That former labor leaders are now in the employ of the International Paper Company employing scabs to take the places of the striking workmen in the paper mills, is the statement made at the meeting of the Central Federated Union last night.

The union received a communication from the Rev. Charles Steiner, who is well known as a contributor of articles to labor journals, and who arranged the temperance meeting at the Toronto convention of the A. F. of L. last year, asking whether, in the opinion of the union, the salaries of the men who are now being employed by the paper makers are being paid in the interest of economy and organization.

A resolution was presented and passed for the appointment of a committee to wait upon the board of directors and inquire why union men who earn \$2 or thereabouts per day are being laid off in the interest of economy and organization.

Arthur Mercier, a stone mason, was laid off from the highest buildings in the country, was killed by falling with a stone from the second story of an apartment house in the course of construction, at 1514 Street and Riverside drive, yesterday afternoon.

Mercier was working from the roof level, released a 200-pound cornerstone that had been raised into place by a derrick.

for flames. They are of yellow pine and the pine and creosote make a combination which for smoke and flame would be hard to beat.

There was much difficulty getting at the fire, either from the land or water. Although the high pressure was brought into play it failed to reach the spot at first and some delay was experienced until lines of hose were hauled up to the bridge by ropes and the workers on the roadway turned fire fighters.

In the meantime the flames were spreading rapidly. A great pillar of smoke rose from the burning structure and floated away across the Williamsburg district and up the East river and made it dark as twilight.

Great Crowds Watch Flames. There certainly was an audience to watch this blaze. On the Brooklyn bridge there was a jam of people along the footwalk taking in the sight.

It was a dangerous fire to fight. As the heat shrunk and warped the steel work of the bridge great pieces of timber, bolts, fishplates, all manner of material came hurtling down and the firemen did not dare to get up under the fire to fight it.

It was almost an hour after the fire started before it was under control. The southern side of this long span was practically destroyed. It will have to be largely rebuilt and Brooklyn will wait for months for the opening of its new bridge, which is expected to do so much to relieve the situation over there and the traction situation over here.

### 50 POUNDS OF FOILED SHACKLETON

With That Amount of Provisions, Pole Quest Would Have Succeeded, He Declares.

Sir Ernest Shackleton, the British pioneer, declared to a group of men, who greeted him upon his return on the Lusitania yesterday, that he had but fifty pounds of food when at the point at which he abandoned quest of the South Pole, his dash to southernmost point would have been successful.

"We were then approximately miles from the pole. With fifty more of provisions we could have made it. But we were out of food, what would sustain us on the way to the ship, and for two months we had been living on twenty ounces a day."

"Do you yourself intend to try again?" "I have no intention," said Sir Ernest, "of heading any expedition to the Pole while Captain Scott is trying to reach it."
