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TEXTILE "ARISTOCRATS" STRIKE

Loomfixers of Philadelphia Quarrel With Their Brother, the Boss, and As a Consequence May Sometime Find Their Place in the Labor Movement.

The Loomfixers' Union with 500 members in Philadelphia, recently declared a strike to enforce their demands for more wages. It was on Oct. 18th that they struck after trying to come to an agreement with the textile barons. The loomfixers have succeeded in breaking the ranks of the barons.

The loom fixer is the aristocrat of the textile industry, so aristocratic that he thinks he is a part of the firm and acts accordingly.
