FORCED UPON MEXICANS AGAIN

Candidate Madero in Jail and Places Guarded by Troops, Election a Farce.

MEXICO CITY, June 27.—Porfirio Diaz's eighty-year-old despotism, which has been re-elected for the past thirty years, has been re-elected today that the Diaz police will continue for six years more. The polls opened yesterday were really no opposition to the Diaz. Francisco I. Madero, his opponent, was in the penitentiary at San Luis Potosi, other Liberal candidates were in jail and the voting was in charge of government troops. No disorders are reported and the election will be formally ratified in the chamber of deputies July 10. It is believed that the Diaz dynasty is being established.

The concession is for the exclusive operation of telephones in Constantinople, and environs, and is to run for thirty years from the date of its consummation.

STATE TREASURY EMPTY

Plan to Re-fill It "Without Too Great Strain on the People." ALBANY, June 27.—Assemblyman Andrew F. Murray, of New York, announced tonight that he would offer a resolution in the assembly tomorrow proposing the appointment of a committee of three senators and five assemblymen to investigate generally the question of replenishing the state treasury, and the most practical means of securing needed revenue "without too great a burden upon the people."

SOUNDS WARNING AGAINST OUR ERRORS

Professor Stryker Deplores Assumption of Authority and Insult to Japanese in His Baccalaureate Sermon. UTICA, June 28.—At the commencement exercises of Hamilton College President M. W. Stryker, in his baccalaureate sermon to the class of 1910, spoke strongly on the subject of the American nation's errors and sounded this warning note: "The assumption of an authority not definitely granted is larceny. Its insolent contempt of the citizen binds no one. America is restless and will soon be wrathful under it. Camp followers and flunkies—the would-be beneficiaries of that which usurps democracy, may well heed the warning on the wall. The inversion of the whole law of agency will end. The people are the constituency of the nation. They are responsible for the representatives, but never to them. Office is a trust, not a grant.
