SPAIN SPRINGS SUDDEN ATTACK ON SOUTH FRONT

Government Forces Hold Lines in Face of Fierce Fascist Drive with Italian Tanks—Planes Again Strafe Madrid with Machine Guns

BULLETIN

MADRID, Wednesday, Oct. 28 (UP).—Fascist Foreign Legionnaires and Moors drove Government troops from two villages 17 miles south of Madrid early today.

Government troops were forced to abandon Torrejon de la Calzada and Torrejon de Valasco, directly south of the Capital on the road to Toledo.

MADRID, Oct. 27.—Wave after wave of workers' militia swept out from Molestes, ten miles south of Madrid, today in a desperate counter-offensive against the fascist drive on the capital.

Aimed at the strategic Navalcarnero front the government drive threw Moorish troops and legionnaires into temporary confusion. Fascist commanders rushed tanks and planes into action to halt the militiamen's offensive. Heavy fighting raged all day with the militia struggling to hold their gain despite terrific punishment from the enemy's modern armaments.

FASCISTS BOMB CITY

Government artillery was rushed forward to support the advancing infantry and hurled shells into the town of Navalcarnero while Government troops dotted the countryside with machine-gun nests and riflemen.

Meanwhile fascist troops unleashed the severest attack thus far in the El Escorial sector, West of Madrid in the mountains. At Pequerinos village, they hammered all morning with heavy artillery and air bombardments at the workers' positions.

Despite fierce resistance from the Government troops, Moors fought their way to the entrance of this shepherd village while a second enemy column threatened to cut off the workers' retreat by a drive between El Escorial and the village.

At nightfall El Escorial, objective of many days intensive fascist offensive, was still in Government hands.

Another fascist drive was launched North of Illescas when Italian "whippet" tanks incredibly fast and equipped with flame throwers and machine guns, tore into the workers' lines.

PUSH ON OVIEDO

Murderous fighting broke out again today in and around Oviedo when Asturian miners charged down from the mountains in a heroic new onslaught on the city. More than 2,000 are reported dead or wounded on both sides with the issue of the battle still undecided. Two more daylight air-raids on Madrid were carried out by eight giant fascist bombing planes. Roaring low over the city, they rained death on crowded suburban areas until finally driven off by Government anti-aircraft batteries.

BARCELONA, Wednesday, Oct. 28 (UP).—The semi-autonomous Catalonian government today issued a decree socializing all large industries.

Workers will assume complete responsibility for their operation, appointing boards of workers to direct them.

100,000 Join in Labor Party Rally

Thongs Cheer Speakers Who Call for American Labor Party as Permanent Organization—Lewis Calls Landon Puppet of duPonts, Liberty League

In one of the biggest political rallies New York has ever witnessed, more than 100,000 workers jammed Madison Square Garden, inside and out, in a demonstration called by the American Labor Party yesterday. Statements by various prominent speakers, calling for the continuance of the Labor Party movement as a permanent institution, from now on in this country, brought frenzied cheers from the huge throng.

UNIONS ACT ON RACKET CASE

Move to Prevent Dewey Probe from Turning To Drive on Labor

Local 302, Hotel and Restaurant Employees Union, two of whose officers have been indicted on charges of embezzlement and racketeering together with seven others, held a membership meeting Monday night to lay its plans to protect the union. At the same time, the rank and file of Local 16 of the same union, with three officers among the nine indicted, distributed leaflets to all members with concrete proposals for a united union with a clean administration.

Both local unions laid the blame for racketeering directly on employers and declared that action by union members themselves is the only possible method for eliminating these elements from the labor movement. Local 302 members packed the Palm Gardens Monday night, with

Liberty As Homage Is Paid to It, a Lonely Refugee Will Cross the Rio

As President Roosevelt speaks on Bedoes Island today at the Golden Jubilee of the Statue of Liberty, Otto Richter, anti-Nazi refugee from Germany, will cross the Mexico-U. S. border at Laredo, Texas, in the final stage of his long fight against deportation. Richter, who is being forced to leave the country because of his anti-fascist activities, has timed his departure to correspond with the nation-wide ceremonies on the 50th anniversary of the Statue of Liberty. Before leaving New York City, he attacked the withdrawal by the Department of Labor of the right of asylum for political refugees. A group of prominent scholars and churchmen protested against this reactionary trend to the President in letters last week.

A Letter from Browder

Dear Comrade W—, I take this opportunity to convey my thanks, on behalf of the Communist Party, for your fine response to my letter asking for contributions to the election fund. It is with deep pleasure that I write to you, the first to respond to my letter with your own personal contribution of \$1. What you contributed is important, since our campaign was and still is in urgent need of such support; but it is secondary to the spirit in which you wrote. You described your activities for our Party in the past (although you yourself are, as you say, "not yet a Party member"); you do not dwell at all on the sacrifice your contribution involves, although I know it must have been a sacrifice. You contribute unstintingly and promptly to what you rightly call "the only Party which has the deepest interests of the common people at heart and which fights constantly for their everyday needs and for a Socialist society."

Stockyards Workers Get Raise in Pay

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—The "Big Four" meat packing companies announced today that hourly wages and in some cases piece rates for 80,000 employees would be raised 7 per cent effective Nov. 2.

Repeated demands by workers suffering under two wage cuts since the crisis began, and made desperate by the high cost of living and reduction in working time per week was the reason ascribed by stockyards workers for the raise.

The companies involved are Armour, Swift & Co., Wilson & Co., and Gudaby & Co. They used their company unions and negotiations with their "employee representatives" as a means of announcing the change in wage rates. They then, today, issued a joint declaration that the present rescinding of previous wage cuts "is an achievement of our plan of employee representation."

FORD SPEAKS IN MILWAUKEE

Hathaway Also Slated to Speak at Rally Friday Night

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 27.—James W. Ford will bring the Wisconsin 1936 election campaign of the Communist Party to a close with a rally here Friday night at 8 o'clock in Plankinton Hall of the Milwaukee Auditorium. Clarence Hathaway, editor-in-chief of the Daily Worker, just returned from the Brussels anti-war congress, will also speak. Ford, Communist Party Vice-Presidential candidate, will report on his recent nationwide tour in which he found the first sprouts of fascism showing their heads in various parts of the country in the form of Jim Crowism and in suppression of civil rights by vigilantes working hand-in-glove with the local authorities.

HARLEM RENT STRIKE WON

(Daily Worker Harlem Bureau) A bitterly-waged rent strike by Negro tenants at 193 West 134th Street brought a smashing victory yesterday when the Holman Realty Co., landlords, were forced to abandon intended rent increases and immediately appeared at the house to make much needed repairs and to turn on steam. The three-week strike derived its main support from Local 1, of the Harlem Unemployment Council, of which Louis Campbell, Negro unemployed leader, is organizer. Tenants resisted a \$5 increase on a \$30 a month rent, and demanded repairs and heat. The victory followed a searching

Governor Promises To Probe Breakup of Browder Tampa Rally

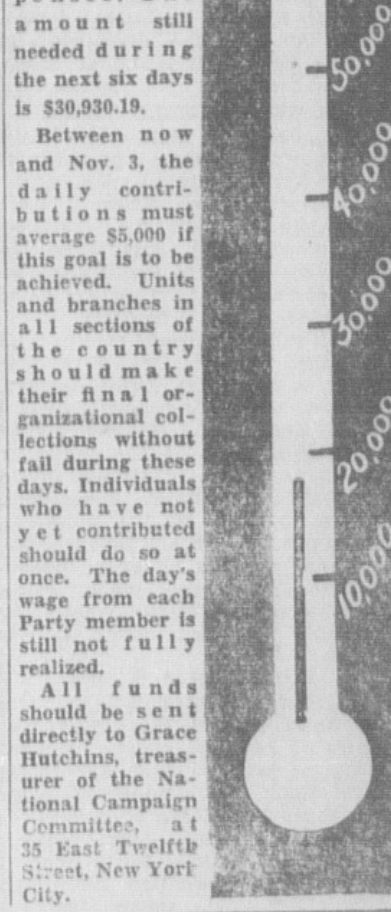
A "thorough investigation" of the breaking up of the Browder meeting in Tampa Sunday, was promised by Governor Dave Sholtz of Florida in a wire received yesterday by Anna Damon, acting national secretary of the International Labor Defense. Sholtz's wife, Miss Damon said, was in response to a protest against Sunday's events in Tampa. Removal of the local sheriff and police chief, and all officials responsible for failure to protect Browder's meeting was asked in the I.L.D. wire to Governor Sholtz.

Thousands of automobile workers rivals at the arena as they began streaming in long before the scheduled time for beginning of the rally. Huge portraits of the Communist standard bearers and of many famous historical personages in the American people's struggle for extension of their democratic rights, were placed throughout the arena, with bunting and flags forming a colorful background.

Ovation for Foster The attendance at the rally, the largest labor mass meeting ever seen here, was regarded as particularly significant, indicating interest in a progressive political program such as presented by the Communist Party.

# Vast Throng Responds Enthusiastically to Plea for Spain

## SEES WORLD DEMOCRACY IS AT STAKE

### Cheers and Donations of \$15,000 Greet Garden Speakers

That vast throng of more than 20,000 persons in Madison Square Garden, in its warmth and enthusiasm, seemed like a small intimate gathering stretching out its hands in fraternal embrace to the official spokesmen of embattled Spain Monday night.

The audience, deeply moved, and cognizant that they were listening to the voice of Spain—now fighting a life-and-death battle on the Madrid front in the interest of world democracy and peace—did not hesitate to respond to the appeal for help.

We have never before seen a meeting in New York where the Fascists and certain pro-fascist Catholic clerics had organized so well beforehand to try to discredit the government spokesmen, especially the standing of Father Luis Sarasola.

### LIVING REFUTATION

Father Sarasola was a living refutation of the vile and endless propaganda from fascist lie-factories in Spain and from certain quarters of the Holy See in Rome about atrocities against priests, God, religion, right, even the dictates in 1934 of the Holy See, demanded of his conscience as a Catholic and lover of democracy that he support the legitimate government of Spain, assailed by the forces of darkness and violence, declared Father Sarasola.

Violence against Father Sarasola was rumored before the meeting. More than rumor had it that certain Catholic fascists were to affront the brave priest. But the temper of the crowd, so fervent in its support of the heroic warriors defending Spanish democracy, seemed to have dampened the ardor of the plotters.

### HALL FILLED EARLY

The hall was filled early. At 8:15 you couldn't find a seat.

Bishop Robert L. Paddock opened the meeting promptly at 8. "Spain needs America. America will respond!" Great applause greeted his warning: "Tomorrow America may need the friendship of Spain."

Harry F. Ward, co-chairman of the evening who introduced the speakers, spoke with that conviction that comes from observation of the battle-front. Dr. Ward had recently been to Spain.

### DOMINGO CHEERED

He urged his listeners to demand of the American government that it permit the lawful Spanish government to get its rights here to buy the arms it needed to defend its liberty and world peace.

The whole audience rose to its feet, cheering, when Marcelino Domingo was introduced.

Domingo is known for his fight for Spanish democracy under the monarchy. As President of the Left Republican Party he speaks in the name of the President of the Republic—Manuel Azana.

As the cheering subsided, the cry arose in Spanish: "Viva Frente Popular!" Long live the popular front! The audience again cheered. POPULARLY ELECTED REGIME

Senator Domingo's speech, a masterpiece of simplicity in explaining the complicated history of Spain's struggle for democracy and why the criminal military-fascists assaulted the government, centered about one ringing fact. The present government is the legitimate, legally-elected government of Spain.

Senora Palencia then spoke. She addressed the American people as a mother whose son was even then at the front ready to give his life for Spanish democracy. "The militia marched to the front, often without arms, or only with sticks, with the cry: 'For the democracy of the world!' They knew they were not only fighting for Spain's democracy, but for the democracy of France, of England and of America," she said.

### "COME AND HELP SPAIN!"

She declared that the fascist powers want to seize Spain for its war materials and to speed way. "Oh, friends of America, come and help Spain!" she appealed. "Spain will win! And when she does win—I do not say if she does win—come and help us rock the cradle of a new democracy."

Then followed a sight rare in mass meetings. While Dr. Ward was about to introduce Roger Baldwin, secretary of the American Civil Liberties Union, who is later turned out was to take up the collection, donations began to stream up to the platform. Checks, dollar bills, nickels, pennies by the hundreds, the thousands were thrown on the speakers' rostrum. Even as he began to speak more money came.

The audience knew what was needed. It acted before it was asked.

### MORE THAN \$15,000

There was a check of \$2,500 from the International Workers Order; scores of personal checks for \$100. Workers gave \$5 and \$10—some their whole week's wages, \$25. One section in the balcony collected \$300, and then handed down another \$100. The Socialist Party local of New York contributed \$25. The Communist Party contributed \$100 declaring it had already raised \$12,000 and would raise thousands more.

The final report showed more than \$15,000 had been collected. Roger Baldwin declared the money was to go for food, clothing and medical supplies.

We quote his salient points, so gallant to those who try to speak for the Catholics in support of General Franco who can only bring Catholics in Spain what Hitler brought them in Germany:

"TRIPLE DUTY"  
"I have come here with my two colleagues sent by the legitimate government of Spain in order to explain what the real situation is in regard to our country. The government believes and believes very well, that the word of a citizen who is at the same time a Catholic and a priest and who knows his country is of great moral value to dissipate much false and prejudiced news which has been and being issued against Republican Spain. I come, therefore, in allegiance to a triple duty of conscience, in obedience to a government that has been legitimately constituted, love for my country and obligation to truth and to justice. . . .

"Everybody knows in Spain that the Basque region is almost entirely Catholic, and that there is no other section in the Catholic world whose Catholic feeling is stronger than ours. When this people, with all the fervor of their race, from the very first moment of the rebellion were opposed to the military and fascist uprising, they have adopted this attitude not only because they were defending their autonomous principles but because they were defending the Christian religion. . . .

"We are struggling to maintain the legal government of Spain, the nation because this is the duty of all citizens and of all Catholics."

## Lay Catholic Body Exposes Coughlin As Plotting for Dictatorship in U. S.

### BISHOP URGES BIG BUSINESS FIGHT C. P.

Bishop Noll Appeals to Industrialists to Aid Drive on Labor

High bishops of the Catholic Church are being backed by big business industrialists throughout the nation in their current anti-Communist drive, it was revealed today.

Just as rich land-owning bishops in Spain have sided with capitalists and fascist rebels, leading bishops in this country have cast their lot with high industry in a drive to quell the growing strength of progressives in the United States.

The Daily Worker has a copy of a letter sent to leading corporation heads throughout the nation by Bishop John Francis Noll of the Port Wayne Diocese in Indiana in which a frank confession is made of the similar interests of leaders of church and business.

"Now is the time for business and the Church to stick together in a common fight," reads one excerpt from the letter.

Bishop Noll, who is at present conducting a red-baiting campaign in his paper, The Sunday Visitor, confidently tells business men, whether native or foreign-born, in his appeal to big business to aid in the building of a huge statue of Christ in Washington as an answer to the growing movement for workers rights. Bishop Noll calls Christ the "stabilizing influence in our industrial system."

"As an American business man and industrialist, we ask you to support this movement," the letter reads. "The corporations of the United States are the nerves and sinews of our national business. Communism would destroy them with a single blow."

Among the sponsors of the bishop's campaign is Miss Dorothy Day, editor of the Catholic Worker, who has pretended in her paper to defend workers' rights to organize and strike and to support a number of political prisoners. She has now joined with forces of big business and reaction in a typical Hearst red-baiting campaign against all workers.

### Japan Hastens Plan For Pacific Airline

GENEVA, Oct. 27.—Japan today sped military plans to cut the newly-established United States airway to the Philippines with a new airline from the South Sea Islands to the mainland.

In announcing its plans, the Japanese claimed as one of the reasons for the line "observations of the movements of fish there" but diplomats believe the line is mainly for military purposes.

### Pastor Scores Ban on Browder in Terre Haute

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—"The issue is the Bill of Rights," declared the Rev. Howard Stone Anderson, pastor of the church President Coolidge once attended, in a sermon recently scoring the action of Terre Haute authorities in barring Browder from speaking.

Rev. Howard is pastor of the Washington First Congregational Church.

He called on all his church members to take a stand for civil rights, and denounced Nazi restrictions on Protestant churches in Germany.

"When we get to the point of trying to suppress presidential candidates we are facing an issue," the pastor insisted.

"And the issue isn't Communism, or any kind of political doctrine," he said. "It's the issue of the Bill of Rights. Folks must have the right of free opinion."

### Tammany Hall Paper Pushes War on Labor Attempts to Stampede Churches into Drive on Progressives

The crudest sort of anti-Soviet, pro-fascist and anti-labor slanders featured the latest edition of the Tammany New York Enquirer.

Its editor and publisher, William Griffin, who boasts of his close friendship with Hearst, outdid Hearst himself with a screaming top headline claiming that 15,272 priests and nuns had been killed by the Spanish government. Griffin refused to recognize the absurdity of such a thing being done by a government, 90 per cent of whose supporters are Catholics!

The fascist Father Charles E. Coughlin got a good place in the paper, and another page-long headline claimed that Soviet spies were operating "in a nearby military post" of the American army.

All these fairy tales led up to pages of material attempting to stampede the churches into an anti-Communist, anti-Soviet, anti-labor crusade last Sunday, on the anniversary of the Feast of Christ the King.

Proof that this "Red Scare" was to whip up violence, not only against Communists but against all who aren't for London and Hearst is given by the fact that in this very edition of the New York Enquirer, the main story was on Al Smith's Pittsburgh speech and the biggest headline of all screamed: "Smith Says, 'Send Turwell to Russia on a 1-Way Ticket.'"

## POWERS SEEN GANGING UP ON MADRID

### Seek to Blame Soviets for Breakdown of Hands-Off Pact

LONDON, Oct. 27.—An attempt to throw responsibility for the breakdown of the Spanish Non-Intervention Pact on the Soviet Union will be made by the delegates to the International Non-Intervention Committee tomorrow, it is believed here.

Portugal's grotesque accusations that the Soviet Union is responsible for the fighting in Spain may receive support from other nations, including Great Britain. Efforts will be made to cover up charges against Germany and Italy who have supplied arms to the fascists in Spain, by opening a diplomatic offensive against the Soviet Union, it is thought.

### Portugal Threatens To Quit Committee

LONDON, Oct. 27.—Portugal tonight threatened to withdraw from the Spanish Non-Intervention Committee. The move followed by only a few hours its diplomatic recognition of the Spanish fascist regime of General Francisco Franco.

### Baby Marathon Threat

The heading of the article reads: "Germany takes the Lead Against Moscow." Under this we read: "Goebbels Before the Party Con-

gress: 'WE ARE SHOWING THE WORLD THE TRUE FACE OF MOSCOW.'

Attempting to prove that foreign visitors to the Soviet Union are fooled by faked conditions, Goebbels quotes from the "Forward" to belie the observations of Edouard Herriot, the famous Radical-Socialist leader of France, who visited the Soviet Ukraine during 1933 and saw no signs of "hunger and terror" about which the fascist and anti-Soviet press was howling so madly.

"Herriot's student-trip" during the hunger period of 1933 is an especially crass example," Goebbels ranted, "of how the brainless politician of the liberal West was taken in by Soviet propaganda. On this the New York Jew newspaper, 'Forward,' which is surely not to be suspected of pro-Nazi sympathies, writes:

"The day before the arrival of the delegation the entire population of Kiev was mobilized at two o'clock at night—to clean up the main streets and to decorate the houses. Tens of thousands of hands strove

madly to give a European aspect to the filthy and neglected city.

"All food distribution centers, cooperative stores and the like were closed. Queues were forbidden. The degenerate hordes of neglected children, the beggars, the hungry, all disappeared from the face of the earth. At the street-crossings, proud militiamen were mounted on curbs-crowded horses, with white ribbons flowing from their manes—a picture never seen by Kiev before or since."

This piece of despicable lying is so blatant, so unscrupulous, so counter-revolutionary in its implications, that the Nazi Minister of Propaganda can quote it approvingly!

But Dr. Goebbels in the same speech characterizes the position of the "Forward" quite well. In (2), Goebbels declares:

"The question of Bolshevism is above all the question of the continued existence of Europe. Here roads part, here one must take a stand either for or against, and that with all the consequences such a decision carries with it."

All Jews, all progressives, can only denounce the vile slanders of the "Forward," which are one with the filth of the Hearst press in this country and the Nazi-Fascist press in other lands.

## POWERS SEEN RECOGNIZING 'CONQUEST'

### British Say France, U.S. Have Been Asked to End Addis Legations

LONDON, Oct. 27.—Britain, France, the United States and other powers now contemplate the final betrayal of Ethiopia to Mussolini by tacitly recognizing the Italian "conquest," it was learned here today.

British Foreign Office sources revealed that foreign powers have been approached to withdraw their Legations from Addis Ababa and establish Consulates in their place.

### Blum Government Approves Plan for A Larger Air Force

PARIS, Oct. 27.—The French Government met fascist war threats in Europe today by approving an immediate program for increasing and strengthening France's air force.

Official sanction was given to modernize the air service—increase the number of fighting planes at a cost of 50,000,000,000 francs (\$230,000,000).

### U.S.S.R. Unions Have Given \$9,519,065 To Aid Spanish People

(By Cable to the Daily Worker) MOSCOW, Oct. 27.—Workers of the Soviet Union have contributed 47,585,318 roubles (\$9,519,065) for food and supplies for women and children of Republican Spain, the Central Committee of the Soviet Trade Unions announced here today.

Funds are still pouring in, said the announcement, and food and clothing have been despatched on five steamers. The Soviet steamer Ziriann has sailed from Barcelona on the return trip to the Soviet Union, and was given a great send-off by Spanish workers.

### Border Forts Seen New Move By Belgium

Fortification of French Frontier Expected—Army Increased

BRUSSELS, Oct. 26.—Following King Leopold's declaration of Belgian "neutrality"—implying cancellation of defensive agreements with France against aggression by Germany—fortification of the Franco-Belgian frontier is anticipated here.

While Socialist Foreign Minister T. T. Spaak declared "Belgium will continue to observe her treaties," it is believed nevertheless that the Belgian Government will call on Parliament to vote huge credits for forts along the French border.

Increase in the term of compulsory military service from twelve to eighteen months is also expected.

### The Ruling Class Mrs. S. Shakes Husband for King

IPSWICH, England, Oct. 27 (By Transatlantic Telephone).—Behind bolted doors and with the public excluded, Mrs. Wallis Simpson, American-born friend of King Edward VIII, was granted a divorce today from Ernest A. Simpson, her second husband. While the hearing was in

progress, the King was discussing his coronation, the Indian Durbar, and conferring orders of nobility at Buckingham Palace.

Mrs. Simpson won a decree nisi, which can be made absolute in six months. She charged infidelity, two waiters from the Hotel de Paris at Bray, on the Thames between Maidenhead and Windsor Castle, testifying that they saw Simpson in bed with a woman there on the mornings of July 22 and 23 last.

The divorce went through with amazing speed, 17 minutes after Mr. Justice Sir Anthony Hawke ascended the bench. The proceedings were routine, the witnesses well-rehearsed. Mrs. Simpson, the two waiters and a porter testified smoothly and glibly. When the evidence was concluded Norman Bir-kett, counsel for Mrs. Simpson, asked the court for a decree nisi, with costs against Simpson.

Justice Hawke, apparently weary of the pre-arranged proceedings, replied tersely: "I suppose so."

BRITISH PRESS MUM The name of the co-respondent was not brought out in court. It was contained in the petition, however, which merely specified a "Miss Kennedy," with no address given.

Just as the public was excluded from court, so are the newspapers burying the divorce most inconspicuously, with no mention whatever of Mrs. Simpson's friendship with the king or the persistent rumors in high social circles that they might be married.

To avoid bringing out the name of "Miss Kennedy" in court, the two waiters merely testified that the woman they saw in a double bed with Simpson was not Mrs. Simpson.

## NAZI U-BOATS IN MALLORCA AID FASCISTS

### Reich Sent Planes and Soldiers to Island on Oct. 19

PARIS, Oct. 27.—Fifteen German submarines, five bombing planes and an infantry contingent entered the Mediterranean Oct. 19 to join Italian forces on the Spanish island of Mallorca, declared Genevieve Tabouis, well-informed foreign news expert of the Radical-Socialist paper L'Oeuvre here today.

The submarine commanders were given orders to "attack instantly any ship of whatever nationality, which approaches Mallorca," adds Madame Tabouis.

### Fascists Get Recognition Of Portugal

### Follows Severing Relations with Spanish Government

LONDON, Oct. 27.—The fascist Portuguese Government has officially recognized the Franco fascist regime at Burgos as the Government of Spain, it was learned here today.

While the report still lacks confirmation, this new pro-fascist move by the Salazar cabinet at Lisbon is considered likely, as the Portuguese Government last week broke off diplomatic relations with the official Spanish Government at Madrid.

### French Cabinet Okays Veneral Disease Bill

PARIS, Oct. 27 (UP).—Following up a program of drastic social reforms, the French cabinet today approved a bill for presentation to parliament making the transmission of venereal diseases a criminal offense.

The law would provide for the strictest control, practically resulting in the closing of many houses of prostitution, which number thousands.

### Nazis Build Giant Planes To Span the Atlantic

BERLIN, Oct. 27 (UP).—Luft-hansa, German commercial aviation enterprise, is building two new big hydroplanes which will be used in regular mail service across the North Atlantic, it was learned today.

The new planes have four Diesel motors of 550 horsepower each and will be capable of a speed of between 170 and 180 miles an hour. They are being built at Hamburg.

It is planned that they will fly to New York via Lisbon and the Azores instead of via Travemunde. At Lisbon mail which they carry will be turned over to land planes which will fly to Frankfurt and Berlin.



# Coke Field Poll Against G.O.P.

### Steel Trust Subsidiary Seeks to Garner Votes For G.O.P.—KKK Chiefs Set Tone of Anti-Labor Groups, But Members Seen as Opposing Rule

By Art Shields

UNIONTOWN, Pa., Oct. 27.—The H. C. Frick Coal & Coke Co., powerful subsidiary of the United States Steel Corp., is fighting to save as many votes for Landon as possible in Fayette County, heart of the Pennsylvania coke fields. The coke field vote may swing the state electoral vote either way.

But nearly all political observers predict that this great captive mine region will go against the G.O.P. machine because the G.O.P. machine means Frick, and Frick spells slavery.

Landon may do better in adjoining Somerset County, where a large farming population has been less influenced by the workers' anti-Landon sentiment than is the case in the more developed coke region.

EFFECT OF U.M.W.A.

"The United Mine Workers has changed the whole political situation in the coke fields," conceded J. O'Neill Kennedy, editor of the News-Standard, a cautious Democratic newspaper.

"Before the United Mine Workers organized such a large percentage of the captive miners here three years ago the Frick Company cracked the whip over the workers in all its mines. Superintendents told the men whom to vote for and foremen stood at the polling places to see that they carried out orders."

STRANGE BEDFELLOWS

The Frick Company still influences the vote of many miners, but it dare not do it quite so brazenly this year. This pressure varies in force with the strength of unionism in a given mine. Where the United Mine Workers are weak and the company union "Brotherhoods" larger, the superintendents will muster a considerable Landon vote. Strange bedfellows are found in the Republican camp here. Frank Farrington, ex-president of the Illinois district of the United Mine Workers, is among them. Frank Farrington, who was driven out of the mining industry when his secret \$25,000 a year contract with the Peabody Coal Co. came to light.

MARTIN RYAN

Farrington has been speaking for Landon in southwestern Pennsylvania, telling the miners that he too was once a miner, and as a miner he assures them they should put their faith in Mr. Landon.

Stranger and sadder is the case of Martin Ryan, leader three years ago of the great strike of captive miners. Ryan, now is a forman on a relief job, asks workers to vote for Landon in order to balance the country's budget.

This is not impressive. As one Fayette County worker puts it: "I'm more interested in balancing my own budget." Ryan's motives in supporting Hearst's Candidate are not fully understood by his former followers. His resentment against Lewis, who opposed his former strike activities, has led him into the same political camp as the strikebreaking Frick Company.

KKK FOR LONDON

More important support for Landon is coming through the leaders of the newly-formed Federation of Secret Societies, a red-baiting organization, which merged nineteen organizations last summer. The Ku Klux Klan is a leading figure in the Federation, and its anti-labor, anti-Catholic policies set the tone for the new organization.

With the Klan in the Federation are the Daughters of the Revolution, the Junior Order of American Mechanics, the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Knights of the Maccabees, the Knights of Malta and a group of societies.

MEMBERS NOT FOR LONDON

A bunch of Republican machine men at the top of this group are working hard for Landon, but it is doubtful if they will control the majority of the rank and file.

William Hynes, president of District No. 4 of the United Mine Workers and leader here of Labor's New Partisan Political League is sure the Federation's chiefs do not speak for the masses below.

"There are a lot of good union men in the rank and file of such an organization as the Junior Order of American Mechanics," Hynes told me, "and you'll find that they are not taking their politics from the Federation's leaders."

RED-BAITING A FLOP

The Federation uses a lot of red paint in this campaign. It tries to paint the whole Democratic opposition red. Last summer it conducted a fantastic flag-burning ritual, burning the red flag in an outdoor ceremony.

And on another occasion it succeeded in getting a hall owner to cancel a meeting scheduled for the Communist Party. The kick-back from this attack on free speech was damaging to the Federation's prestige. Judge Dunbauld, an old-fashioned Jeffersonian Democrat spanked the red-baiters soundly as "super-heated patriots" in a stinging declaration soon afterwards.

The name "Super Heated Patriots" stuck.

And friendliness towards the Communists rises among the masses here as they find that they and the Communists have the same enemies.

Louis Stark, in charge of the office in the absence of Charles Payne, stated this is due to the fear of the steel companies and the splendid progress made in all steel shops in the Buffalo area. He also intimated that all organizers have been followed and watched in their daily work. Ross, one of the organizers, said four lodges have already been established here.

Despite all efforts by the company to keep workers from joining, as expressed in the efforts of Republic Steel to force them to sign cards joining the Surety League, a company union hundreds of workers are joining the A.A. "We have contacts in all departments at Bethlehem," said Ross, "and established eight locals in Canada.

"Our answer to thugs will be even a bigger campaign," said Stark as he commented on the meeting recently held in Lackawanna. Stark and Ross expressed indignation at the withdrawal of a hall for the Browder meeting and will appear tonight on committee to protest such action.

## Labor Board Names Guild In A.P. Case

### Rules Newsmen's Union as Bargaining Agent—Case in U.S. Court

The American Newspaper Guild is the exclusive bargaining agency for editorial employees of the Associated Press, by a new ruling of Walter Wilbur, trial examiner of the National Labor Relations Board made public yesterday.

Wilbur recommended the board direct the Associated Press to "cease and desist from refusing to bargain collectively with the American Newspaper Guild, the representative of its editorial employees other than executives, at its New York City office."

The "A.P." has ten days in which to file with the board a detailed statement showing what it has done to carry out the instructions of the board.

This is part of a long struggle which has been carried on both in the N.L.R.B. sessions and also in the federal courts. Editorial employees of the "A.P." have voted 81 to 30 to be represented by the Guild. In the latter part of July, after one decision in favor of the Guild by N.L.R.B., the attorneys for the Associated Press answered a Guild request to negotiate a collective agreement: "The Associated Press cannot receive you nor enter into any collective agreement of the sort which you announce as your objective."

Wilbur's subsequent investigation resulted in his reporting that the Associated Press had violated sections of the National Labor Relations Act. The press service has appealed to the U. S. Supreme Court on the grounds that the act is unconstitutional. The Supreme Court will pass on the constitutionality of the law in its sessions beginning Nov. 9.

### 18 Perish as Gale Sweeps British Isles Northern Europe

LONDON, Oct. 27 (UP)—A gale reaching a velocity of 92 miles an hour swept over the British Isles and Northern Europe today, taking at least 18 lives, injuring dozens of persons and doing considerable property damage.

Ships were imperiled and two were believed sunk. Twelve British military planes were destroyed. The lightship in the mouth of the Elbe River in Germany sank with a loss of 15 of her crew. English lifeboats sought in vain for an unidentified vessel reported to have sent out distress signals 10 miles eastward of Skegness.

## Coast Station Refuses Communist Broadcast

### San Diego Party Protests to Federal Communications Commission on Bar After Attack Last Week on Election Campaign Speakers

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Oct. 27.—After a vigilante raid last week had wrecked Station KXO and a mob, with two policemen looking on, beat Esco Richardson, Communist candidate for Congress, and Mrs. Bessie Keckler, nominee for State Assembly, station officials today refused the Communist Party time for a second broadcast.

The Communist Party has protested by wire to the Communications Commission at Washington demanding an immediate allotment of time on the station.

Identity of the vigilantes has been made by a number of business people and prosecution of the thugs will be asked under the Lindbergh kidnap law.

Richardson was pelted with eggs and stones were thrown in his direction by the mob while Mrs. Keckler was knocked down, kicked and punched by hoodlums. She sustained numerous bruises.

Six men were acquitted today in Santa Rosa on charges of assault, kidnaping and conspiracy growing out of the attack on Jack Green and Sol Nitzberg during the fruit strike last year. The jury was out only 16 minutes.

### Whitewings Stop Chicago Mayor's Wage Cut Scheme

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 27.—Threatened use of WPA workers to reduce street sweepers in Chicago to half-time wages were halted abruptly by the Street Sweepers Union, which said it would strike if Mayor Kelly tried it.

The plan was to put the street sweepers on three days a week, and pay them \$16.50, instead of the \$22 a week they get now. Streets would be kept clean the other three days by WPA workers. Streets aren't cleaned on Sunday, which imparts a powerful odor of garbage to the Loop on warm days.

Mayor Kelly said his intention was to save money by letting the federal government pay the bills for cleaning streets.

The International Brotherhood of Teamsters told the mayor, and an almost unanimous vote of the street cleaners upheld the statement, that \$16.50 was not living wages, and they would strike if the mayor tried his wage smashing scheme. It was abandoned.

### 25 PER CENT OF SHOPS VIOLATE PENN LAWS

RACINE, Wis., Oct. 27.—Pickets were thrown around the J. I. Case Company here today, which locked out 1,700 employees last week. The lockout followed a sit-down strike in protest against discharge of 500 men who had joined the United Automobile Workers' International Union.

The company manufactures heavy farm machinery.

### NEW CHICAGO UNION PAPER FOR C.I.O.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 27.—A new, progressive trade union paper appeared in Chicago last week, and is being sent to every local division of the streetcar men's union, with whose interests the paper is concerned.

## LEGION POSTS REPUDIATE TAMPA MOB

### A.F.L. Leaders Score Attack on Browder to City Officials

TAMPA, Fla., Oct. 27.—The booming effects of the disruption of Earl Browder's meeting Sunday today obliged the four local American Legion posts to repudiate any connection with the disgraceful hoodlumism perpetrated by men wearing American Legion caps.

Joint resolutions were adopted by the four posts as local newspapers branded the prevention of Browder's meeting as "stupid" and as "giving Tampa a black eye before the nation."

Meanwhile, three Tampa officers of the law—Constable Fred Newberger, former Deputy Sheriff Lawrence Ponder, and Deputy Constable John Frick—were released on bonds of \$1,000 each to await hearings Nov. 27 on charges of inciting the disturbance that broke up the meeting and left twelve persons badly injured. The warrants were sworn out by Albert Simmons, Florida secretary of the International Labor Defense.

The flagrant breaking of the peace by the officers paid to preserve it has also had echoes in preparations under way for the national convention of the American Federation of Labor which is scheduled to open here Nov. 16. City officials have received telegrams from labor leaders forecasting possible "serious complications" in the arrangements for the convention as a result of the threat to civil rights implied in the storming of the Communist Party meeting.

"We publicly declare and affirm that any persons who participated in the violence (breaking up of Browder's meeting) did so without the knowledge and consent of the American Legion," the joint resolution of the four posts said.

TAMPA, Fla., Oct. 27.—Indignation is still here over the vigilante attack on the meeting at which Earl Browder, Communist Presidential candidate, was scheduled to speak last Sunday.

The Committee for Defense of Civil Rights in Tampa, in a telegram to the Mayor and Chief of Police of Tampa, and the County Sheriff, charged them with "deliberate neglect of their sworn duty to maintain order and to uphold the Constitution." The telegram continued:

"Such neglect could only come as a result of knowing beforehand that a lawless attack was to be made upon Mr. Browder's meeting."

### Rieve Queries Landon About Hosiery Firm

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Emil Rieve, president of the American Federation of Hosiery Workers, today challenged Governor Landon to repudiate the support of hosiery manufacturers who practice his much publicized "American way of living" by paying their employees \$ a week and by contributing to Nazi organizations.

In an open letter to Governor Landon, Rieve said in part: "We want you to speak directly to your higher priced customers including a certain large manufacturer of women's hosiery paying many girls as little as \$8 a week—

the Berkshire Knitting Mills of Reading, Pa. Its name is known throughout the State of Pennsylvania as your supporters. It is already known they have contributed at least as much to the Republican Campaign Fund as 156 of their \$8 a week girls receive in wages in a month.

"They are also contributors to the Liberty League, so they are doubly supporters of your 'American way of life'—whatever that is.

"They are also ardent pro-Nazis, and have contributed as much to a foundation to spread Nazi propaganda in this country as many hundreds of these \$8 a week girl workers receive in a month. So they are triply the supporters of something which you may or may not support.

"Is this the 'American way of life' which you and your supporters want to inaugurate or maintain in America? If it is, the citizens of the country have a right to know it."

### Cat-Eyed Cop Gets Victim: Says Unemployed Stole Water

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 27.—A policeman with cat's eyes, capable of seeing in pitch blackness, and another who admits he was not on the scene, convicted a man of stealing water, and violating building ordinances in Oak Lawn court, suburban Chicago.

Emil Zager was accused of tapping a city water main after his water system had been ripped out by the authorities.

Zager, father of seven children ranging from two months to 15 years in age, built himself a small house on a lot in Evergreen Park, Chicago. He is a contractor-carpenter by trade, but is unemployed and on relief.

Evergreen Park gets its water from Chicago. It is metered. Zager got the Blue Island relief station to pay his \$1 a month water bill, but for eight months the relief had refused to pay it. Zager's water was shut off. A trench appeared in his yard, and water in his house.

## Farmer-Labor Party Formed At Indianapolis

### State Organization Result of Conference—Bartee, C.I.O. Organizer and Candidate for Congress, Named President

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 27.—A rousing convention organized the Indiana Farmer-Labor Party here Sunday, with the slogan: "A clean sweep in '38. The Farmer-Laborites intend to take over a few city governments and the state in the 'off-year' election, and put some candidates in Congress as well. The Congressional drive is already on in South Bend, where John Bartee, C.I.O. organizer and Auto Worker delegate to the South Bend Central Union, is running for Congress.

"Eight farmers, led by the Secretary of the Indiana Farmers Union, represented that body at the organizing convention. One hundred and thirty thousand workers were represented through delegates from two Central unions, and 33 locals outside those cities. Terre Haute sent two officers of its Central Labor Union, and a Socialist Party member blood to the gathering. The Indianapolis Central Labor Union and the South Bend Central were there officially. The Indiana Workers Alliance had official delegates, and the State organizations of both the Communist and Socialist Parties were officially among the delegates.

### 8 ON F. L. P. SLATE IN OHIO COUNTY

CLEVELAND, Oct. 26.—The Farmer-Labor Party of Lake County, formed only seven months ago, enters the 1936 elections with a practically full slate of county candidates.

The eight candidates on the Farmer-Labor Party ticket represent all the important sections of the farming and laboring population. The county is predominantly agricultural.

The candidates were placed on the ballot by petitions containing five times the number of signatures required by the discriminatory election laws.

Louis W. Orgel, the other candidate, is a public accountant and manager of the Willoughby Retail Credit Association.

Yetta Land, candidate for County Prosecutor, outstanding L.L.D. attorney is widely known throughout the state for her successful defense of political prisoners.

### TEACHER A CANDIDATE

Edmund A. Anderson, candidate for county treasurer, is an ex-service man. He has been an active member of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners for 12 years.

Ruth Irene Adlard, a young school teacher candidate for State Representative, has played an active role in several educational, peace, and progressive organizations. She is an active member of the Local 427, American Federation of Teachers.

Raymond A. Tonere, candidate for recorder, has clerked in stores, worked in factories. At present he is a general life insurance agent.

Adolph Huber, candidate for clerk of courts, has long been prominent in all progressive community activities. A former member of the Machinists, and the Rubber Workers Union.

### TOWNSEND BACKING

The program of the Farmer-Labor Party and the outstanding record of the candidates was recognized by the Townsend Clubs that officially voted their endorsement. Members of the National Union of Social Justice have also expressed their willingness to support the F.L.P. candidates.

### CLOSE ALASKA SCHOOLS IN FEVER EPIDEMIC

KANAKANAK, Alaska, Oct. 27.—Schools at Snag Point and Clark Point were closed indefinitely today to prevent an outbreak of scarlet fever from spreading in the Mushagak Bay area on Bristol Bay.

### COUGHLIN GUARDS HALT SUIT SERVICE

ERIE, Pa., Oct. 27 (UP)—Father Charles E. Coughlin, Detroit radio priest, came here by automobile today protected by three bodyguards. They were purportedly employed to help him avoid Ohio process servers. The suit in which Father Coughlin supposedly was avoiding service was filed by John F. O'Donnell, of Pittsburgh, and asked the priest's removal as head of the National Union for Social Justice.

### 2,058,513 REGISTER IN BAY STATE

BOSTON, Oct. 27.—Registration in Massachusetts for the Nov. 3 election reached an all-time high with 2,058,513 persons eligible to vote, a tabulation in the office of Secretary of State Frederic W. Cook revealed today.

### G.O.P.'S LABOR SPIES INDICTED IN VOTE FRAUD

ALBANY, Oct. 27 (UP)—Three men, reputed election investigators of the Albany County Republican organization, were indicted today by the Grand Jury on perjury charges growing from an investigation into alleged registration irregularities.

### FOR LABOR ACTION

A resolution, unanimously passed, concerning the two union officers indicted, laid the blame for racketeering in the labor movement on employers and said that such an evil can only be eradicated by the labor movement itself. To investigate these charges and stop any employers' scheme to break the union, since such attempts have already been made, the resolution proposed:

1.—A committee of nine be elected, consisting of three members from the two branches and auxiliary, to investigate the charges against the two union officers and report back to the membership for such action as may be found necessary.

2.—That representatives from the international union, Bartenders Union, Central Trades and Labor Council, Painters District Council 9, Furriers Joint Council, International Ladies Garment Workers Union and United Hebrew Trades, be elected to advise and cooperate with the Local 302 investigating committee in the investigation.

### ENVOY ASSAILS REBELS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Reaction was blamed today for the fascist revolt in Spain by Francisco de los Rios, new Spanish Ambassador. Low wage scales and lack of liberty are the fundamentals of the government that the fascists are trying to put in power, he said.

### VATICAN DELAYS MOVE ON COUGHLIN

VATICAN CITY, Oct. 27.—Action by the Pope against Father Charles E. Coughlin's attacks on President Roosevelt will be postponed until after election day, it was reported here today. The Pope does not want it to appear that he is interfering in the election by disapproving Coughlin's actions.

### ENVOY ARRIVES IN STORM TROOP GARB

LONDON, Oct. 27.—A Nazi storm trooper uniform was worn by Joachim von Ribbentrop, new German Ambassador to England, when he arrived here yesterday to take up his duties. He hopes to get England behind a Hitler crusade against the Soviet Union, he told the press.

### FRENCH FASCISTS GET U. S. ARMS

PARIS, Oct. 27.—A recent shipment of sub-machine guns from the United States has been added to the secret armaments of the Croix de Feu fascist league, states the Socialist Party's paper Populaire.

who would have jammed the arena to its full 15,000 capacity and more were unable to attend because of the afternoon and night shifts at the motor car plants.

A high spot during the early part of the meeting was the demonstration which greeted Foster as he walked onto the platform. It was the veteran Communist working class leader's first appearance since four years ago when he came here during his tour as Presidential candidate.

### FOVAC ACCLAIMED

The ovation for Ford, who came with Foster from New York, was as enthusiastic as that for Foster, who has endeared himself to the industrial workers through his militant leadership of their movements for organization.

Smiling broadly with satisfaction at the reception given him by Negro and white workers, in contrast to the Jim Crow experiences he had in some places during his recent nationwide tour, Ford sat down after exchanging greetings with others on the platform.

### PRaises Tampa Workers

Browder and Frank came here today directly from Tampa, Florida, where a gang of men wearing American Legion caps stormed and disrupted an open-air meeting.

The Communist candidate's first words upon his arrival here were in praise of the several hundred Tampa workers who braved the night's vigilante threats to attend the meeting and defended their right to hear the Communist speakers.

"These workers certainly display-

### ed courage and fought gallantly," Browder said.

### SHOWS LONDON IS BOSSES' CANDIDATE

An interviewer asked a question about the Security Act, which has become an issue since employers, particularly the automobile magnates, are using the payroll tax as a weapon against Roosevelt by inserting in payroll envelopes a slip which warns employees that "a pay deduction" has been ordered by the government and that "they may never get it back." Referring to this insertion of slips in the payroll envelopes, Browder said: "It is a particular form of employers' coercion of the workers' votes, and is a most scandalous violation. It helps to identify London as the candidate of the employers."

"The Security Act is completely inadequate, a step typical of the middle-of-the-road course taken by Roosevelt. It infuriates the capitalists and yet gives nothing substantial to the workers. It establishes certain great principles which London wants to abolish, but it does not provide for any adequate realization of the principles it establishes."

### BLACK LEGION SOFT-PEDALED

The Lunden Bill, Browder said, is being proposed by the Communists in place of the Security Act.

Newspapermen asked him about the Black Legion, which is a current issue in Detroit's elections. Browder answered: "I have the impression that the exposure of the Black Legion has not gone to the heart of the thing. I saw signs of Black Legions in dozens of other parts of the country."

He mentioned specifically Terre Haute, certain parts of New England, Maryland and Ohio as places the Black Legion reaches.

"I saw clearly," he added, "that the candidates of both the Democratic and Republican Parties soft-pedaled the Black Legion expose."

leaders in labor circles and political life, took the speakers' rostrum one after the other, and called for the defeat of Gov. Landon for the Presidency of the United States.

### LEWIS GETS OVATION

The highlight of the meeting came when the chairman, Luigi Antonini, introduced John L. Lewis. A standing ovation greeted the mention of the name of the president of the United Mine Workers, and it was several moments before the thunderous demonstration of the crowd died down.

Lewis, his deep voice booming through the dozens of loud-speakers hung high in the Garden, began his speech by saying: "I salute the American Labor Party."

### BRINGS GREETINGS

"I came here today," the C.I.O. leader said, "to add my voice to those who have entered this great movement for the preservation of democracy. I come from labor's political trenches in Pennsylvania, where a great campaign is being waged by labor."

Lewis then greeted the Garden rally in the name of Labor's Non-Partisan League of Pennsylvania, and declared that "the electorate of Pennsylvania will vote for Franklin D. Roosevelt."

"There is no doubt, absolutely none," Lewis boomed through the microphone, "that the heretofore Republican state of Pennsylvania has at last come to a realization of the economic and political issues involved in this election campaign."

The United Mine Workers, the speaker said, had vowed at its last convention to throw its resources, man-power and money into the campaign to defeat the Liberty League candidates.

### ASSAULTS DU POINTS

Referring to Landon's recent campaign speech in Indianapolis, the C.I.O. leader declared: "Landon, in his Indianapolis speech enunciated the foreign policy of his party that left the people of America dazed. . . He said, in effect, that America, under a Republican administration will open the way for munition salesmen abroad—that the flag will follow the salesman, the navy will follow the flag, and the army will follow and back up the navy."

Veering his bitter attack to Landon's backers, Lewis characterized the duPonts and big American industrialists, as profiteers on bloodshed. Landon is duPont's hired man, the mine leader declared—and as the hired man of the industrialists, who exploit labor—"what do you expect of him?" Lewis asked the crowd.

### CALLS LONDON PUPPET

At one point of his thunderous charge against the Liberty League, Lewis paused and called Landon, "a watermelon boiled in a washtub." "He's as innocuous as that!" he declared.

"The Liberty League crowd had to journey a long way to find a candidate—all the way to Kansas," he said. "They found the little man, trained him, told him what to say, financed him, and then had the gall to exhibit him to the American people."

"Labor, and the people of America are facing a real danger," Lewis said. "Landon has sold himself to the oppressors of the American people. And he is backed by another danger to the people—a man detrimental and obnoxious—William Randolph Hearst."

### NO MENTION OF C.I.O.

Significantly, however, neither Lewis, Hillman, nor Dubinsky, all three top leaders in the C.I.O., made reference to the serious crises in the American Federation of Labor over the suspension of the C.I.O. unions.

Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia received a resounding welcome when he entered the Garden with a police escort shortly after John L. Lewis began his address. Speaking after Lewis, LaGuardia declared that "I am voting for Roosevelt under the emblem of the American Labor Party this election year."

### LEHMAN SPEAKS

The entrance of Gov. Herbert Lehman toward the end of the meeting was greeted by the crowd with a four-minute ovation. Both Governor Lehman and Senator Robert Wagner spoke and pledged their support of "progressive" legislation.

Governor Lehman charged that William F. Bleakley, New York State candidate for governor, has pledged his reactionary backers "a complete moratorium on labor and social legislation."

"The word 'moratorium,'" Lehman declared, "has a sinister and disturbing meaning for the wage-earners in this state."

The governor also lashed into the labor classes in the Republican platform, stating that they were written by "attorneys of the Liberty League, to protect the company unions of their employer-supporters."

### PLEDGES LABOR LAWS

Lehman also said that if re-elected he will strive for the elimination of detective-strike-breaking agencies in the state, and state regulation of fee-collecting employment agencies. It was a toss-up as to who got

### Lepe-Gurrah Trial Is Continued

The trial of Louis "Lepeke" Buchalter and Jacob "Gurrah" Shapiro continued yesterday in the Federal Court on a three-year-old indictment charging restraint of trade and racketeering in the rabbit skin industry.

The trial concerns the activities of the Protective Fur Dressers' Corporation, which has been indicted along with 22 other defendants, most of whom have pleaded guilty. The organization is charged in the indictment with using violence to enforce the racket.

The first day's trial was marked by a deliberate attempt to implicate the Needle Trades Workers' Industrial Union, fur division, now merged into the Furriers' Joint Council, by the Special Assistant to the Attorney General, John Harlan Ames.

Defending Rev. Luis Sarasola, Spanish Catholic priest who is being pilloried by the hierarchy, Dr. Harry F. Ward, professor at Union Theological Seminary, last night praised

ceeding for one priest to attack another priest on such flimsy grounds."

### HEARST AIDS ATTACK

Following Rev. Sarasola's speech at the Madison Square garden pro-Spanish government rally, he was the target for attacks from various reactionary sources, including the Hearst press and certain sections of the Catholic hierarchy.

Father Sarasola reiterated his good standing in the Franciscan Order and his contention that the Catholic masses of Spain are for the lawfully elected government and against the fascist invaders.

Pointing out that the whole Basque region in Spain, almost to a man, Catholic priests included, favor the government, Dr. Ward said:

### SARASOLA A BASQUE

"After all, there's no need to manufacture any reason. Rev. Sarasola is from the Basque country and that's reason enough for the fascists and friends of the fascist to attack him."

"Only a few days ago the Times had an article on the front page telling of the Spanish fascists' raid on a passenger ship. They found a Basque priest among the passengers, and shot him at once."

"That's the rule, not the exception among the fascists, because they know how the Basques feel about them. The Basques have been for the government because they know that only through a democratic government will they be able to achieve a measure of the rights which the fascists would abolish entirely."

"I would like to ask Rev. Sarasola's attackers one question: 'Why haven't they got one word to say about the fascists' shooting Catholic priests in Spain?'"

### VOTE AUTHORIZES STRIKE

The committee statement pointed out that a minority group of shipowners "depended heavily on subsidies they hope to get from the commission" for forcing a tie-up, whereas the non-subsidized companies were much more approachable and inclined to negotiate a settlement.

The Matson and Mercantile Marine Lines are ringleaders of the "die-hard" group, and are exactly the ones that are most subsidized.

Both the rank and file and the old machine in the Marine Firemen, Oilers and Watertenders' Union here nominated their candidates Monday night for the election ordered recently by Federal Judge Murray Harburn.

# City Jobless to Mass for Relief, WPA Demands Saturday

## WPA WORKERS HEAR AMTAR TALK TONIGHT

### Workers Alliance Rally Asks Bigger WPA, No Aid Cuts

A group of 300 unemployed, led by the Workers Alliance Seabeach locals, was driven out by two riot squads of police after the jobless had quietly walked into the Emergency Relief Bureau Precinct No. 60 station at Kings Highway and East 17th Street, asking relief for 100 cases.

At the Precinct 60 station, five women were badly beaten by the police who were summoned by Gerald Griffin, administrator.

A mass meeting gathered at the neighborhood seethed with indignation at Griffin's action. A committee was elected to present the cases of the 100 families, many cut off relief, others badly in need of help, some facing eviction, others already evicted.

Demands for adequate relief and WPA conditions will be made by New York unemployed at a mass demonstration by the New York Workers Alliance Saturday morning at 10 o'clock at Columbus Circle.

Jobless will ask for expansion of the WPA to include a million additional workers and will protest against the new program of cuts in relief started by Miss Charlotte Carr, executive head of the Emergency Relief Bureau.

Admission of these extensive cuts in relief in New York City during the last two months were made by Miss Carr yesterday in a statement of the number of cases that have been cut off relief rolls. During the week of Oct. 9, a record high for 1934 in the cases closed was reached by the bureau, with a total of 4,808 cut off relief.

### 10,000 DROPPED

The case load since Sept. 1 has dropped almost by 10,000, the Alliance contended, and the report by Miss Carr yesterday showed the estimate to be correct. There were 3,371 fewer cases in the month of September alone before the current case-closing drive started.

Action by the Workers Alliance to protest this drive which has resulted in mass starvation and misery was answered by police attacks on jobless with clubs and guns. Many have been jailed by police in the police assaults at district relief stations.

In the demonstration Saturday the Alliance will demand that these police attacks be stopped. The organization is asking a 40 per cent increase in relief payments to all clients, adequate clothing for the winter, and an increase of 25 per cent in the allowance for rent payments.

### FOR SOCIAL INSURANCE

Coupled with these demands is the fight for genuine unemployment insurance relief and a fight against the case-closing drive. The Workers Alliance also seeks to place the burden of proof for denying relief on the home relief bureaus.

In increasing the number of WPA workers, the Alliance asks the government to utilize the \$1,200,000,000 reserve fund which remains from last year's relief allotment. The abolition of all discrimination and arbitrary dockings for pay, and full payment for legal holidays is also demanded by the Alliance.

I. Amter, Communist candidate for President of the Board of Aldermen, and Herbert Benjamin, national secretary of the Workers Alliance, will speak at Webster Hall, 119 E. 11th St., tonight at 8 o'clock. Benjamin represents the National Unemployed Committee for Browder and Ford. This rally has been called especially for WPA and unemployed workers.

## Tampa Mob Barred Widow of Norman From Speaking at Browder Rally

### Complete Text of Speech Which Ethel Norman, Widow of Murdered Citrus Union Organizer Was Prevented from Giving by Legion

TAMPA, Fla., Oct. 27.—Ethel Norman, Communist candidate for U. S. Senate and widow of Frank Norman, I. L. D. leader and organizer of citrus workers who was murdered by vigilantes last year, was prevented from speaking Sunday afternoon when thugs broke up the meeting of Earl Browder, Communist candidate for President.

"The forces of social reaction . . . which depress the pay envelope," she says in a speech prepared for the Browder meeting, "have brutally tried to place the fear of violence in my own heart, but I am fighting still. I am fighting for myself, for my son. I am fighting for the Communist Party because it fights for us all."

The complete text of her address follows:

### IS FIGHTING ON

"It may or may not seem strange to you that I am the candidate for United States Senator on the Communist ticket. It seems the natural and logical step to me, because I have been through the fire—have been on the firing lines in the fight between the forces of real civil rights and liberties and those of social reaction.

"It has no doubt been the hope of the latter forces, those which depress the pay envelope, those which appear to think that a great nation can dwarf and kill, that I might just be treated as a casual, that my little son Frankie might be treated as a casual. LIKE MY HUSBAND. They did get him, my husband, and they have brutally tried to place the fear of violence and like treatment in my own heart, but I am fighting still.

"I am fighting for myself, for my son. I am fighting that such things as the murder of my husband shall not be again for any of you or for anybody anywhere, and I am fighting for the Communist Party because it fights a good fight for us all.

### ORGANIZING CITRUS WORKERS

"Yes, I am Ethel Norman, the widow of Frank Norman. Perhaps you know the facts and I shall try to mention them only in so far as they are of value to you in a social sense, in the sense that like him you are all workers. He had ideals for his fellow men.

## 100 Women Still Denied Union Rights

### Again Ask Zaritsky To Act to Help Them Get Union Books

One hundred women, millinery workers who have been union members for five years, are still holding "temporary" books.

These women have been shunted from pillar to post trying to get full membership rights in Local 24, United Hatters, Cap and Millinery Workers Union. Their plight has been brought to the fore by the publication of an open letter to union president Max Zaritsky by one of these workers, pointing out that they have not been permitted to attend meetings, hold office or in any way take part in any union activity. They have paid dues, taxes and assessments.

The letter to Zaritsky recites the events of the past years and the happenings at both the recent millinery and joint national conventions. In the past, the individual holders of these books were first told that the problem of "temporary" books was not individual. When the workers banded together, they again were refused membership privileges by Local 24 executive board. This same individual and then group procedure was taken with the general office. After many months the general office ordered Local 24 to handle the matter in a speedy fashion.

When the local set up a committee, Nathaniel Spector, Local 24 manager, denied its existence. Alex Rose, financial secretary, told the women that the committee didn't exist.

The open letter asks President Zaritsky why he, who told a committee of the women that he is opposed to the "temporary" books, took no action in the matter at the conventions.

## Harlem Unions Rally For Negro Butchers

### Negro Labor Committee Calls Conference for Friday to Map Plans for Extending Fight Against Discrimination in Harlem Shops

Rallying the whole of Harlem to its drive in behalf of underpaid Negro butchers, the Meat Cutters Union, Local 665, announced yesterday that a special trade union conference would be held Friday afternoon, at 2 o'clock at 312 W. 125th St.

The conference has been called by Frank Crosswell, Negro labor leader and chairman of the Negro Labor Committee. Conrad Kaye, a leader of the Meat Cutters, stated that the conference would map plans for extending the fight to end discrimination against Negro butchers and to secure recognition of the Meat Cutters Union.

### OTHERS INVITED

Among those who had been invited to participate in the conference, Kaye said, were: James J. Bramble, of the Building Service Employees Union; A. Phillip Randolph, president of the International Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters; Manning Johnson, local, 302, Cafeteria Employees Union; M. Gerriga, local 89, Cooks and Meat Market Owners; various locals of the Bakers Union; and others. Crosswell will report on the efforts of several labor unions assisted by the Central Trades and Labor Council to secure a revocation of the charter of the "Harlem Labor Union, Inc.," a group which meat market owners are using to protect their non-union shops.

### KNIFERS OUT ON BAIL

Sufi Abdul Hamid, Harlem "Black Hiller," and his accomplice Ollis McAlpin, leaders of the Harlem Kitchen Workers, various locals of the Bakers Union, are both out on bail after stabbing Hammie Snipes, Negro milliner worker, 10 days ago.

"He wanted citrus workers to have better pay, hours and working conditions, and so he was active in the United Citrus Workers' Union of Lakeland. So also he was the local leader of the International Labor Defense, a non-political organization concerned with the struggle for civil and democratic rights. And so, too, there was incurred the displeasure of the big citrus growers and shippers in Polk County, and so, too, there responded to that displeasure the noble knights of the Ku Klux Klan, those high-minded underworld gentry who at the behest of the powerful, or to satisfy their own savage lust, abduct, whip, torture and kill the defenseless victims of their beastly and depraved antisocial activities. My husband was abducted from his home on April 11, 1934. I do not need to tell you that he has not returned.

### CITES SHOEMAKER CASE

"The case of Frank Norman is in no wise different in its social and political import from the case of the late Shoemaker—from the cases of Poulton and Rogers—from the cases of the beaten, mangled and murdered workers elsewhere. Those cases must end through an awakened public conscience and through the influence and aspirations of the Communist Party of the United States.

"By the action of hostile social forces, I have been left alone to fight my own battles. All women should realize their peril, their need of organization, their need to secure equal opportunities, so that they may carry on either with or without their men. Because emergencies come and we have to meet them. We can all be brave but we must have opportunities.

"The reactionary forces in our state have no more in common with the principles of our democratic form of government than had the king of England against whom our forefathers rose up in arms. We are proud of Florida and we love our homes and our country, so let us all get busy and make conditions right. There cannot be a prosperous country without a prosperous people. A vote for the Communist ticket is a vote for a FREE, HAPPY AND PROSPEROUS AMERICA.

Workers of the Union Wire and Dye Company at 36th Street and 10th Avenue walked out on strike yesterday morning for recognition of Lodge 1548, International Association of Machinists; 50 cents an hour minimum; 15 cents increase for all new making 45 cents or over; the 40-hour week, and time and a half for overtime. The union has sent wires to three union lodges in Hamilton, Ontario, where the firm has another plant, informing them of the strike action. The union reports that three strikers at the Columbia Metal Frame Co. were arrested yesterday, two charged with disorderly conduct and one with assault. The men were released in the custody of the union lawyer. The case was set for Nov. 5 at the Essex Market Court.

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### BRONX BEAUTICIANS GET STRIKE AID

The beauticians are being aided by a number of organizations in their strike. In the Bronx, the Progressive Women's Council and Women's Union Label League is actively supporting the strike of Hairdressers Local 560-B at 895 Prospect Ave. The Communist Party has issued all workers: to help the strikers in any way possible. In Brooklyn, the Committee for the Support of Locked Out Workers asks that members of all organizations affiliated to the committee spend as much time as possible at headquarters of Local 913-C at 213 Eastern Parkway. Two Bronx pickets were fined \$5 each yesterday at the 161st St. Magistrate's Court.

### PHARMACISTS PLAN PICKET LINES

A midnight pre-strike meeting has been called for Thursday night by the Pharmacists Union at Elmore Hall, 170th Street and College Ave. The union has sent out 400 contracts to employers in the Bronx, Harlem and Washington Heights, setting October 29 as the deadline. The majority of the employers are expected to sign up. Picket lines will be set up before those stores that refuse to. The union demands are for a \$35 minimum for all registered pharmacists; \$25 for junior workers; and \$23.50 for cosmetic girls.

These reports cover only a small section of the Farmer-Labor movement, but they present an encouraging picture. And the trade unions, which must be the backbone of any Farmer-Labor movement, are definitely in the picture, with leading trade unionists running for Congress, state legislature and other offices.  
There is no doubt that with a final push in the last week of the campaign, many of these candidates can be elected.  
Here is an opportunity for Labor's Non-Partisan League. Though this organization

is campaigning for President Roosevelt (and for Governor Lehman in New York State), many of its leaders have indicated that they hope to build it into a genuine movement for independent political action.

There is no better way of doing this than for Labor's Non-Partisan League to support the local and state Farmer-Labor candidates, and help swing as many trade unions as possible behind these candidates.  
In this way a firm foundation will be laid for launching a national movement after the elections.

## A Powerful Force to Aid The Steel Union Drive

That was an inspiring gathering in Pittsburgh Sunday, when 500 delegates of fraternal societies representing 500,000 members pledged their staunch support to the drive to organize the steel workers into a powerful industrial union.

"This is one of the happiest moments of my life," declared Phil Murray, who knew what the action of the fraternal societies meant in terms of trade union organization. As chairman of the Steel Workers Organizing Committee, Murray understands the power of 500,000 men and women in fraternal societies of scores of languages, races, political and religious creeds, whose ties with the steel workers are so deep and of long-standing.

"We pledge you our help, brothers," solemnly resolved the delegates, "in building a powerful labor union to make the steel employers give you a richer life."

B. K. Gebert, chairman of the conference, and for his tireless efforts in behalf of the steel drive chosen as head of the permanent committee to lead the cooperation with the union campaign, touched the central issue.

Unity of all workers, regardless of race, creed or political views, is the central need in achieving the goal so ardently desired.

Those responsible for winning the support of this powerful auxiliary force in the steel drive are to be congratulated on their splendid impetus to the union campaign.

## Shipowners Are Responsible For West Coast Crisis

The Pacific Coast shipowners have, by their obstinate attitude, created a situation where 38,000 seamen and longshoremen may go out on strike after midnight tonight.  
What the men are demanding is, with a few additions, substantially what they won in the historic 1934 strike. And they have agreed to arbitrate everything except their two basic gains: the union hiring hall, and the six-hour day for longshoremen and eight-hour day for seamen.

It is the shipowners who are responsible for provoking the present situation. It is they who have tried to take advantage of the termination of the agreement in order to whittle down the gains of the workers.

The behavior of President Roosevelt's newly appointed Maritime Commission has been a disgrace. It has repeatedly given aid and comfort to the union-busting shipowners. It has sought to stall off the unions and trap them into accepting the employers' proposal that the present agreement continue for another year without the guarantees that the unions demand.

And now comes the payoff, with Admiral Hamlet, the Maritime Commission's representative, telling the joint negotiating committee of the unions that the Commission wasn't interested in the controversy at all!

The maritime unions have been extremely conciliatory and their demands modest indeed. Their struggle deserves the fullest support of the labor movement throughout the country.

## No Firings in the Merger. Edison Workers Demand

"Public convenience and necessity," is the guiding phrase used by Public Utility Commissions to O.K. the actions of utility trusts.  
Confronting the merger of the New York Edison Co. and the Consolidated Edison Co., the Utility Workers Union demands to know whether firing thousands of workers because of the merger will be a "public convenience and necessity."

Mergers increase profits. That's why the utility trusts want them. They don't cut down electric or gas rates. But they do get rid of a lot of workers.

Martin A. Wersing, president of the Utility Workers Union local, pointed out that when the United Electric Light & Power Co. was merged with the Edison Co., 700 workers were dumped out on the streets.

The union demands that this must not happen in the present proposed merger. Every worker, every person gouged by the electric trust, will readily and enthusiastically agree with the union.

The merger must not be allowed at the expense of hundreds of utilities workers. The workers' interests must be safeguarded first.

The Public Service Commission should hear from workers in every union in New York state insisting that the first condition of merger be the demands of the Utility Workers Union.

## World Front

A political crisis has gripped the West Coast of Latin America. Peru and Chile are in the throes of an anti-imperialist people's upsurge against the native ruling puppets of the various contending imperialist powers.

Persecuted on the East Coast, in Brazil and Argentina, the People's Front movement, rocking Latin America from Mexico to the southernmost tip of South America, has erupted with greater force, on the West Coast, especially in Peru and Chile.



In Chile, the People's Front, formed more than a year ago, has now become strong enough to threaten the existing cabinet.

A split in the Radical Party, the majority going over to the People's Front, with the consequent withdrawal of its leaders from the cabinet, is causing great anxiety in Rightist circles.

The Radical Party in Chile generally is similar to the Radical Socialist Party of France.

Their joining the People's Front (now comprising the Communist Party, the Socialist Party, and the party led by Marmaduke Grove—a former army officer, who has a strong following especially among government employees) would make the anti-imperialist, anti-Fascist bloc the strongest political force in Chile.

The next Congress of the Radical Party is expected to join up solidly with the People's Front.

Taking a leaf from the Spanish fascists' notebook, the Rightist government of Peru tried to forestall a Left electoral victory by first refusing to publish the election returns, and next by installing a military cabinet.

Elections were held on October 11 in Peru. But up to this moment no figures on the returns have been issued. And for a very simple reason: The left parties, which formed virtually a People's electoral front, won the overwhelming majority of the votes cast.

The outstanding party of the left is the Apra, a national reformist grouping with a strong national revolutionary wing, led by the famous author, Haya de la Torre. The Communist Party, which supported the left slate, after the Apra was barred from the balloting, has an important following among the Peruvian proletariat, especially the copper miners.

Instead of announcing the election results, the government resigned. General Ernesto Montague became premier and "Minister of Education," with a military cabinet.

Peru has always been one of the hottest battle grounds of the imperialist powers, the United States having the major share of investments, namely, \$200,000,000 out of \$300,000,000. Exactly who is pulling the strings today is difficult to say, the influence of John Bull and Wall Street being about equally divided. Japanese imperialism, of late, has gained a strong foothold in Peru.

When the Getulio Vargas dictatorship in Brazil, by murder and terrorism, with the help of British and American imperialism, drove the people's front Liberation Alliance underground, the imperialist exploiters of Latin America breathed a sigh of relief. They thought they had written final to the history of the development of the People's Front in South America.

They are learning now, however, that not even the highest Andes mountains nor the vilest terror of Getulio Vargas can stop the rapid sweep of the united anti-imperialist movement in Latin America.

Peruvian and Chilean political events are of the greatest significance in view of the approaching Inter-American Peace Conference, called by President Roosevelt, to open in Buenos Aires on December 1.

Thus far, the conference promises to be an American imperialist maneuver to win the South American countries to its policies in the face of the onrushing world war. Roosevelt proposes a sort of Latin American League of Nations.

The Nazis and Italian fascists, who have dangerous influence in official circles of Argentina, Uruguay and Brazil, immediately seized on the idea of the "isolation" of Latin America from general European and world politics as a means of hitting at the League of Nations and world collective action for peace.

The Mexican government and the Mexican trade unions, which favor participation in the conference, have raised the question of transforming the gathering into a real peace force. The Mexican Confederation of Labor, particularly, proposes that Latin America work with the rest of the peace forces of the world, such as the Soviet Union, France and the League of Nations. It warns against falling into the Hearstian trap of isolation.

The leftward sweep in Peru and Chile is proof that the Latin American people are uniting their forces against imperialism, and are of the mind of the Mexican trade union movement.

In fact, the official gathering at Buenos Ayres will be preceded by unofficial peace conferences that will arouse the Latin American people to independent action for world peace.

## QUESTIONS and ANSWERS

**Question:** Why hasn't the Spanish government used its gold reserve in the fight against the rebels instead of soliciting collections all over the world?

**Answer:** The Spanish government has used every available source at its command to defeat the fascists. Though apparently large (\$700,000,000) in ordinary times, in Civil War, the Spanish gold reserve becomes pitifully inadequate. It cost Mussolini more than \$1,000,000,000 to conquer Ethiopia, besides the billions of previous expenditure in preparing the fascist armed forces. All taxes and income to the legitimate government of Spain have virtually stopped, far exceeding the \$700,000,000.

Much of the gold has been pledged for credits in various countries and to preserve the stability of the peseta in order to offset an annihilating economic crisis. What appeared as a big reserve actually has dwindled to practically nothing in the way of being adequate to purchase the arms required.

Soliciting of funds is one of the highest expressions of international solidarity with the Spanish people in their fight against fascism. The \$9,000,000 raised by the workers in the U.S.S.R. has proved of tremendous help to the People's Front government. The millions collected by anti-fascists in England, France and the United States has not only stiffened the defense of the government, but has saved thousands of lives of wounded and by supplying clothing and food to the People's Army and the masses behind the lines.

The more funds we collect and the quicker the greater will be the possibility of the lawful, democratic government of Spain winning a resounding victory against fascism and its foreign war-inciting allies.

## Soviet Union Foreign Policy Founded on Winning and Maintaining World Peace

Victory in the great October Russian Revolution was won under the slogan: "Peace, Bread, Land!"

Now, on the eve of the 19th anniversary of that revolution, "Peace!" becomes the most stirring slogan of the whole world against the enemies of human progress.

From Brest Litovsk to the Battle of Madrid, the Soviet Union's foreign policy has been founded on winning and maintaining the peace of the world against the war aggressors for the ultimate victory of Socialism.

"The struggle for peace," declared G. Dimitroff, "is a struggle against fascism, a struggle against capitalism, a struggle for the victory of Socialism throughout the world!"

Since the founding of the first Socialist fatherland, the most reactionary capitalist countries have striven by war or counter-revolutionary civil war to destroy the U.S.S.R. and the revolutionary upsurge in other lands.

**FIRM PEACE COURSE**  
Against this threat, under rapidly varying conditions, the Soviet Union has steered firmly towards peace. A brief glance at the highlights of the Soviet peace policy will illustrate the principles and objectives of the Soviet Union's peace program.

**Nineteen twenty-one**—Treaties to maintain and work for peace were signed by the Soviet Union with Persia, Afghanistan and Turkey. At that time, this put great obstacles in the path of British imperialism to provoke war through these countries, and then to colonize the victims of their intended schemes.

**Nineteen twenty-four**—Treaties of peace with China and the destruction of the Czarist unequal treaties gave China its greatest impetus in the struggle for its liberation.

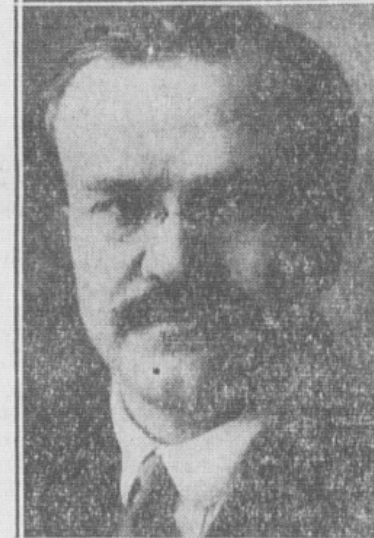
**Nineteen twenty-nine**—The Soviet Union was the first country to ratify the Kellogg Peace Pact. Thus, the workers' fatherland showed it was ready to utilize the desire of any capitalist country (in their various conflicts) to maintain the peace and to work collectively against war.

**FOR REAL DISARMAMENT**  
**Nineteen thirty-three**—At the Committee of the Disarmament Conference, the Soviet Union was the only country to put forward a comprehensive disarmament program. When this failed, the Soviet Union raised the struggle for peace to a higher level by giving to the world a new definition of an aggressor country and proposing to the peoples everywhere means of combating such prospective aggressors.

The only positive outcome of the World Economic Conference was the collective convention initiated by the Soviet Union with the Baltic States, Finland, Poland, Rumania, Turkey, Persia, Afghanistan, Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia.

**Nineteen thirty-four**—When it was clear the issue of disarmament was struck dead by the fascist powers, particularly Nazi Germany, the Soviet Union began to work against the gravest danger of war since 1914, by its demand and fight for collective security.

**FRANCO-SOVIET PACT**  
It asked that the Disarmament Committee be reorganized as a permanent Peace Conference. To pre-

vent Japan, Germany and Italy from speeding their war plans, the Soviet Union joined the League of Nations. Comrade Stalin's declaration that this, if it proved even the smallest obstacle to the war-mongers was justified, has been a hundred-fold confirmed.

The Franco-Soviet mutual assistance pact was signed. More than any other single deed this step of practical collective security has driven the war-mongers to frenzy. Hitler and Mussolini now realize that if they can smash this powerful peace advantage of the Soviet Union it would be easier for them to go to war with the hope of success.

**SOVIET PEACE POLICY**  
**Nineteen thirty-five**—Comrade Stalin stated the Soviet Union's peace policy as follows:

"Our foreign policy is clear. It is the policy of preserving peace, and developing trade relations with all countries. The U.S.S.R. does not think of threatening anyone, much less of attacking anyone. We stand for peace and defend the cause of peace. But we are not afraid of threats and are ready to return blow for blow to the war-mongers. Those who desire peace and seek honest relations with us will always have our support. But those who attempt to attack our country will receive a devastating rebuff, in order to teach them not to thrust their pigs' snouts into our Soviet garden."

The tremendous growth and development of the Red Army, the Red Fleet, the Red Navy gave ample proof to the war-mongers that the Soviet Union was ready to abide by its word.

**SPAIN'S CAUSE**  
**Nineteen thirty-six**—With the Italian fascist seizure of Ethiopia, and the Italian-German support to Spanish fascism the danger of war became graver than at any time since 1914.

The Soviet Union, after England and France had forced a "non-intervention pact" into existence, which it had joined with warning and in an attempt to put a brake at least on fascist shipment of arms to Spain, denounced the pact as a travesty and a scrap of paper shielding fascist aid to Spain.

While the Second International refused to act jointly against the non-intervention pact, while Blum remained silent on his own creation, while the British Labor Party leaders still tagged at the frock coat tails of the Tory cabinet, the Soviet Union moved heaven and earth to defend Spanish democracy as the main task in defending world peace.

### THE SITUATION TODAY

Those who attack the Soviet Union's peace policy go on the theory that nothing has happened in the world since 1914.

But really to understand and know how to help the Soviet Union in its great efforts for peace, one must realize that the general picture of the world in the struggle against war and for peace shows these outstanding features:

- 1—A proletarian state exists which is the greatest bulwark to peace.
- 2—Definite fascist aggressors are striving to begin a world war (Germany, Italy, Japan).
- 3—A number of countries are in direct danger of attack by fascist aggressors and of losing their state and national independence (China, Czechoslovakia, Belgium, Rumania, France, Yugoslavia, Spain).
- 4—Capitalist governments exist which at the present moment are interested in the maintenance of peace.

### COLLECTIVE SECURITY

In this situation, the Soviet peace policy lays the basis for COLLECTIVE action, for collective security pacts and for regional security pacts.

That successes in the Soviet Union's peace policy have made it more difficult for the fascist aggressors both to prepare for and initiate the war they strive for is clear to everyone. Delay arouses the mass forces within the fascists' own countries against war, as for example the growing economic difficulties and fascist-induced hunger of the masses in Germany and Italy.

### FASCISTS SEEK WAR

At the same time, the desperation of the fascists breaks all bounds. They know beyond all doubt that the majority of the world's population is against war, fervently desires peace, and that the Soviet Union's peace policy must gain greater support with time.

Hence, the fascists come out more openly with their war alliances; Japan and fascist Germany; the Nazis and Italian fascists; the move of Belgium in the interest of Nazi war policy. The fascists, through their so-called Four-Year Plan, and the new economic dictator, Minister of Air Goering, speed their war plans to the exploding point.

The 19th anniversary of the Soviet Union, most inspiring because of the great Socialist achievements, is at the same time the most ominous because of the active steps to immediate war by the world's war-mongers.

As November 7 nears we must strengthen our guard for the defense of the Soviet Union, which means primarily the defense of peace.

Every step of human progress, of revolutionary advance, of democracy and Socialism is bound up with the preservation of peace. That means it is inextricably tied up with the peace policy of the Soviet Union.



# Heroines of Today Are the Communists

### Courageous Women of the West Fight Jail and Physical Assault in Struggle for a Happy and Prosperous Land

On Friday night I shall be able to speak to all the women of America whom I could not meet face to face. Over the red network of the National Broadcasting Company, I will bring you the message of the Communist Party.

But let me tell you about my tour here, because I am afraid that too little time will be given me on the radio to bring you all the glorious details of my campaign.

The most striking feature of my campaign in the West and also in the South, was the tremendous increase of active political participation of women, in the building of a United Front—a Farmer-Labor Party. In Arkansas, where Willie Sue Blagden was so brutally beaten by vigilantes, we held some remarkable meetings with the Ozark farmers—men and many women—living for many generations in these bare mountains.

At the meetings arranged by the Southern Tenant Farmers Union, all the women of the mountain were there to hear my message of hope and courage. In the Tennessee mountains, 50 miles from Chattanooga, at the Highland school, we found many women coming for miles to hear the story of our campaign. Fifteen members of the mountain Y.C.L. joined in the meeting in greeting me. Here, in Tennessee, we have a United Front of Socialists and Communists supporting the women candidate for Governor on the Socialist ticket—Kate Stockton, who makes the main issue of her campaign the "sowing of the seeds for a Farmer-Labor Party."

**California's Terror**

In California, six brave young men and women are serving sentences from one to 14 years for organizing and winning better conditions for the starving Agricultural workers. The vicious Criminal Syndicalist Laws and other anti-labor legislation have roused the women everywhere. Agricultural workers also have been influenced to join their protest against the terror now being used against all workers who dare to organize in that state.

The campaign of the Communist Party has attracted thousands of workers in every city and town of the Far West. Emma Cutler is the Communist Party candidate for Congress in Kramer's district.

Kramer is the notorious author of the "Kramer Bill," the most vicious of all un-American Bills now awaiting to be introduced in Congress. In Kramer's district, Emma Cutler is making a really smashing campaign. She herself, a victim of California's Syndicalist Law, is suffering in a vile hot jail in El Centro, under sentence for six months, for organizing agricultural workers in Imperial Valley.

In Northern California, Anita Whitney, who at the last State election polled 100,000 votes for the Communist Party—enabling the Party to go on the ballot as a regular legal party—is now conducting a vigorous campaign as a candidate for Congress on our Party ticket. The women have formed united front groups everywhere to support her. They are raising money for local and state radio talks, and mobilizing their various groups to listen to our National Broadcasts.

**On the United Front**

In Southern California, the chairman of the Women's United Front Committee for the campaign is a member of the Epic Party, and the Utopian women and others are also mobilizing for our radio programs.

In San Diego, the woman candidate on the Communist Party ticket, Assembly, Beesie Keckler, talks over the radio every week. She tells the listeners that her forefather's came to the new world from Ireland, Scotland and England long before the Revolutionary War for independence; "ought and died that our country might be free from oppression; therefore, she says, I would be false to the revolutionary traditions of my ancestors, were not I fighting bravely on the side of the exploited millions."

Nor is he content with a newspaper racket that nets him millions while his press slanders the workingclass and supports the reactionary Liberty Leaguers. His copper mines, his silver mines, all the fabulous wealth which he has built on exploitation and cruelty—they are still not enough. Now he's gone into the canning business.

Our readers may have seen the advertisement which burst upon the American public two weeks ago introducing the Hearst Ranch Brands which took the life of Willy's life of food. The canned goods are endorsed by the Good Housekeeping Bureau—a little bit of inner office cooperation. Good Housekeeping Magazine and Bureau belong to the Hearst interests. Naturally they endorse Willy's latest venture. It seems that even food isn't safe from Willy.

The advertisement announces that "For the first time... there's enough for all!" It looks as if Hearst has caught at Prosperity's tail as she scooted around the corner. But read further. Here is no solution to our economic ills. No... merely now for the first time there's enough of these fine peaches to meet the demand of the better class of people. Here is the product—approved by Good Housekeeping—note the get how he gets his news. While some of our pickets were in front of a butcher shop, one of the Hearst reporters came up and said he wanted to get an 'action' picture. When the strikers told him to 'go chase himself,' do you know what happened?

"There was a man 'innocently walking out of the market. The reporter walked up and socked him, then tried to make the look as though the women had done it. That was the 'action' picture. Everything must be distorted to please vicious Mr. Hearst."

"We never failed to tell the Hearst reporters what we thought of his paper. The women's League Against the High Cost of Living in Detroit, asks the women of the country to note the big radio sensation of the week. Mother Ella Reeve Bloor goes on the air over the red network of the National Broadcasting Company to discuss the program of the Communist Party with American women. Read your local paper for the exact station and time."

The Mother Bloor fund has gone forward in the last week to the tune of eleven dollars. Five came from a friend who said that the broadcast must go on, although she herself remained anonymous. The tip-off on the line-up of strength came a few weeks ago when Hollywood's biggest acting names contributed to the Salinas strike fund without the producers being able to address by Mayor Wilson and labor leaders. Local 215 of Kingston, N. Y., has demanded jobs from theater exhibitors under threat to picket if jobs are not restored. Local 311 of Wilmington, Del., has written for data and Los Angeles and San Francisco are ready to go.

Frank Weizenecker, representing the Central Labor Council of Cincinnati has demanded that the Federal Communications Commission rescind the license on Powel Crosley's Station WLW, charging that the station is not being operated under union conditions or in the public interest, that Crosley has refused to allow news comment on labor matters. To prove Crosley's anti-labor attitude, the Federal Commission need only look back on the records of the strikes at the Crosley's factories during the last few years.

So successful was the showing of Amkino's "Kronstadt" at the Radio Theatre last week, that the management will book the outstanding European hits, mostly from Russian studios, in the future. The Soviet epic "We Are From Kronstadt" is continued this week. In addition "Tango," with Marion Nixon, is shown.

## Theatre Art In Gallery

Moi Soloroff's Designs Attract Attention

A pleasant surprise is in store for those who go to see Moi Soloroff's designs and costumes at the A.C.A. Gallery. Gallery visitors invariably expect to see the Artec Theatre minus the stage, the director and acting company. They are agreeably shocked to find, instead of an Artec by-product, one of the finest art exhibitions of the current season.

The Artec Theatre is there, to be sure, but with a striking change of emphasis. In the theatre one was accustomed to see Soloroff's sets, though very excellent, nevertheless subordinated to the Artec's productions; fine frames into which the capable directing and acting fitted perfectly without making any claim for attention for their own sake.

In the gallery, the Artec is merely the background for Soloroff the artist. Here he steps forth with a performance which is full-blooded and vivid in its own right.

Norris Houghton admirably describes this impression in one of the paragraphs of the catalogue's foreword.

"This collection of the designs of Moi Soloroff reveals, however, that he must be considered apart from most of the other American designers, that he must be considered first as a painter and later as a man of the theatre. Not that he is untheatrical, undramatic; his work has both of these qualities in strong measure. His color, his light, his movement, is essentially of the stage. But at the same time and more important, his costume sketches are first portraits, only secondarily patterns for clothes, his settings are primarily compositions in dynamic symmetry, expressive, plastic water colors and pastels which are arresting for their own sakes as pictures, as painting. One finds oneself scarcely caring how they may have been executed on the stage. For Mr. Soloroff is both painter and dramatist in himself. His drawings of characters are as revealing as any lines the poet may have written for them to speak; his drawings of scenes are filled with a pulsing activity and life of their own."

His "Nouveau Riche Interior" is an excellent example for color harmony, the "Bacchanal Scene" is fresh, vivid and gorgeously gay; the "Shop Scene" captures the old little Czarist town. The "Tailor" is full of penetrating characterization which lingers in one's memory.

Unless you go strong for "He-Man" stuff or fall for Herculean physiques, you will be wasting your time seeing "The Magnificent Brute," Universal's latest kudo to brawn and muscle.

The story of this not-too-original melodrama is laid in the Aurora Steel Mills where Big Steve dominates the workers by brute force. Dejected as a hard-boiled, two-fisted worker, his gang wins a competition with the gang of Bill Morgan and he becomes the "champ of the open hearth."

Morgan, disgruntled, gets even with Big Steve when he steals a bankroll which Steve had collected in order to send the wife of one of the men killed in the mills to her home.

Big Steve, wheezy from losing a wrestling match at a carnival, does not remember where he put his money and the men accuse him of stealing the cash.

Meanwhile, Blossom Finney, owner of the boarding house where Big Steve lives, and in love with him, overhears that Bill Morgan had taken the cash. A roaring fight ensues where Big Steve conquers Bill Morgan and clears his name.

The melodrama is only interesting in spots and these spots are action sequences: where Big Steve saves Blossom's boy Pete from being buried by molten steel, and where a young steel worker loses his life by toppling into a converter.

While its central theme is the adoration of brute force, the "Magnificent Brute" when it approaches controversial issues or enters lives of the steel workers, kowtows to the employers.

**Justifies The Speed-Up**

It justifies the speed-up system by pitting two mills against each other, the Hampden Mills and the Aurora Mills. An official congratulates the "boys" with the old line: "It wasn't so long ago that I was down there working with you so that I can appreciate what you do for the company."

The film also conveys the impression that steel workers are brutes who must lack brains in order to succeed. The worker who is killed is a college honor graduate who has taken a technical course in steel and wishes to get some practical experience. He is always the laggard and finally collapses and topples to his death. Conclusion:—You can't go to college and be a steel worker.

Not to be labelled vicious nor anti-working class, "The Magnificent Brute" is more like the confused production of Hollywood boys who live on bon-bons and champagne and think the steel mills is a manly, romantic place in which to lay the scenes for a plot.

The picture makes good fare only for those who fall for such a line of thought. It achieved a great physique in twenty lessons so that all the girls at the beach would fall for me."

Victor McLaglen, Binnie Barnes, Jean Dixon, William Hall, Henry Armetta and little Billy Burrud embellish the tale with their playing.

An entertaining stage show, the "Ice Carnival," and Mickey Mouse in colors add flavor to the Roxy presentation.

Hearst, and only Hearst would permit such a thing to be printed. And that is because Hearst considers himself a law unto himself.

He operates like a fire-bug who starts a fire so that he can have the fun of turning in the alarm. He spews forth a hatred for liberals and Jews so that later on he can shout for a dictator to throw them into concentration camps.

I'm sorry that Dan Parker has been tainted by the cursed odor of Willie (the Skunk) Hearst.

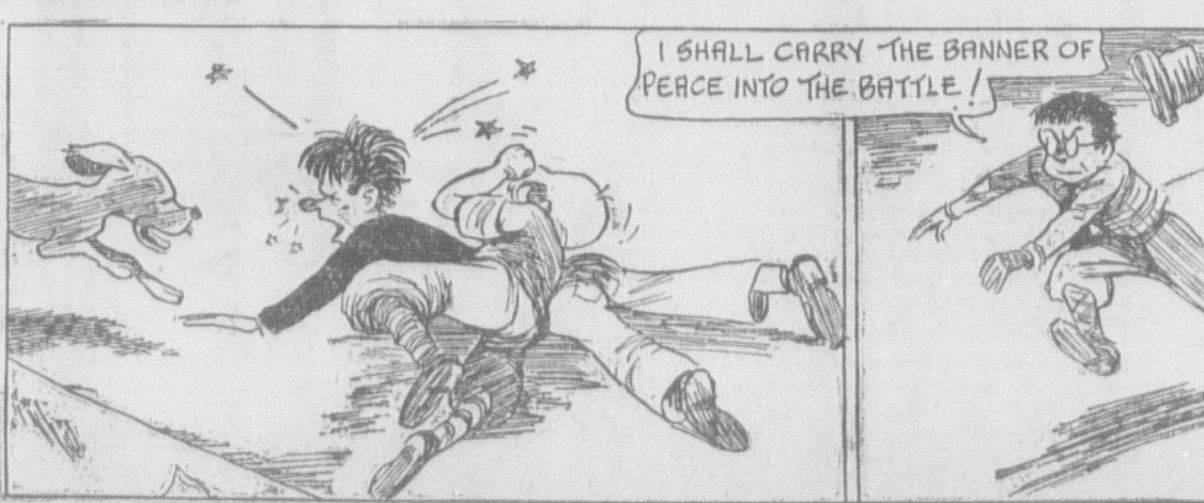

## Minnesota at Fighting Peak For Wildcats

### Terrific Clash Looms Between Unbeaten Elevens

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—Minnesota's "Gridiron glacier," moving on to its third national football championship with a terrifying display of chilling, crushing power, collides with Northwestern's unbeaten Wildcat in the nation's foremost football game Saturday at Evanston.

Both unbeaten and untied, the Midwest's two strongest football powers will grapple for Big Ten and national supremacy. The winner will stand unchallenged at the top, and football wise men foresee Minnesota's Maroon and Gold standard planted in this strategic spot.

This battle of the football titans is attracting more interest than any game played in Chicago since the late Knute Rockne's last Notre Dame team battled Northwestern's Big Ten champions in November, 1930. Northwestern officials announced today that every ticket had been sold, insuring a capacity crowd of 50,000. More than twice this number would see the game if seats were available, it was estimated.

## GOPHERS FAVORED

On the strength of its smashing 33-9 triumph over Purdue, the Glia of the Northland have been installed 2 to 1 betting favorites. More than 11,000 Minnesota followers will come to Evanston to see their Golden Gophers in action, and may send the odds soaring even higher when they arrive.

Northwestern's cause is far from hopeless. Coach Lynn Waldorf, the miracle man of 1935 who coached the team which smashed Notre Dame from the ranks of the unbeaten after the Irish had conquered Ohio State, calls his team "Optimistic Underdogs."

Waldorf, famed for his ability to bring a team to its peak for November, has the Wildcats ready. He even admits that the team has accomplished more than he ever dreamed it would in October. He usually lets October take care of itself in an effort to cash in on November triumphs.

A year ago Northwestern gave Minnesota its toughest battle of the season, twice leading the Gophers, 6-0, and 13-7, before losing in the last half, 21-13.

## Hooley Hooks Up
