Wednesday morning Arthur Anderson, lawyer for the five finks suing Local 544, filed a 60-page motion in Judge Paul S. Carroll's court, renewing de-

mands against the General Drivers Union and its officials. In

seeking to overturn the court's decision in the famous fink suit,

Anderson asks the court for a long list of rulings which, like the original demands of the finks, would render the union helpless to defend its members.

In his motion for amended findings, Anderson asks the court to rule that no union

member can ever be deprived of

a job no matter what breach of

union rules he is guilty of; he demands that union officials be barred from "compelling" any-one to pay dues or fines or fees. The finks ask that balloting in union elections be confined to

one day, thus depriving many drivers out of town from the

right to vote in union elections.

Anderson asks that donations be limited only "to proper union purposes," Anderson and the finks to judge what is "proper"

He asks that the union be barred forever from protecting

#### On the National Picket Line

Tomorrow, October 16, the United States becomes, officially, a militarized nation. Even those muddle-headed pacifists and isolationists who fought so stridently against the Conscription Bill before it became a law, and who have been so meekly quiet since, has been rung over the decadent body of "peace."

On Court Decision President Carl Skoglund Given Spontaneous Reception at Monday's Membership Meeting—Dunne in Lengthy Report Outlines Result of Long Fink Suit, Cites Dangerous Precedent in Court's Decision-Gives Details of \$6,000 Court Says Union Officials Must Pay to Union Treasury-Union Defense Guard Announces Its Annual Dance and Turkey Raffle Will Be Held

> A large throng of 544 members turned out Monday night at the October membership meeting to hear V. R. Dunne deliver the main report of the evening, on Judge Carroll's decision in the fink suit.

Demonstrating their feelings about the court's decision that President Carl Skoglund can not hold office because of his citizenship status, members staged a spontaneous reception for Skogie when he took the chair to call the meet-

ing to order.

Curt Zander read the trustees' financial report for the month of September, and the auditor's report covering the third quarter of the year. The reports were accepted.

Brother V. R. Dunne opened his report by asking his listeners to keep in mind certain important and basic considerations underlying the book suit.

"We do not stand off to one side as those abstractly interested in this case," he said. "We have a definite attitude of maintaining our union rights, despite what the passers-by, or the employers, or the finks, think about us.

"This suit was brought by the five finks and their attorneys, not from the point of view of helping our union, but from the exactly opposite viewpoint, of doing all possible harm to Local 544.

"No judge approaches a case of this kind with the same attitude as a union man, however honest and judicially correct that judge may be. He cannot help but be influenced by the employers and their interests, by his own background and upbringing, etc.

"We went into this fight two and one-half years ago. This fight was not of our choosing. It was forced upon us by men who had nothing but rancor and hatred in their hearts for 544 and all it stands for."

Dunne likened the union's position to that of a man set upon by thugs in his own home. He puts up the best fight he can to defend himself and his family, knowing he fights with justice on his side. During the fight he is wounded, his furniture is broken, and his family is frightened. He succeeds in driving off the thugs: the scars of battle he receives are not considered as signs of defeat but as

badges of victory. "We received some scars. Some of the court's decisions were against the union, were not to our liking. We do not admit all the court's decisions were good.




