

It is to be hoped that the real revolutionary element in Russia will not be lulled into a false sense of victory by a liberal constitution of any sort, but will pursue the struggle uninteruptedly until "the workers... organize as a class, take possession of the earth and the machinery of production and abolish the wage system." Any other outcome of the Russian revolution would be an abortive one and one unworthy of the heroic devotion and sacrifices of the Russian rebels, who have for long desired complete Freedom as the fruit of their efforts. But, whatever the result may have been, a will undoubtedly show to what extent the master class of Russian Reform—to their owns desauting of the result of the result

Following a period of strikes and bread-riots in Petrograd, in which the soldiers fraternized with the throngs of workers in the streets who were waving red flags and singing revolutionary songs, the police force was annihilated, the government seized and a committee formed to name a new cabinet.
