rates might be high, but the annual wages of the auto workers were too low.

That is all to the good. But the automobile workers might have expected the President to say what HE proposed to do in order to raise wages. On this he was silent.

But even more conspicuous was his silence on the crucial issue of collective bargaining. Speaking in the citadel of the open shop, of company unionism and the infamous spy and stool-pigeon system, Roosevelt had not a word to say on this subject-not a word to indicate what concrete measures he proposed in order to carry out the pledge in the Democratic platform to protect the right of workers to organize in unions of their choice.

Too many of Roosevelt's campaign speeches have been of this character: long on fine sentiments, but very short on proposals to clothe these sentiments in flesh and blood.

As Earl Browder, Communist candidate for President, put it in a press interview in

"Roosevelt compromises those pro-

gressive issues for which he makes good speeches."

In his efforts to reassure Big Business he has made two concrete promises: that relief expenditures are coming down and that there will be no new taxation.

Neither of these is in the interests of the masses. What about LIFTING some of the tax burden from the poor, who are carrying more than their share, and placing it on the Morgans, Rockefellers, duPonts, Fords and Hearsts, whose profits are galloping under the New Deal?

What about meeting the demands of the Workers Alliance for INCREASED relief? What about revising the Social Security Law to make it something more than a mockery of social security? And what about concrete steps to defend civil liberties, which are under fire in all parts of the country?

The voice of Landon during the past two weeks has become more and more openly the voice of Hearst and the Liberty League. But Roosevelt has failed to take up the cudgels against Wall Street reaction. His speeches show how little he can be relied on in the critical struggle between the forces of democracy and fascism now developing in

For the masses of the people the most effective way of defeating Hearst-Landon reaction and rallying the progressive forces in a mighty anti-fascist Farmer-Labor Party is to vote on Nov. 3 for the Communist ticket of Browder and Ford.

Demand Free Speech Right For Browder in Terre Haute

· If democracy is not to be seriously compromised, Earl Browder, Communist candidate, must be assured the right to speak in Terre Haute, Indiana.

Such is the opinion of scores upon scores of American newspapers, aghast at the arrest of Earl Browder, when he stepped foot in Terre Haute on Sept. 30.

In the most high-handed manner, typical of a Nazi "preventative arrest," Police Chief Yates, acting under orders of Mayor Beecher and the Merchants Association, clapped Browder into jail.

That stain against democracy, that threat to the rights of every American, must be wiped out. Browder must win the right to speak in the very city where he was robbed of that right.

"It is not a test of only my constitutional rights," declared the Communist presidential candidate. "But it is the test and fight for the constitutional rights of the American people. If a Communist can be kept out of Terre Haute so can anyone else."

Terre Haute labor has also spoken. The Central Labor Union of Terre Haute castigated Browder's prosecutors and demanded that the Communist candidate be safeguarded in his right to address the people

Every American can and must take a hand in this fight for civil liberties being trampled upon today in Terre Haute and tomorrow who knows where. Wire or write now to Chief of Police Yates, demanding that Browder be unhampered in his constitutional right to speak freely to the people of Terre Haute.

A victory for Browder in Terre Haute would be a victory for American democracy. A defeat to his right to speak would be a gain for American Fascism.

A Progressive City **Budget for New York**

· When Mayor LaGuardia shut off the hearing on the new city budget before I. Amter, Communist candidate for President of the Board of Aldermen, and representatives of the Workers Alliance and Socialist Party could speak, he undoubtedly saved himself from some embarrassment.

What Amter had to say was the kind of truth that hurts those that seek to evade it. This speech that was never made (its most important sections were published in Friday's Daily Worker) showed what was wrong with the mayor's budget as far as the people of New York are concerned.

In clear-cut language Amter raised the demand for an increase in relief appropriations of at least 40 per cent, full restoration of pay cuts to city employes, and increases for housing inspection and for the Departments of Health, Hospitals, Sanitation and Parks.

And the Communist candidate showed where the money was to come from. He proposed cancellation of the \$161,000,000 provided in the budget for interest and principal to the bankers, as well as \$8,500,000 of the bankers' reserve. Is Mayor LaGuardia going to insist on upholding this Tammany bankers' agreement?

In addition, Amter advocated progressively increasing taxes on incomes, gifts, inheritances and stock transfers above \$5,000, and reduction of the salaries of high public officials.

The Communist budget proposals represent the minimum needs of the people of New York. They are designed to put an end to such conditions as prevail at Harlem Hospital, where 39 babies died in August and September through lack of proper care.

Amter is scheduled to appear at the second budget hearings this Thursday and Friday. All progressives should back up his proposals not only at the hearings, but at the polls Nov. 3.

World Front

Shadows of coming events are very often first cast in the business journals, especially the organs of Wall Street. Sometime before a strong U.S. fleet was concentrated in the Whangpoo, off the Shanghai Bund ("just a mere incident," the Admiral said) Business Week, Oct. 10, told its readers to get ready for war in the

"It should be perfectly plain to executives who do business in the Orient or who draw their raw materials from that part of the world that a showdown is not far away," advised this exploiters' magazine.



"China has some important raw materials, but the country's population of more than 400,000,000 can absorb most of them domestically. Any nation which will dare as much as Japan has dared to control a market will think next of controlling the raw materials essential to its industries. Holland's East Indies, France's Indo-China, Britain's Malaya and Australia, and the

Philippine Islands could supply Japan's factories with tin, rubber, petroleum, sugar, tobacco, coal and vege-"Business needs to plan ahead with this in mind."

American business is acutely conscious of the coming war in the Far East.

Business Week also tells what the business men of France most want that declaring Paris business leaders say that they must have "a less radical government which swings just far enough to the right to eliminate the Communists but not so far that it loses the support of the Socialists." Such a government, declares Business Week, "is necessary in the near future if the labor situation is to be controlled and business to benefit from devaluation."

In other words, quite in the line of Trotskyites, French business and Wall Street demand a rupture of the People's Front. They want the Communists out and a coalition government of the Centre, Radical Socialists and Socialists. Only in this way, reason the 200 rich families of France, can they "benefit from devaluation." Otherwise, the "labor situation" cannot be controlled. The Communists, therefore, by admission of American and French business, are the ones chiefly defending French labor from lower wages, longer hours, as well as from the maneuvers to break down the People's Front dike against Fascism.

Premier Blum's support of "neutrality" with regard to Spain and his advocacy of devaluation have earned him the respect of business circles in Paris and New York. Now if he could only shake off Communist participation in the People's Front, sigh the big bosses.

A few days ago we asked in this column what would be the stand of the Belgian Socialists in the Cabinet to the new, definite pro-Hitler and pro-British Tory move of King Leopold, a step that is bringing the world nearer to reaction and war. We got our answer much quicker than we anticipated, but not much different from what we expected.

The Socialist spokesman for King Leopold was none other than Paul Spaak, Foreign Minister. Spaak was the Belgian Left hope of the American Socialist Party at one time, and not so long ago. He held about the same position in the Belgian Socialist Party as Norman Thomas does here. Spaak readily sold his "Left leadership" for a mess of Cabinet potage. And he has earned his oatmeal. King Leopold spoke under the prompting of Hitler and Mussolini. And now speaks in the name of his dear King Leopold.

He goes a little further than the King in the diy making his heaviest assault on the League of Nations and on collective security for peace.

The American capitalist press had made the Belgian situation pretty clear beforehand. Belgium was swinging into the path of Nazi foreign policy. Britain was encouraging King Leopold. The new Brussels declaration was aimed to smash the League of Nations as even the tiniest obstacle in the way of war, and to open the road for a new Locarno pact that, in reality, would be a pro-Fascist Western European bloc against the Soviet Union, France, Czechoslovakia, and any other country that wouldn't take the course of Belgium.

Belgium's action, also, was a prelude to an expected Fascist victory in Madrid.

It is the bitterest irony that a Socialist Minister, Blum, should first announce the "neutrality" pact that blockaded Spain, and another Socialist Minister, Spaak, should be the first to sponsor a pro-Fascist alignment as the result of an expected defeat of Spanish democracy brought on by "neutrality."

"A very gloomy development indeed," comments Izvestia, Soviet newspaper.

That British labor is extremely worried over the situation is proved by the fact that Major Atlee, parliamentary leader of the Labor Party, has just conferred with Sir Anthony Eden and has demanded some action to stop Fascist arms shipments to Spain.

QUESTIONS and **ANSWERS**

QUESTION: Is the Communist Party of the United States receiving financial support from Moscow, in the present election campaign?

ANSWER: This question is answered in Earl Browder's "What Is Communism?" pages 207-208:

"That hoary old legend of 'Moscow gold,' which the Hearsts of all lands constantly repeat, is only an effort to hide the fact that Communist Parties grow naturally out of the class struggle in each country. They would like the masses to believe that Communist Parties are mercenaries, imported from abroad or bribed and bought by Moscow Bolsheviks to 'make trouble' in the capitalist countries.

"No, the Communist Party of the United States of America receives no 'Moscow gold.' Its finances come from the workers and sympathizers in this country. But that is not to deny that Communists send money from one country to another to help those who are in the most difficult positions. For example, the C.P. U.S.A. itself pays 'international dues,' which it collects from its members, amounting to about \$20,000 per year, and of which about 80 per cent goes to help the Communist Parties of Germany, Ireland, Cubo, Philippine Islands, Mexico, Canada and Porto Rico. During 1934, the C.P.U.S.A. sent over \$12,000 to the German Party. The C.P.U.S.A. gets no financial help from the outside, because it is still working under what are comparatively more favorable conditions, opportunities for open work, etc., but must itself help the others, especially in fascist and colonial countries. Such amounts spent for international solidarity are comparatively small but politically are of great importance. They serve to emphasize and give concrete weight to our conception of a World Party, the embodiment of the stirring Marxian slogan, 'Workers of the World,

The League Must Not Be Made Safe For An Aggressor, Litvinoff Warns

Following is the third part of the full text of the speech of Maxim Litvinoff, Soviet Commissar of Foreign Affairs, delivered atthe League of Nations on Sept. 28, 1936, on the defense of peace and on the question of "neutrality" in Spain.

III

Some speakers here have been placing great hopes on an increase in League activities under Article 19, which provides for the reconsideration of international treaties. Such reconsideration is possible and desirable, in the opinion of the Soviet delegation, only if the consent of all interested parties has

A striking example is the recent revision of the Straits Convention. which was successful precisely bethe signatories to the Convention was obtained. Without such consent to raise the issue of revision-for which even those who have spoken recognize the necessity of unanimity-will not fail to produce positive results, but will make relations between the interested parties still more acute, and thereby still further worsen the international situation.

There are hardly any countries absolutely satisfied with existing international agreements, whether concluded in the recent or in the more remote past, and I question whether any beneficial results are to be expected from burdening the League with such claims. Is it not rather to be feared that the moral support which even a minority of the Assembly may afford to some claim will encourage the aggressor to a breach of the particular treaty involving acts of violence?

DISARMAMENT It is not for the Soviet delegation, of course, to object to the French proposal for calling together the Bureau of the Disarmament Conference. The Soviet government has always considered, and still considers, that disarmament is

the most effective guarantee of peace, particularly if disarmament is total and universal, which, given good will, is easier to achieve than partial disarmament. But this is the sphere in which universality, and that not only on a European scale, must really be made an essential condition. I refrain, however, from expressing an opinion, whether such universality at the present time is

It is quite another matter when universality is spoken of in connection with improving the League Covenant. In principle we are all in favor of universality. We ask for nothing better than the earliest possible entry of every State into the League-a League, naturally, affording genuine guarantees of security to all its members, a League founded for mutual aid, a League which recognizes the equality of nations.

NO SAFETY FOR AGGRESSOR But if the idea is that, until such universality has been reached, we shall do nothing to improve the Covenant, and if we are once again invited into the "waiting-room," must confess my dissent. And I would object even more strongly if, in the name of universality, the League were to set about eliminating from the Covenant all that

makes it a weapon of peace and a

threat to the aggressor.

I should object vigorously to anything calculated, as I said at the last session of the Assembly, to make the League safe for the aggressor. We must admit that a State which openly exalts the power of the sword as against international obligations for which it does not conceal its contempt: a power which cynically calls on other States to adopt the same contemptuous attitude to their signature at the foot of treaties, with the object of finally destroying international confidence; such a power cannot feel comfortable in a League of Nations which proclaims one of its principal aims to be "the maintenance of justice and the scrupulous respect for all treaty obligations in the dealings of organized peoples with one an-

PREDATORY STATES A State which is governed by men

who have incorporated into the program of their foreign policy the conquest of other nations' territory, who at their festivities, before their people and the representatives of other States, enumerate the vast territories which they intend violently to separate from other countries, cannot sincerely accept Article 10, which ensures to all member States their territorial integrity and political independence.

A State which preaches the legality of so-called "localized" wars cannot make its peace with Article 16, which proclaims that resort to war against one member of the League is deemed to be an act of war against all other members of the League, and which prescribes a graduated system of sanctions against the aggressor.

NATIONAL INEQUALITY

Again, here in Geneva, under the Convention was signed the other day which prohibits even the mere incitement by wireless to breaches of internal peace in other States. Can a State sincerely accede to such a Convention which, as has been abundantly proved, maintains in all countries its agencies and secret services, built up of its own nationals, which actively interfere in the life of those countries, incite party against party, organize and finance insurrections, and openly afford military aid to rebels?

Can we declare compatible with the principle of equality of nations, which is one of the foundation stones of the League, the ideology of a State founded on racial and national inequality, and describing all peoples except its own as "subhu-

I would ask the supporters of "universality at any price": Must we sacrifice all the fundamental principles of the League in order to adapt it to the theory and practice of such a State, or must we invite the latter itself to adapt its principles to the present ideology of the League? My reply, at any rate, is: Better a League without universality than universality without League principles.

One of the things which has recently seeped into my consciousness is the fact that a drunken, raccoon-coated crowd doesn't necessarily make for grade-A football. Another is that the boys who get regular pay checks for playing the game put as much spirit into their efforts to please Maccabees Tie Michigan the crowd as the young fellows who are getting their tuition free and their pay in a sub-rosa manner.

I have come to like the pro game because it is honest. There is no fakery about it. It says frankly that it is in existence to make money for its promoters and players and it makes no bones

Every man in the game is doing his best to please the customers because he knows he couldn't draw the decent pay he is getting unless the public is pleased by his efforts. It is just show business transferred to the

Colleges Holier Than Thou

On the other hand, the colleges have that holierthan-thou attitude that is so sickening. They sniffly protest their simon pure amateurism and then slyly proselytize and pay players behind the barn in the dark

The ethics of the pro game are open and clear. They have a rule that they won't sign a football player for their teams unless he has graduated from college or—and this is came after twenty minutes of playing in the second half, when Me-

The importance of this last rule lies in the fact that it doesn't pay a pro promoter to lure a star out of college before he has a chance to graduate. It bars recruiting of sophomores and juniors because they can't use the player until his class is out of school.

This has the effect of pro football keeping many a young man in college, when by inclination or lack of funds he might

have quit to play pro football. The colleges have no such moral scruples. The rules applied by the college game are more often honored in the breach than in the observance.

Youngsters Recruited

Youngsters in high school and prep schools are recruited long before they have a chance to graduate and make up their minds as to what they want to be when they go to college.

They are lured from professions they might have chosen by the glory of being a football star, free tuition and the few dollars in cash they get for shoveling the snow off the walks in front of the college gym.

I knew one youngster who was paid \$20 a week in a southern college for doing just that job. In his four years at the school no snow ever fell. This same young fellow was injured in his senior year and was unable to play football.

His pay stopped and so did his schooling. After playing football for his school for three years he was forced to leave college and he never did get his degree.

Pro Football Different

Pro football is different in that it makes no promises and it has no fake morals. If you can't make the grade you quit playing with the team. In a college, if you can't make the grade, you not only quit playing with the team, but you quit going to college if you have depended on what you were to get for playing.

Many a high school star who didn't make good as a college player has been forced to give up a college career altogether because he went to an expensive university on a scholarship and couldn't stay because the pay stopped.

If he had never been proselytized in the first place he might have enrolled in a less expensive institution and have gone through the college to make a career for him-

There is one more comparison that might be made between the college game and the pro. The colleges offer you the cheering and the gaiety and take your chance on the kind of a game you are going to see all for the price of \$3.00 per seat and up.

You can see the best football played in America for 25 and 50 cents at a pro grame. Of course there won't be an organized cheering section, but you canand will-yell your head off at some swell football.


