138 DEAD IN MINE

Fifty-six Bodies Taken Out Up to Last Night.

Owners of Mine Say There Are Eighty-two More Known Dead-- Rescue Work Is Very Dangerous-- Women Go Insane With Grief.

MONONGAHELA, Nov. 30.--One hundred and thirty-eight lives were lost in the Rachel mine disaster that occurred at Manalapan on Saturday last.

Work Under Difficulties. There is little excitement at the mine. The State Constabulary has the mine surrounded and holds back the curious.

The wives and mothers of the miners are haunting the pit mouth and waiting patiently for news of their lost ones.

Mrs. George Acker, who tried to throw herself down the mine shaft because her husband was among the missing, is declared by physicians to be insane.

The only man brought out alive is Frank Ellinger, who was found after being penned in for twelve hours with the dead.

President Says He's Sorry. T. P. Jones, vice president of the Pittsburgh-Buffalo Coal Company, spent all day at the mines. This evening he said:

"Of course we care absolutely nothing about the financial loss, but since you have asked the question I will state that it will be most trivial, scarcely more than a few thousand dollars."

DECISION AGAINST BRITISH UNIONS

Appeal Court Denies Their Right to Levy Funds for Parliamentary Fund.

LONDON, Nov. 30.--The Appeal Court on Saturday handed down a decision to the effect that a trade union cannot levy compulsory assessment or dues upon its members to maintain labor representatives in Parliament.

The case came up on appeal from the decision of Justice Neville, who held that the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants was entitled to make such levies, and non-suited a member of that union who claimed to retain his rights of membership while refusing to pay his amounts for the parliamentary fund.

The decision is regarded here as a heavy blow at the Labor party. Members of Parliament in this country receive no salaries, which, in the past, has practically restricted its membership to men of the wealthy classes and their pensioners.

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AKRON UNION PAPER DEMANDS JUSTICE

Will Expose Efforts of "Rat" Werner Company to Railroad Strikers to Death.

Special to The Call. AKRON, OHIO, Nov. 30.--The trial of John Giffin, one of the two striking printers accused of the murder of a hireling of the "rat" Werner Company, named Maloney, on September 10, will begin here to-day, and its progress will be watched with great interest by union men in all parts of the country.

Giffin and Ralph Brehm met Maloney on the street the night of September 10, and in a row that ensued the strikebreaker was shot. Brehm and Giffin were at once arrested, charged with cold blooded murder, and the Werner Company is making desperate efforts to have them found guilty.

There are many circumstances connected with the case which seem to show that there is a deliberate plot to railroad the prisoners to the electric chair.

After the shooting of Maloney on September 10, certain county officials and enemies of organized labor used every effort to deprive the accused men of their rights under the law.

It aroused the fellow workers of Giffin and Brehm to a determination to see that these men have a fair trial and every protection the law affords.

Since then they have been tireless in raising the necessary funds to secure able counsel and unearth testimony covered up by the accusers.

We well understand that in this case there is more on trial than Giffin and Brehm.

It is the duty of the newspapers to print the TRUTH concerning not only the employers' Association side of this case, but also the union side.

IF THE DAILIES DO NOT PRINT THE TRUTH, THE PEOPLE IS PREPARED TO AND WILL PUBLISH DAILY in order that the accused, as well as the nation, may have a fair hearing in the public opinion court.

STRIKERS STAND PAT

Brickyard Workers Will Not Accept Compromise.

Exploited Jersey Workers, Encouraged by Reinforcements and Support of Union Men, Defy Bosses' Threats of Scabs and Ejection--Test of Strength To-day.

PERTH AMBOY, N. J., Nov. 30.--Thoroughly determined to insist upon their original demand of 15 cents per hour and a ten hour day, and encouraged by the approval of their attitude by the union men of this state, the great majority of the 1,100 men on strike in and around Perth Amboy met in Robinson's Hall, in Keasbey, yesterday afternoon and voted unanimously not to return to their work in the pottery and clay yards this morning.

Saturday morning 200 men went out at the Lorillard Works, near Keasbey, materially helping the 300 who had previously struck.

The National, not counting on the feeling of solidarity existing among the workers, had sent a batch of hurry orders to the Lorillard, and the news of that reached the ears of the strikers.

The Rt. Paul Zielenki, of St. Stephen's Polish Church, and Father Francis Groszinski, of the Church of Our Lady, appealed to the strikers to go back to work after their sermons yesterday.

The crisis of the strike will be this noon. It will be a test, when the whistles sound at eleven this morning they will be given five hours grace.

This is the mandate of Henry M. Keasbey, vice president and general manager of the National and representative of the employers, who may not be so easily won over by Keasbey.

On the other hand, the strikers assert that it will be practically impossible to fill their places because of the publicity given to the case by the labor press and the support promised by a number of labor organizations.
