## DIAZ DEMANDS NEW VICTIM FROM U. S.

\$4,603.90 Immigration Officials Attempt to Send Socialist Organizer D: Lara to His Death.

> (Special to The Call.) LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 18.— L. Guiterrez De Lara, a Spanish na-tional organizer of the Socialist party of the United States, was arrested toof the United States, was arrested to-day by the immigration officials as an alien anarchist, to be deported to Mexico. The governmental officials here have been trying to railroad De Lara into prison or out of the country for more than a fortnight, having ar-rested him on October 9 on the charge of having designs on the United of Press. of having designs on the life of President Taft, who was to arrive in the city the next day, but that charge fell through. Now it appears that a de-termined effort is to be made to turn

De Lara over to the Mexican govern-ment, so that he may be executed. De Lara was born in Mexico and springs from a wealthy family. He is a graduate of the Mexican College of Jurisprudence in Mexico City. He was at one time a judge, and later a member of the Mexican diplomatic corps. The study of economic and sociological subjects and the denial to the Mexican people of the cle-mentary rights of the constitution of 1.00 1857 led De Lara to become an agi-2 00 ta or for the enforcement of the constitution.

De Lara's agitation for the constirights of the Mexican people led to his arrest, and he was sentenced to be shot. He escaped from prison. fled to the United States, and became a Socialist.

De Lara was addressing a large crowd of Mexicans in the Piaza when he was arrested on October 9 and taken to the city jail with three other Mexican Socialists. The four were charged with having designs on the life of Taft, which was merely a pretext to arrest and imprison them be

#### Socialists Protest.

Mrs. De Lara was immediately no-tified of the arrest of her husband, and she went to the jail to find out what the charges against him were, but she was denied admission, the officer in charge pleading ignorance as to the matter.

After Mrs. De Lara, the officer remarked sareastically: "If you do not like the law, why don't you change it?" So Mrs. De Lara was forced to leave the jail without seeing her hus-

The news spread like wildfire throughout the city. The same evening it was reported at a propaganda meeting of the Socialist party and resolutions of protest were unanimously adopted, condemning the highhanded and autocratic methods of the

About 250 people marched to the city fall after the meeting and asked for the release of the imprisoned Socialists immediately. The protestants were forcibly ejected from the jall yard.
