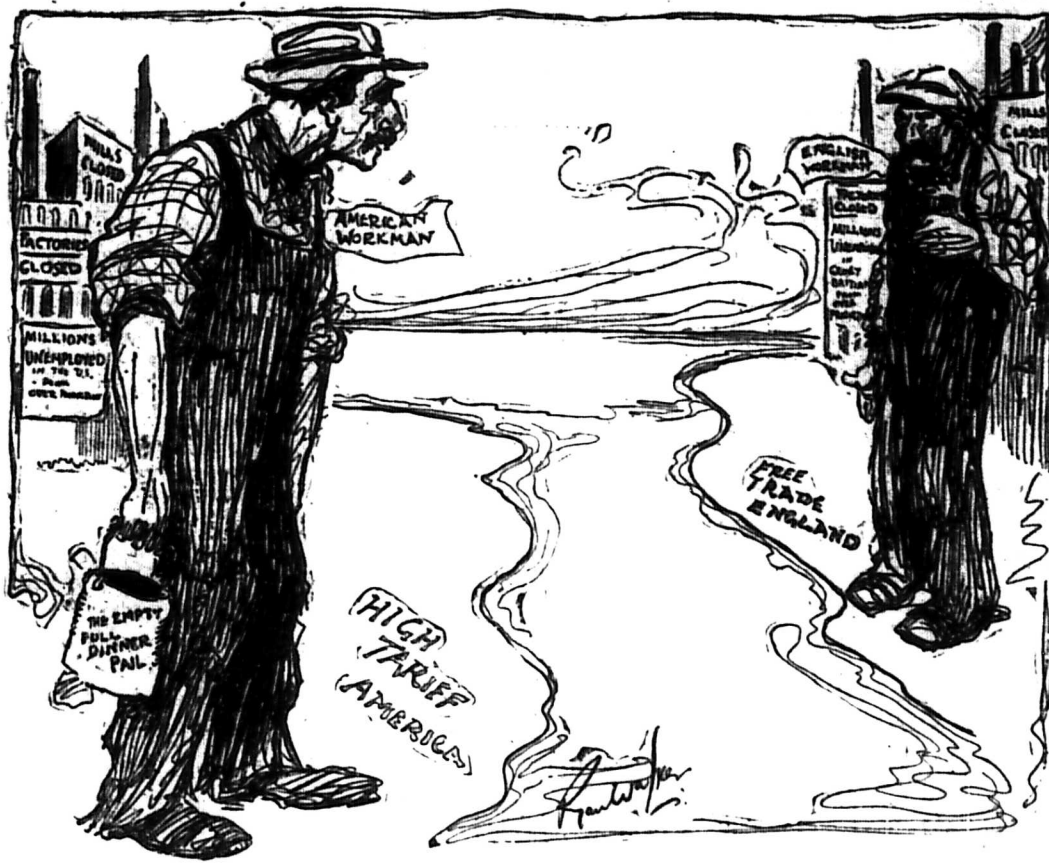

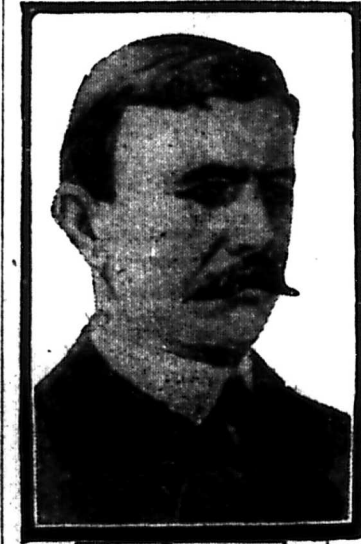

St. Louis Workers Welcome Workingclass Champion.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 24.—"If there is a spark of courage in your breast you cannot continue to vote for this accursed system of society."

Debs was in fine form and his biting criticism of Taft's labor record aroused laughter and applause, while, on the other hand, his touching tribute to "Mother" Jones, of Chicago, who was one of his fellow speakers, moved the audience to tears.

When the "Red Special" arrived at the Union Station it was met by thousands of enthusiasts, and a mighty parade, headed by the "Red Special" band, marched through the main streets of the city.

Fears 'Little Tim' Might Cut Off City Revenue.

Superintendent Jenkins Yields to Force of Pull and Refuses to Prosecute the Bowery Clan for Stealing Children's Pennies—Sullivan's Advertising Company Regard Streets as Their Private Property and Post Bill Boards.

The grip of "Little Tim" Sullivan has closed on the Gerry Society, which only a few days ago through its superintendent, Jenkins, announced an ultimatum to the Sullivan family.

"Nothing to say," said the superintendent. "Do you not know that the officials of the company are Cornelius J. Sullivan, president; Timothy D. Sullivan, vice-president; Timothy P. Sullivan, attorney; and Reese M. Wilen, secretary?"

"Nothing to say." "Have you heard the boasts of the Gerry Society's afraid to attack 'Big Tim' and 'Little Tim' Sullivan, because of the fear that its appropriation might be cut down in reprisal?"

"Nothing to say." "Confident of the power of the 'pull' which it possesses as a protection to all candy dealers who shall install its child gambling slot machines, the C. J. Sullivan Advertising Company is defacing the city with huge bill boards in direct violation of the laws."

Within the last six months this firm has erected mammoth signs which no rival company would dare attempt to erect.

The income of the Sullivan concern from this particular source, it was learned yesterday, now amounts to \$2500 daily.

In vain the West End Association and other civic bodies have protested to Mayor McClellan and President Ahearn, of Manhattan Borough, that the Sullivan boys were breaking the law.

From an authentic source it was learned yesterday that both "Big Tim" and "Little Tim" Sullivan have a person been boldly soliciting the patronage of interests, more or less desirous of keeping the good will of the McClellan administration, and have put the proposition to them in this fashion:

"We want your advertising business. We are strong with the city departments, and if you have any favors to ask at any time we will fix you out."

Even the stationery of the Board of Aldermen has been utilized by one officer of the C. J. Sullivan Advertising Company to help boom its business.

## THE IGNORANCE OF THE KNOWING.

By FRANKLIN H. WENTWORTH.

Senator Henry Cabot Lodge is a knowing person. He is the oracle, the historian and the interpreter of Republican principles to the gaping multitudes of Massachusetts, who do not vote but are voted. It was he who once discovered that the initiative and referendum were vicious schemes to overthrow Republican institutions. When Mr. Lodge refers to Republican institutions he means the Republican machine. The Republican machine maintains Mr. Lodge in public life; and the Republican machine, plus Mr. Lodge's dollars, maintains Mr. Lodge's son-in-law, Mr. Augustus P. Gardner in public life, Mr. Lodge's pronouncements on public questions are always interestingly clear; in fact, they are more than clear—they are transparent.

For the second time in his career Mr. Lodge has delivered himself upon the subject of Socialism. His first delivery upon this interesting question was some ten years ago, when he met in debate in Haverhill, Mass., Mr. James F. Carey, of the Socialist party. Mr. Carey has spoken in Haverhill many times since in the ten years. Mr. Lodge never has. There is no comfort in revisiting the scenes of our humiliations.

Mr. Lodge's present exhibition of knowing cannot, however, be smothered in Haverhill. At the time of his first adventure into the realms of logic Socialism was comparatively local. It is now national; and when a United States Senator speaks all persons who do not know him may believe him.

Mr. Lodge declares that Socialism will not work because it is opposed to human nature. The Senator makes this declaration in the month of October, in the year 1908—a few weeks before the casting of, perhaps, a million votes for Socialism. The only reason why Senator Lodge cannot be driven out of public life, just as he was driven out of Haverhill, is that the arena over which his ignorance has now spread is of greater extent than can at present be covered by printed truth.

Socialism is the revolt of the working class against economic tyranny. It is the first intelligent effort of the producing class of the world to get the class of which Mr. Lodge is the spokesman off his back.

This is not opposed to human nature; it is the expression of human nature. Being the expression of human nature, Socialism, when it comes, will surely work—and so, for the first time in his life, will Mr. Lodge.

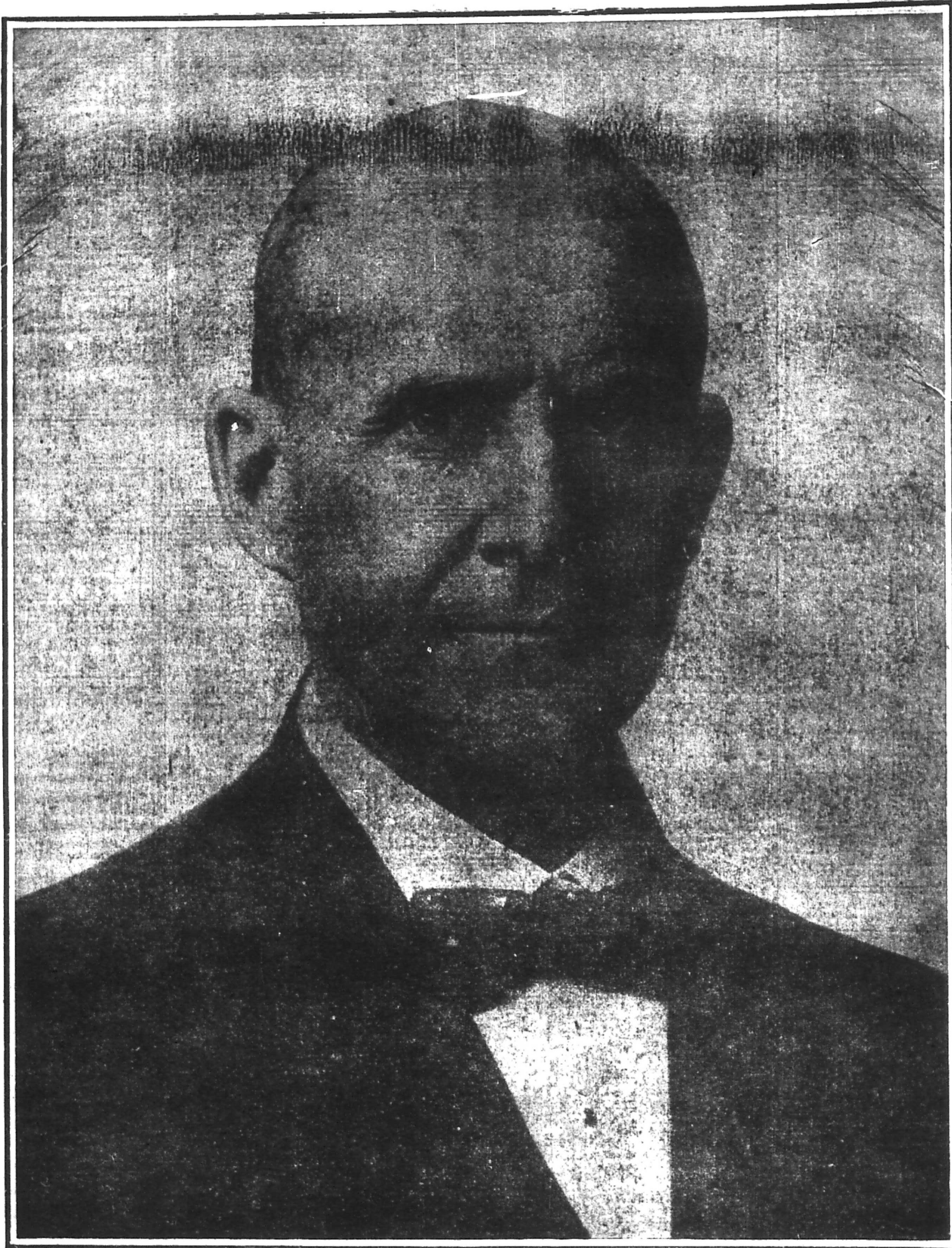

A vote for Eugene V. Debs is a vote against the Republican party, which has ruled this country for twelve years and under whose rule the working people of this country have been plunged into unemployment and misery.

A vote for Eugene V. Debs is a vote against the Democratic party, which has ruled the South absolutely for thirty years, and under whose rule child labor has grown to frightful proportions, promiscuous and contract labor have been established and lynch law is invoked by the ruling classes to defeat every attempt at labor organization.

A vote for Debs is a vote against dark, unventilated, uncomfortable, disease-breeding tenements, where the workers of the nation dwell in wretchedness and pay a quarter of their income to a landlord class who would not allow their pet dogs to inhabit such dens.

A vote for Debs is a vote against the child labor which is growing from year to year, which piles up profits for the employers, which helps to swell the army of unemployed men, which robs the children of the rightful joy of childhood, and threatens the next generation with ignorance and physical and moral degeneration.

A vote for Debs is a vote against the long hours of labor and the constant driving in the shop which is wearing out the muscles and nerves of the American working people and making them into mere machines, for the profit of the capitalist class.

A vote for Debs is a vote against the system, maintained by both the old parties, which brings upon us every twelve or fifteen years an industrial crisis, which millions of men miss, tramp the city streets and the country roads begging for a chance to earn a living by doing useful work to produce the food and clothing and fuel for lack of which millions of people suffer.

A vote for Debs is a vote against the system which dooms aged workers to poverty and dependence after they have spent all the better years of their life in making a bare living for themselves and making fortunes for the non-producing masters.

A vote for Debs is a vote against that accumulation of unearned wealth in the hands of a few which has already changed this country from a republic into an oligarchy and which corrupts our government, our courts, our colleges and schools, our churches, our newspapers, and every department of our public life.

A vote for Debs is a vote against that undeserved poverty of the producing masses which makes the life of the majority dull and joyless, which breeds disease, insanity, suicide, drunkenness, prostitution and crime.

A vote for Debs is a vote against the conditions which cause a continuous struggle between man and man and between class and class, which produces all the capitalist insanities which recent investigations have exposed; which sets workmen fighting like wild beasts for a chance to work; which results in strikes, lockouts, boycotts, blacklists, riots, spy systems, injunctions and martial law.

A vote for Debs, in a word, is a vote against the system which makes a few people the owners of the means by which all the other people work, which makes those few the masters of the others' lives; which dooms the producers to alternate overwork and unemployment and leaves them as poor at the close of a life of industry as they were when they began; and which enables the owners and masters to live in leisure and luxury and power, without ever doing a stroke of useful work, simply because they own the means of production and control the people's jobs and can levy tribute upon them in the shape of profit, interest and rent.

A vote for Debs is a vote for a radical change. It is a vote for a system under which the people as a whole shall own the means of producing wealth and shall regulate industry for their own good. It is a vote for a system in which there shall be no class rule and no class struggle; in which all shall be workers and the workers shall get the full value they produce; in which there shall no longer be capitalist masters and wage slaves, but only comrade workers, toiling for the common good, in which the interest of each shall be the interest of all.
