New York's American League representatives again played great ball against the Tigers on the Hilltop yesterday, but the brand the locals showed was not good enough to win, though it furnished 10,000 fans with two extra innings. Breaking away to a two run lead in the opening session, the New Yorks were in front until the seventh, when the Detroiters, on a little lucky hitting, a wild pitch and two errors by Austin, rang the scoring song four times. The Highlanders tied the Tigers in the eighth through the daring doings of two sub-swatters—Demmitt and Hemphill—and then lost the game in the eleventh, 5 to 4, through a pass issued to Bush, a single by Cobb, who previously had been unable to hit the ball out of the diamond, a fumble by Engle and an infield out of Morley.

CHICAGO, June 9.—For the first time since 1905, Christy Mathewson yesterday defeated the cheery Chicago Cubs when they had their master mechanic—Mordecai Brown—on the rubber. The score was 3 to 2. The Teddy Bears getting both their runs in the first inning and the Giants having to play an uphill game to win. The visitors scored in the third, fifth and sixth rounds, Harry McCormick carrying the winning run home on his double, O'Hara's single and Devlin's sacrifice.

Mathewson well deserved to down the three-fingered marvel, for "Big Six" allowed only two singles and would have immersed the Cubs in the Whitewash tub had it not been for two errors committed by Larry Doyle in the first frame. These bobbles were followed by a sacrifice by Hoffman and one of Chicago's two hits. Steinfield contributing the rap.
