MILWAUKEE HAILS DEBS

Socialist Stronghold Ablaze with Enthusiasm.

Thousands of Workers Fill Three Big Halls, Paying Admission Fees, and Thousands of Others Are Turned Away Because of Lack of Room--Immense Parade Cheer.

Three of the largest halls in the city were jammed to the doors last night by thousands of workmen who had come to listen to the words of Eugene V. Debs, the Socialist party candidate for President, and several thousand others were unable to obtain admission.

At Pabst Theater, where the Socialist State Senator, Carl D. Thompson, acted as chairman, 2,500 persons paid 25 cents each to hear Debs. In the Turn Hall, where Victor L. Berger presided, 3,500 people paid 19 cents each, and in the Freie Gemeinde Hall 1,500 others did the same, thus gladdening the heart of Chairman Weber.

This was the first time in the history of the Socialist movement in Milwaukee that admission fees were charged, but it had no effect upon the enthusiasm of the crowds who willingly paid the prices asked for the privilege of hearing the candidate of the working class.

Debs' principal speech was made at the Pabst Theater, where he spoke for more than an hour, being frequently interrupted by shouts of approval.

The crowds at the other meetings were just as enthusiastic, and Debs and his fellow speakers were everywhere received with great demonstrations of joy.

When the "Red Special" arrived at the station yesterday afternoon it was met by thousands of workers and, although no preparations had been made for a parade, everybody fell into line, and headed by the famous "Red Special" band, a long procession led through the main streets, filling the air with cheers for Debs and the Socialist party.

WOMEN MORE TO BE FEARED THAN MEN

General Corbin Says They Can at Least Make More Trouble at Army Post.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 31.--"One fool woman can make more trouble in an army post than all the officers and men," said Lieutenant General H. C. Corbin, retired, yesterday in discussing the Hains murder case. General Corbin had been asked his opinion of the sensational tales of orgies at Fort Hamilton, New York, as told in the alleged letters of Mrs. Hains to her husband.

"But Mrs. Hains says the letters are forgeries," was the quick reply. "Such things as described as occurring in Fort Hamilton never were permitted to continue in my time in the army, and I left it only a year and a half ago," said the general.

CARPENTERS SCORN BRYAN AND GOMPERS

Carpenters' Union No. 309, of this city, has tabled the request of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, to endorse the Democratic party. In an open letter to Mr. Gompers he is told that his political policy is "a detriment to the laboring people of this country."

The union, which has a membership of 1,300, and is one of the oldest unions in the city, concludes its letter as follows: "Every one of our members is pledged to support with all his heart and all his energy the only party which stands for the freedom of all wage slaves--the Socialist party."

DEBS SPEAKS AT OLD JAIL

WOODSTOCK, Ill., Oct. 31.--Five hundred cheering people listened to Eugene V. Debs speak yesterday from the steps of the jail where he was confined fourteen years ago by the order of a Federal judge.

Among those present were Mr. Eckert, the Sheriff, who was Debs' jailer. He and his daughter greeted the Socialist candidate with great enthusiasm and a joyful reunion took place.

Debs in his speech referred to the jail as the college where he was really educated, and there was no trace of bitterness in his words, even when he and his party visited his old cell.

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FAMILY IS SURE OF FOUL PLAY

In Death of Mrs. Cooke the Police Say It was a Case of Suicide.

Henrietta Cooke, wife of Andrew Cooke, a retired milk dealer and brother of Abraham Cooke, formerly vice-president of the Williamsburg Savings Bank, was burned to death in her bed at her home at 1141 37th street, Flatbush, late yesterday afternoon.

The death of Mrs. Cooke is surrounded by some mystery and has caused a clash between the family and the authorities. The family and the doctor who attended Mrs. Cooke are positive that she met her death through foul play, while the police and the Coroner said last night that they believed that Mrs. Cooke probably committed suicide.

SURGERY CURE FOR MORAL DEGENERACY

Philadelphia Physician Claims to Have Discovered Cure for Crime.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 31.--Surgery as a cure for moral degeneracy has had a remarkable demonstration in this city through an operation performed by Dr. Herbert L. Northrop, dean of Hahnemann College.

By a simple operation on the head, removing pressure on the brain, caused by an injury, Dr. Northrop changed a man from a drunkard and a thief to an honest, industrious man respected by his employers.

DROEGE GUILTY OF FREEING PRISONERS

Discharge. It Is Claimed, Was Wholly Unlawful--Another Charge Against Him.

Magistrate Otto H. Droege was found guilty yesterday of a technical violation of Section 711 of the City Charter in the release of sixteen prisoners from the workhouse. Referee William H. Willis, who was appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court to take testimony regarding the supplementary charges against the Magistrate, so declared in a report of forty-seven typewritten pages.

He said the discharge of these prisoners by Judge Droege was "wholly unlawful."

RICH MAN BEHIND IT

Millionaire Champagne Merchant, It Is Said.

Traffic in White Slaves, Police Say, Was Conducted by Him--Evidence Almost Completed--Found a Private White Slave Telephone Directory Book.

A millionaire champagne merchant has been revealed as one of the leaders in the white slave traffic in this city. His identity was betrayed by the "clearing house" directory captured by Agent Victor M. Pisarra, of the Children's Society.

It is declared he will be placed behind the bars as soon as the evidence has been completed by the addition of a single link. This link, it is said, will be instrumental in sending the rich trafficker in young girls to Sing Sing prison for a long term.

"The millionaire's name and telephone call are in the white slave private telephone directory which we seized," said Pisarra. "The book is now in the possession of the Commissioner of Police."

"I am not at liberty to divulge this man's name, but it should not be difficult to ascertain it. We are certain that he has made a business of supply champagne to scores of evil resorts, whose names appear in the confiscated directory, and we are working to establish a more definite connection. I do not know what police protection these places had. On that subject Magistrate Crane obtained his information from another source than the society."

"I have gone over the address book," said Magistrate Crane to-day, "and it is a revelation to me. I never dreamed that there could be so much vice and such kind of vice anywhere in this land. The case is the most awful one I ever heard of."

NO PARTY WANTS JOHN D., PUBLICLY

Even Our Young Hero with All His Bravery Disclaims All Friendship.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.--After almost a week of intense silence our young hero has again belched forth. This time he smites at the father of the old parties, John D. Rockefeller, and this is what the capitalist press says: "President Roosevelt has been much annoyed over an interview with John D. Rockefeller which appeared in the morning newspapers in which Mr. Rockefeller declared himself in favor of Taft. To-night the following statement was authorized by the President: "At the White House the announcement of Mr. Rockefeller's endorsement of the Standard Oil Company was regarded with some amusement in view of what the Administration has done to the Standard Oil Company (???) and of the bitter hatred borne by the Standard Oil Company to the Administration. (???) It is a perfectly palpable and obvious trick on the part of the Standard Oil people to try to damage Taft--a trick so palpable that it can deceive no one."

SOCIALIST SPEAKER ROUTS BRYANITE

Undaunted by the wintry blasts that swept down 2d avenue last night, the Socialists of the 10th Assembly District held a meeting on the 10th street corner that was a record breaker in several ways.

When Chairman C. Elmes presided Edward Meyers as the first speaker started to speak on the other corner. As soon as the people around him saw that the Socialist meeting had begun they crossed over to the Socialist side of the avenue, leaving the Bryan champion with only a dozen hearers.

The Democrat stuck to his post, however, and, assisted by several other speakers, kept up a bluff of holding a meeting until 10:30 o'clock when, seeing his tiny audience rapidly dissolving, he gave up the hopeless fight and joined the 500 people who were listening to the logical and witty sayings of G. M. Fitzgibbons, who was then talking from the Socialist truck.

In a final effort to redeem himself in the eyes of the people who had laughed at his feeble attempt to answer the pertinent questions hurled at him by Socialist interrogators, the Bryan speaker shouted at Fitzgibbons, "What has the Socialist party ever done for the working class?"

"Broke the Tammany gang on the East Side," promptly replied Fitzgibbons, amid a volley of cheers that caused the questioner to beat a hasty retreat.

Mrs. Carrie Allen and Sam Edalstein also addressed the crowd of enthusiasts, and when the meeting closed at 11:30, hundreds of persons gathered in knots and continued the discussion of the Socialist doctrines as outlined by the speakers.

Two other big street meetings were held in the 10th Assembly District last night, one at 13th street and 1st avenue, where Ugo Lupi made an eloquent speech in Italian to more than 100 listeners, and the other at Avenue B and 4th street, where A. Olszewski and F. Korol addressed 250 people in Polish.

The audiences at all these meetings were heartily in sympathy with the speakers, consequently a few half-hearted attempts by Tammany heelsers to make a disturbance failed completely.

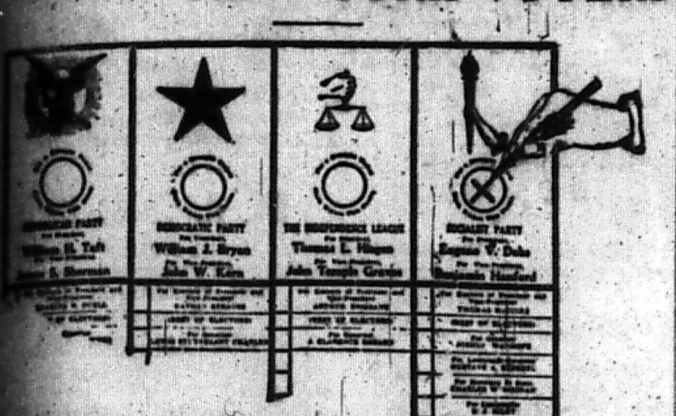
Vote Early! ELECTION DAY IN THE NINTH.

THE ISSUES.

The two old parties, which actually represent the interests of the non-producing propertied classes, have to make false pretenses in order to get workmen's votes.

That is an impossible claim. No party can serve both capitalists and workers. IF IT SERVES THE ONE, ITS RULE IS BAD FOR THE OTHER.

What have the old parties to offer as inducements to get workmen's votes in this campaign? They are agreed on one thing—they are both against Socialism and in favor of capitalism.

It has the injunction plank, wrongly called an anti-injunction plank. This does NOT propose to ABOLISH injunctions against labor.

Then there is the trust proposition. At first Mr. Bryan talked of "destroying" the trusts. Then, fearing to drive away his capitalist friends, he explained that he would not allow any one corporation to control more than half the product in any one industry.

Finally, there is the bank deposit plan. Mr. Bryan thinks it of the utmost importance that the government guarantee bank deposits.

And the Republican party—what does it offer for the workmen's votes? It offers Mr. Taft, with his injunction record and his cheery smile.

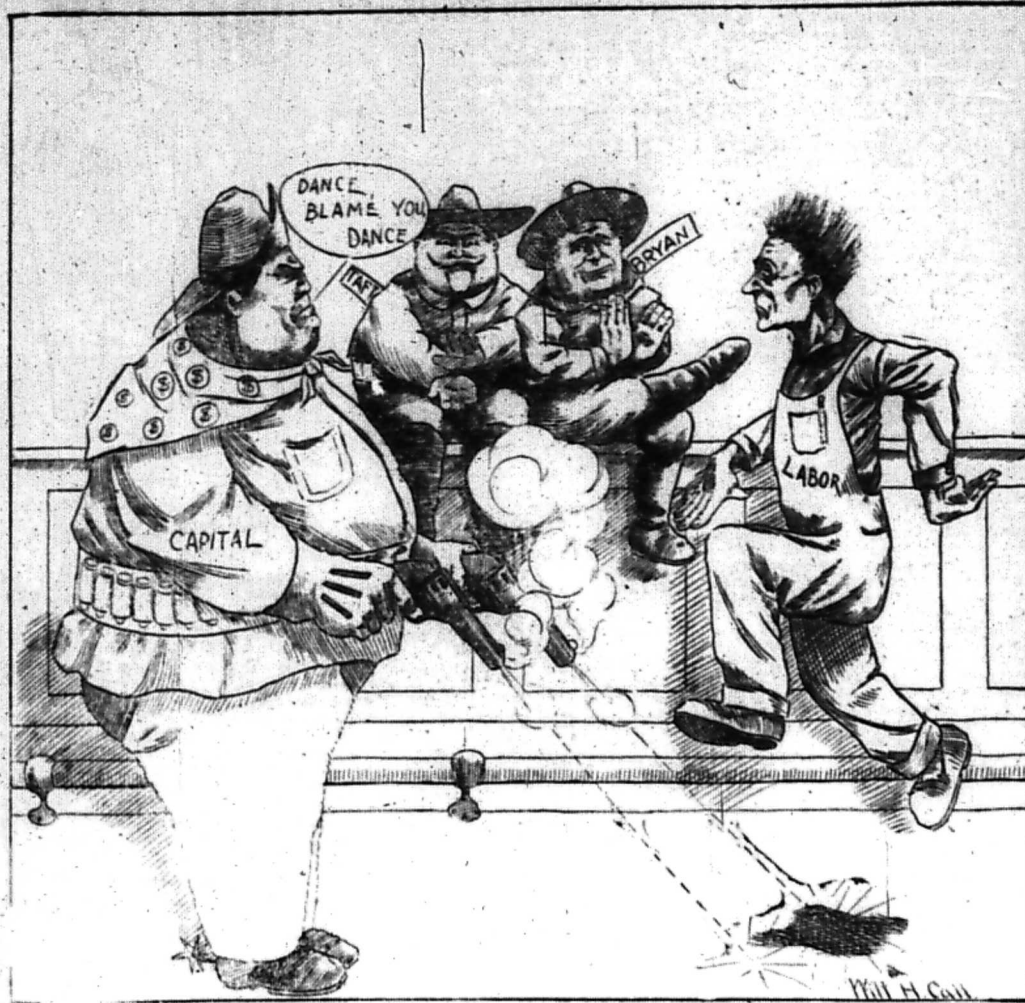
If workingmen are absolutely satisfied with things as they are, they ought to vote for Taft and Sherman. If they are satisfied with things as they are, but just want the label changed, they ought to vote for Bryan and Kern.
