For instance, how to administer the mining industry so as to meet the requirements of society as a whole? The organization of the miners is the first essential. Does anyone doubt the power of society to make good? Then study the inter-relations of industry as at present constituted, even, and that doubt will readily be dissolved. Of course there is another incentive to plentiful and efficient production: it will increase the social share of each individual worker.
