LOS ANGELES, Feb. 10.—Another story of Negro discrimination is going the rounds of the gyms in Los Angeles. This one is so indiscreet on the part of the "superior" masters, that it fairly reeks of the South and its lynch terror.

Negro trainers and their fighters are roaring mad at the treatment one of their boys got last week at Jim Jeffries' Barn in one of the scraps.

While the Barn was packed with blood-lusting customers, howling for a quick knockout, "Inky" Caldwell, well-known tri-state runner-up in the 126 lb. division, was drubbing away at his opponent from Peoria, Ill., a white boy.

Down went the white boy— three times in the first round, three times in the second round, once in the fourth, and after it was all over—Caldwell lost the decision.

In the third round, after Inky had scored for the seventh time, and the Peoria boy was picking himself up from the floor gamely, out on his feet, Caldwell began to get the run-around.

As he got to his feet Frankie Van, the referee, rushed up to Inky and pushed him into a neutral corner with such force that he bounced back into his arms.

In anger, Van pushed Caldwell back again and this time harder. Three times he did it and by this time Art Holloway, Inky's chief second, rushed into the ring and began to render vigorous protests.

By this time the ringside was in an uproar and the Peoria boy had regained his senses enough to continue the uneven battle.

Imagine the surprise of Caldwell supporters when the decision went against him!

Inky's trainer was burning up and while he muttered under his breath, several thugs near the corner warned him to get away from the ringside or they'll take good care to see that he scrams.

And they had gats to back up their threats! Many of the white fighters came up to Holloway and Inky's trainer later and told them that they had never seen such rank unfairness.

A concerted demand by the fight public should begin to form, asking that Negro prospects be given their right to perform as equals.

Negro Champ Gives S. F. Fans an Eyeful GETS TECHNICAL KAYO

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 10.—A fighter who would have put William the Conqueror, Napoleon with half his general staff, and the late lamented Legs Diamond to shame unopposed his wares last night in Exposition Auditorium.

He is Henry Armstrong, 133-pound Los Angeles Negro, who is featherweight champion of the world and the greatest boxer, pound for pound, in the ring today.

And Henry came down like the wolf on the fold on hapless Citrino, North Beach featherweight.

He was knocked down before 45 seconds of the fight had elapsed and after the first knockdown it was simply a question of how many times he would bounce.

Out of the three and a half rounds Citrino participated in before Referee Joe Gorman called in a technical knockout, the North Beach boy spent almost a full round flat on his back on the canvas.

He was knocked down 13 times by LEFTY's tabulations, and he took the full nine count each time.

Henry was in fine fettle and kept boring in with a lightning series of short jabs which had Citrino flustered from the start.

Armstrong never takes any wild swings. His technique is the perfect one for an aggressive, hustling fighter. He boxes right in all the time and drums his fists on his opponent as if he were beating a tom-tom.

The best fight crowd in over a year witnessed the bout. The mob which jammed Exposition Auditorium was estimated at 8500.

Manuel Williams, Negro middleweight from Chicago gave Jimmy Berries of Sacramento the berries in a very effective manner in the 6-round semi-windup. He won an easy decision.

Johnny Marquez drew with Johnny DiSopa in the other 6-rounder. Manuel Rondon got a second round knock-out over Frankie Mandell.

LEFTY arrived too late to witness the two openers, but some kind-hearted goal informed him that Frankie Cuenca knocked out Eddie Halligan in the first round of a scheduled 4-rounder, and Gilber Santiago took a close decision from Bobby Wright in the curtain-raiser.
