HE WAS ON THE DRUGGIST

Man He Ever Met Took Part of His Wad While He Told Him Factious Stories.

Where is the nimble fingered visitor who got away with five of Walter Zinn's crisp ten dollar bills right in the middle of the night? That is the question which is troubling Zinn in his drug store at 29 Second Avenue.

Zinn was held up and robbed in his store Tuesday night by a clever laughing eyed, smooth spoken son of a gun as ever stepped up Second Avenue.

Zinn was alone in his store when an excited Italian rushed in and asked for change for a dollar. The man was young, five feet five inches in height and weighed about 140 pounds in the best of the druggist's recollection.

The young fellow appeared in a great hurry, and anxious to oblige him Zinn went to the cash register and counted it. He saw a hand come over his shoulder and grab several bills from the drawer.

The druggist couldn't see any injury to the finger, but feeling certain that his visitor was drunk or crazy he decided to humor him, and went back to the store to get a bandage.

The man looked the bills over, and then Zinn straightened up after putting a cotton bandage on his hand. He found himself looking into the muzzle of a three barreled revolver.

"I don't see it that way, but he counted out \$1 in change and handed it over to the Italian, receiving a bill in return."

He said that there was little money in the register at the time. Upon receiving his money the man pulled out a rather red hand and said: "Doctor, I've a bad finger and will I'm here will you please do it up?"

Zinn obeyed, believing that he now had to contend with a combination of a mad man, a drunken man and a thief. The stranger went through the druggist's pockets and found a bill fold containing several checks and \$120 in bills.

GOVERNMENT WILL APPEAL FINE CASE

Standard's \$29,000,000 Conviction Is to Be Taken Up to Supreme Court on Writ of Certiorari.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—An appeal will be taken from the decision in which the United States Circuit Court of Appeals denied the application for a reversal on its Standard Oil conviction and fine of \$29,000,000. The Governor will now attempt to bring the whole matter before the Supreme Court on a writ of certiorari.

It was announced in the office of District Attorney Sims following the decision that additional suits against the Standard Oil Company of Indiana were fully prepared and that trials may be demanded within two weeks. Two of the suits charge rebating in connection with shipments on the Chicago & Eastern Illinois Railroad and two with shipments on the Evansville & Terre Haute. The cases cover almost 1,500 contracts.

The District Attorney has not fully decided whether immediate trials shall be asked on the cases or the action of the United States Supreme Court in reference to the praying of a writ of certiorari be awaited. It is not anticipated that action will be taken by the Supreme Court before December 1.

Time Honored Customs Can't Be Eliminated, but Must Be Curbed According to the Romans.

ROME, Nov. 12.—The Hotelkeepers Congress closed after approving a suggestion for the partial regulation of tipping made by Herr Hoyer, of Cologne, president of the International Association of Hotelkeepers.

"A tip," Herr Hoyer said, "is one of those time honored customs which have taken a hold on public life. It can't be eliminated, but let us try to regulate it."

Herr Hoyer's suggestions, which were adopted with practical unanimity by the congress, was that when travelers desired it the hotelkeeper might undertake the distribution of tips, which should be charged for in the bill at the rate of 15 per cent. on amounts up to twenty francs, and 10 per cent. on larger amounts.

LAKE STEAMER BOILER BURSTS. At Least Three Drowned—Others Missing—Steamer Teniskaming Was Just Approaching Lock.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 12.—Five met death and many were injured through the boilers of the steamer Teniskaming exploding on Lake Teniskaming in Northern Ontario Tuesday night when approaching the main landing with a big load of passengers and freight.

Without any warning her boilers exploded, entirely wrecking the steamer and throwing the passengers into a fearful panic. On account of the remoteness of the locality details are meager, yet a special train with doctors and nurses went from Mattawa. So far as known the casualty list includes: J. McEneaney, a member from the United States; J. Monard, fireman, and J. Bergouban, fireman, who are supposed to be dead. Two of six or seven injured will die as they are very badly burned.

SOME RECIPES.
