Heaman continued to shout and pound the walls after he was locked in a cell. Inspector Flood preferred charges against him and stripped him of his shield. Inspector Walsh, whose district includes the 21st precinct, suspended Heaman.

Heaman was appointed to the police force September 16, 1908. He has been assigned to the 21st precinct ever since. In the East 22d street station last night it was said that Heaman was never known by his fellow officers to take a drink.

ROCKEFELLERS WON'T BUILD NEW CHURCH. Rev. Dr. Aked Tells His Congregation That the Two Johns Are Not Going to Give Up.

The John D. Rockefeller, father and son, are not going to build the new Fifth Avenue Baptist Church. At least, not if the Rev. Dr. Charles Aked did not intend to build it. He has some things to say at the morning service along this line yesterday morning.

Being a man with a very sharp tongue, when he wants to say those things he believes will cut, Dr. Aked did not mince matters with his congregation. He wants a fairly good-looking church, one that will cost a half million or so.

Some members of the church have proposed that the Rockefellers build the new church and save others the cost. They have gone to the pastor, the Rev. Dr. Charles E. Aked, and suggesting that he undertake to bring the thing about.

The Fifth Avenue Church was filled yesterday morning to hear the pastor tell of the plans for the new edifice. In the congregation were both John D. Rockefeller and John D. Rockefeller, Jr.

"I want to speak with some plainness," said the pastor when nearly through with his sermon. "There are those in our congregation who are coming to me and saying that two men, father and son, might build this \$500,000 church and their bank balance not know what was going on."

There were distributed to members of the congregation pamphlets describing the plans for the new edifice. Details of most of those plans have been made public, but some further progress has been made. The present site, 100x100 feet, will be utilized. A church in the Italian style, of light brick and white marble, great arched windows and ornamental portico, has been decided on, with main floor and gallery, the whole seating 1,600, and costing \$500,000, are the principal features.
