2,000 COOPERS STRIKE FOR HIGHER WAGES

Over 2,000 coopers, laborers and trimmers employed at the Brooklyn Copperage Company, at North 6th street and Kent avenue, went out on strike yesterday at 11 o'clock for an advance in wages.

OFFICIAL'S ARREST ORDERED BY GAYNOR

Sits as Magistrate and Issues Warrant for Arrest of Dockmaster on Charge of Grand Larceny.

Mayor Gaynor assumed a prerogative of his office yesterday that has never been utilized by any of his predecessors in the memory of the oldest City Hall politician.

That Mayor Gaynor has fully realized the almost unlimited scope it gives him in his campaign of reform is shown by his offer a few weeks ago to Police Commissioner Baker.

But today was the first time that the Mayor took advantage of this power, and when he had issued the warrant he sent word to Commissioner Baker to see that it was executed as quickly as possible.

The case of Cauldwell, who is being sought by the police to answer the charge of misappropriation of \$10,000 in wharfage fees, is one of the results of the investigation of the dock department.

The warrant for Cauldwell's arrest was issued at the request of Commissioner of Accounts Raymond Fosdick, who has been investigating Cauldwell's case, and who says in an affidavit that the dock master stole over \$10,000 in the past year.

Upon these moneys," continues the commissioner, "a triplicate ticket system has for many years been in operation. Under this system the dock master is obliged to punch through a triplicate folder of the ticket, so as to show the date and the amount of money received. The third folder of the ticket is then handed to the owner of the boat as a receipt, and the second is kept by the dock master, and the first forwarded to the department as a voucher, accompanying the report of moneys received."

ALBANY, April 21.—Papers incorporating the Third Avenue Railway Company of New York city, with a capital of \$16,590,000, were filed late this afternoon with the secretary of state.

The company is a reorganization of the Third Avenue Company, formed by interests which bought the property of the old company at the special master's foreclosure sale March 1.

The stock of the new company is divided into \$100 shares and the company paid the state a tax of \$8,295 for incorporation.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RENDERS DECISION

ALBANY, April 21.—Attorney General O'Malley rendered an opinion today to the state civil service commission, holding that employees of the Board of Education of the city New York other than superintendents, principals and teachers, are under the jurisdiction of the commission and not the municipal civil service commission.

The attorney general finds the Board of Education of New York city is constituted a body corporate, with the right to exercise powers independent of the city as a municipal corporation. He cites a number of decisions of the courts, including the case of Gunnison vs. the Board of Education of New York in which the Court of Appeals held that the Board of Education was a part of the state educational system and separated from all municipal functions; that public education undertaken in such manner is a state and not a municipal function of government.
