City Jobless to Mass for Relief, WPA Demands Saturday

Workers Alliance Rally Asks Bigger WPA, No Aid Cuts

A group of 300 unemployed, led by the Workers Alliance Seabeach locals, was driven out by two riot squads of police after the jobless had quietly walked into the Emergency Relief Bureau Precinct No. 60 station at Kings Highway and East 17th Street, asking relief for

At the Precinct 60 station, five women were badly beaten by the police who were summoned by Gerald Griffin, administrator.

A mass meeting gathered as the neighborhood seethed with indignation at Griffin's action. A committee was elected to present the cases of the 100 families, many cut off relief, others badly in need of help, some facing eviction, others already evicted.

Demands for adequate relief and WPA conditions will be made by New York unemployed at a mass demonstration by the New York Workers Alliance Saturday morning at 10 o'clock at Columbus Circle.

Jobless will ask for expansion of the WPA to include a million additional workers and will protest against the new program of cuts in relief started by Miss Charlotte Carr, executive head of the Emergency Relief Bureau.

Admission of these extensive cuts in relief in New York City during the last two months were made by Miss Carr yesterday in a statement of the number of cases that have been cut off relief rolls. During the week of Oct. 9, a record high for 1936 in the cases closed was reached by the bureau, with a total of 4,808 cut off relief.

10,00 DROPPED

The case load since Sept. 1 has dropped almost by 10,000, the Alliance contended, and the report by Miss Carr yesterday showed the estimate to be correct. There were 3,371 fewer cases in the month of September alone before the current case-closing drive started.

Action by the Workers Alliance to protest this drive which has resulted in mass starvation and misery was answered by police attacks on jobless with clubs and guns Many have been jailed by police in the police assaults at district relief

In the demonstration Saturday the Alliance will demand that these police attacks be stopped. The organization is asking a 40 per cent clients, adequate clothing for the winter, and an increase of 25 per cent in the allowance for rent pay-

FOR SOCIAL INSURANCE

Coupled with these demands is the fight for genuine unemployment insurance relief and a fight against the case-closing drive. The Workers Alliance also seeks to place the burden of proof for denying relief on the home relief bureaus.

In increasing the number of WPA workers, the Alliance asks the gov ernment to utilize the \$1,200,000,000 reserve fund which remains from last year's relief allotment. The abolition of all discrimination and arbitrary dockings for pay, and full payment for legal holidays is also demanded by the Alliance.

Complete Text of Speech Which Ethel Norman, Widow of Murdered many prominent intellectuals, will Citrus Union Organizer Was Prevented from Giving by Legion

TAMPA, Fla., Oct. 27.-Ethel Norman, Communist candidate for U.S. Senate and widow of Frank Norman, I. L. D. leader and organizer of citrus workers who was murdered by vigilantes last year, was prevented from speaking Sunday afternoon when thugs broke up the meeting of Earl Browder. Communist candidate for President.

"The forces of social reaction . . . which depress the pay envelope," she says in a speech prepared for the Browder meeting, "have brutally tried to place the fear of violence in my own heart, but I am fighting still. I am fighting for myself, for my son. I am fighting for the Communist Party because it fights for us all."

"We pledge you our help, brothers," solemnly resolved the delegates, "in building a powerful labor union to make the steel employers give you a richer life."

B. K. Gebert, chairman of the conference, and for his tireless efforts in behalf of the steel drive chosen as head of the permanent committee to lead the cooperation with the union campaign, touched the central issue.

Unity of all workers, regardless of race, creed or political views, is the central need in achieving the goal so ardently desired.

Those responsible for winning the support of this powerful auxiliary force in the steel drive are to be congratulated on their splendid impetus to the union campaign.

Shipowners Are Responsible For West Coast Crisis

• The Pacific Coast shipowners have, by their obstinate attitude, created a situation where 38,000 seamen and longshoremen may go out on strike after midnight tonight.

What the men are demanding is, with a few additions, substantially what they won in the historic 1934 strike. And they have agreed to arbitrate everything except their two basic gains: the union hiring hall, and the six-hour day for longshoremen and eighthour day for seamen.

It is the shipowners who are responsible for provoking the present situation. It is they who have tried to take advantage of the termination of the agreement in order to whittle down the gains of the workers.

The behavior of President Roosevelt's newly appointed Maritime Commission has been a disgrace. It has repeatedly given aid and comfort to the union-busting shipowners. It has sought to stall off the unions and trap them into accepting the employers' proposal that the present agreement continue for another year without the guarantees that the unions demand.

And now comes the payoff, with Admiral Hamlet, the Maritime Commission's representative, telling the joint negotiating committee of the unions that the Commission wasn't interested in the controversy at all!

The maritime unions have been extremely conciliatory and their demands modest indeed. Their struggle deserves the fullest support of the labor movement throughout the country.

No Firings in the Merger, Edison Workers Demand

• "Public convenience and necessity," is the guiding phrase used by Public Utility Commissions to O.K. the actions of utility trusts.

Confronting the merger of the New York Edison Co. and the Consolidated Edison Co., the Utility Workers Union demands to know whether firing thousands of workers because of the merger will be a "public convenience and necessity."

Mergers increase profits. That's why the utility trusts want them. They don't cut down electric or gas rates. But they do get rid of a lot of workers.

Martin A. Wersing, president of the Utility Workers Union local, pointed out that when the United Electric Light & Power Co. was merged with the Edison Co., 700 workers were dumped out on the streets.

The union demands that this must not happen in the present proposed merger. Every worker, every person gouged by the electric trust, will readily and enthusiastically agree with the union.

The merger must not be allowed at the expense of hundreds of utilities workers. The workers' interests must be safeguarded first.

The Public Service Commission should hear from workers in every union in New York state insisting that the first condition of merger be the demands of the Utility Workers Union

World Front

• A political crisis has gripped the West Coast of Latin America. Peru and Chile are in the throes of an anti-imperialist people's upsurge against the native ruling puppets of the various contending imperialist powers.

Persecuted on the East Coast, in Brazil and Argentina, the People's Front movement, rocking Latin America from Mexico to the southernmost tip of South America, has erupted with greater force, on the West Coast, especially in Peru and



In Chile, the People's Front, formed more than a year ago, has now become strong enough to threaten the existing cabinet.

A split in the Radical Party, the majority going over to the People's Front, with the consequent withdrawal of its leaders from the cabinet, is causing great anxiety in Rightist circles.

The Radical Party in Chile generally is similar to the Radical Socialist Party of France.

Their joining the People's Front (now comprising the Communist Party, the Socialist Party, and the party led by Marmaduke Grove—a former army officer, who has a strong following especially among government employes) would make the anti-imperialist, anti-Fascist bloc the strongest political force in Chile.

The next Congress of the Radical Party is expected to join up solidly with the People's Front.

Taking a leaf from the Spanish fascists' notebook, the Rightist government of Peru tried to forestall a Left electoral victory by first refusing to publish the election rturns, and next by installing a military cabinet.

Elections were held on October 11 in Peru. But up to this moment no figures on the returns have been issued. And for a very simple reason: The left parties, which formed virtually a People's electoral front, won the overwhelming majority of the votes cast.

The outstanding party of the left is the Apra, a national reformist grouping with a strong national revolutionary wing, led by the famous author, Haya de la Torre. The Communist Party, which supported the left slate, after the Apra was barred from he balloting, has an important following among the Peruvian proletariat, especially the copper miners.

Instead of announcing the election results, the government resigned. General Ernesto Montague became premier and "Minister of Education," with a military cabinet.

Peru has always been one of the hottest battle grounds of the imperialist powers, the United States having the major share of investments, namely, \$200,-000,000 out of \$300,000,000. Exactly who is pulling the strings today is difficult to say, the influence of John Bull and Wall Street being about equally divided. Japanese imperialism, of late, has gained a strong foothold in Peru.

When the Getulio Vargas dictatorship in Brazil, by murder and terrorism, with the help of British and American imperialism, drove the people's front Liberation Alliance underground, the imperialist exploiters of Latin America breathed a sigh of relief. They thought they had written finis to the history of the development of the People's Front in South America.

They are learning now, however, that not even the highest Andes mountains nor the vilest terror of Getulio Vargas can stop the rapid sweep of the united anti-imperialist movement in Latin America.

Peruvian and Chilean political events are of the greatest significance in view of the approaching Inter-American Peace Conference, called by President Roosevelt, to open in Buenos Aires on December 1.

Thus far, the conference promises to be an American imperialist maneuver to win the South American countries to its policies in the face of the onrushing world war. Roosevelt proposes a sort of Latin American League of Nations.

The Nazis and Italian fascists, who have dangerous influence in official circles of Argentina, Uruguay and Brazil, immediately seized on the idea of the "isolation" of Latin America from general European and world politics as a means of hitting at the League of Nations and world collective action for peace.

The Mexican government and the Mexican trade unions, which favor participation in the conference, have raised the question of transforming the gathering into a real peace force. The Mexican Confederation of Labor, particularly, proposes that Latin America work with the rest of the peace forces of the world, such as the Soviet Union, France and the League of Nations. It warns against falling into the Hearstian trap of isolation.

The leftward sweep in Peru and Chile is proof that the Latin American people are uniting their forces against imperialism, and are of the mind of the Mexican trade union movement.

In fact, the official gathering at Buenos Ayres will be preceded by unofficial peace conferences that will arouse the Latin American people to independent action for world peace.

QUESTIONS and ANSWERS

Question: Why hasn't the Spanish government used its gold reserve in the fight against the rebels instead of soliciting collections all over the world?


Answer: The Spanish government has used every

Answer: The Spanish government has used every available source at its command to defeat the fascists. Though apparently large (\$700,000,000) in ordinary times, in Civil War, the Spanish gold reserve becomes pitifully inadequate. It cost Mussolini more than \$1,000,000,000 to conquer Ethiopia, besides the billions of previous expenditure in preparing the fascist armed forces. All taxes and income to the legitimate government of Spain have virtually stopped, far exceeding the \$700,000,000.

Much of the gold has been pledged for credits in various countries and to preserve the stability of the peseta in order to offset an annihilating economic crisis. What appeared as a big reserve actually has dwindled to practically nothing in the way of being adequate to purchase the arms required.

Soliciting of funds is one of the highest expressions of international solidarity with the Spanish people in their fight against fascism. The \$9,000,000 raised by the workers in the U.S.S.R. has proved of tremendous help to the People's Front government. The millions collected by anti-fascists in England, France and the United States has not only stiffened the defense of the government, but has saved thousands of lives of wounded and by supplying clothing and food to the People's Army and the masses behind the lines.

The more funds we collect and the quicker the greater will be the possibility of the lawful, democratic government of Spain winning a resounding victory against fascism and its foreign war-inciting allies.

FIRM PEACE COURSE
Against this threat, under rapidly
varying conditions, the Soviet Union
has steered firmly towards peace. A
brief glance at the highlights of the
Soviet peace policy will illustrate
the principles and objectives of the
Soviet Union's peace program.

Nineteen twenty-one — Treaties to maintain and work for peace were signed by the Soviet Union with Persia, Afghanistan and Turkey. At that time, this put great obstacles in the path of British imperialism to provoke war through these countries, and then to colonize the victims of their intended

Nineteen twenty-four—Treaties of peace with China and the destruction of the Czarist unequal treaties gave China its greatest impetus in the struggle for its liberation.

Nineteen twenty-nine—The Soviet Union was the first country to ratify the Kellogg Peace Pact. Thus, the workers' fatherland showed it was ready to utilize the desire of any capitalist country (in their various conflicts) to maintain the peace and to work collectively against war.

FOR REAL DISARMAMENT
Nineteen thirty-three — At the
Committee of the Disarmament
Conference, the Soviet Union was
the only country to put forward a
comprehensive disarmament program. When this failed, the Soviet
Union raised the struggle for peace
to a higher level by giving to the
world a new definition of an aggressor country and proposing to
the peoples everywhere means of

The only positive outcome of the World Economic Conference was the collective convention initiated by the Soviet Union with the Baltic States, Finland, Poland, Rumania, Turkey, Persia, Afghanistan, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia.

Nineteen thirty-four—When it was clear the issue of disarmament was struck dead by the fascist powers, particularly Nazi Germany, the Soviet Union began to work against the gravest danger of war since 1914, by its demand and fight for collective security.

vent Japan, Germany and Italy from speeding their war plans, the Soviet Union joined the League of Nations. Comrade Stalin's declaration that this, if it proved even the smallest obstacle to the war-mongers was justified, has been a hundred-fold confirmed.

The Franco-Soviet mutual assistance pact was signed. More than any other single deed this step of practical collective security has driven the war-mongers to frenzy. Hitler and Mussolini now realize that if they can smash this powerful peace advantage of the Soviet Union it would be easier for them to go to war with the hope of suc-

SOVIET PEACE POLICY

Nineteen thirty-five — Comrade Stalin stated the Soviet Union's peace policy as follows: "Our foreign policy is clear. It

is the policy of preserving peace, and developing trade relations with all countries. The U.S.S.R. does not think of threatening anyone, much less of attacking anyone. We stand for peace and defend the cause of peace. But we are not afraid of threats and are ready to return blow for blow to the war-mongers. Those who desire peace and seek business relations with us will always have our support. But those who attempt to attack our country will receive a devastating rebuff, in order to teach them not to thrust their pigs' snouts into our Soviet gar-

The tremendous growth and development of the Red Army, the Red Fleet, the Red Navy gave ample proof to the war-mongers that the Soviet Union was ready to abide by its word.

SPAIN'S CAUSE

Nineteen thirty-six — With the Italian fascist seizure of Ethiopia, and the Italian-German support to Spanish fascism the danger of war became graver than at any time since 1914.

The Soviet Union, after England and France had forced a "non-intervention pact" into existence, which it had joined with warning and in an attempt to put a brake at least on fascist shipment of arms to Spain, denounced the pact as a travesty and a scrap of paper shielding fascist aid to Spain.

main task in defending world peace. THE SITUATION TODAY

Those who attack the Soviet Union's peace policy go on the theory that nothing has happened in the world since 1914.

But really to understand and know how to help the Soviet Union in its great efforts for peace, one must realize that the general picture of the world in the struggle against war and for peace shows these oustanding features:

1—A proletarian state exists which is the greatest bulwark to peace.

2—Definite fascist aggressors are striving to begin a world war (Geramany, Italy, Japan).

3—A number of countries are in direct danger of attack by fascist aggressors and of losing their state and national independence (China, Czechoslovakia, Belgium, Rumania,

France, Yugoslavia, Spain).

4—Capitalist governments exist which at the present moment are interested in the maintenance of

COLLECTIVE SECURITY

In this situation, the Soviet peace policy lays the basis for COLLECTIVE action, for collective security pacts and for regional security pacts. That successes in the Soviet Union's peace policy have made it more difficult for the fascist aggressors both to prepare for and initiate the war they strive for is clear to everyone. Delay arouses the mass forces within the fascists' own countries against war, as for example the growing economic difficulties and fascist-induced hunger

of the masses in Germany and Italy. FASCISTS SEEK WAR

At the same time, the desperation of the fascists breaks all bounds. They know beyond all doubt that the majority of the world's population is against war, fervently desires peace, and that the Soviet Union's peace policy must gain treater support with time.

A pleasant surprise is in store for those who go to see Moi Solotaroff's designs and costumes at the A.C.A. Gallery. Gallery visitors invariably expect to see the Artef Theatre minus the stage, the director and acting company. They are agreeably shocked to find, instead of an Artef by-product, one of the finest art exhibitions of the current season.

The Artef Theatre is there, to be sure, but with a striking change of emphasis. In the theatre one was accustomed to see Solotaroff's sets, though very excellent, nevertheless subordinated to the Arter's productions; fine frames into which the capable directing and acting fitted perfectly without making any claim for attention for their own sake.

In Hearst's Daily Mirror there is another columnist than Walter Winchell. He holds forth on the sports page under the name of Dan Parker. As a Communist, I say it would be a wonderful thing for all Jewish workers to be Communists, but that situation unfortunately does not exist. As a fair minded individual, moreover, I cannot stand by and see a blatant lie thrown into the faces of even the readers of the Mirror.

Just a Hearst Trick

Now all of this is not a personal attack on big Daniel Parker. He has the reputation of being a pretty square shooter. But it is a very clear picture of the way the poison that is in Hearst's spleen is being spread by his

It shows up Hearstism for what it is-a lying system whereby the decent instincts of good newspapermen are converted to the use of fascist Jew-baiting.

Hearst, and only Hearst would permit such a thing to be printed. And that is because Hearst considers himself a law unto himself.

He operates like a fire-bug who starts a fire so that he can have the fun of turning in the alarm. He spews forth a hatred for liberals and Jews so that later on he can shout for a dictator to throw them into concentra-

I'm sorry that Dan Parker has been tainted by the cursed odor of Willie (the Skunk) Hearst.


