

GVERNOR SCORES GRAND TRUNK ROAD

Official Says Railroad Violates Laws and Incites the Strikers to Riot.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 26.—Governor McKee, who is at South Bend, notified the governor today that, though everything is quiet here, he did not think the state should give attention to the strike of the Grand Trunk employees. He said the feeling was such that trouble would break out at any moment if the spirit could find a leader. He was ordered to remain at South Bend until further orders.

The attitude of the railroad company, Governor Marshall said, "The Grand Trunk people ought to know, as every one else knows, that the employment of special Pinkerton officers has much the same effect on strikers as a red flag has on an angry mob when waved in its face."

The railroad company morally has a right to call on the civil authorities to protect its property, and it becomes the duty of the authorities to supply the protection, but the railroad company forfeits this right when it violates the law of the state by the employment of special officers not eligible to act in an official capacity.

BATTLENAKE STRIKES CHILD.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., July 26.—While playing in the back yard of her parents' home on Brooklyn Heights today, Adele Walsh, seven years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Walsh, well known society people here, was bitten by a rattlesnake and will probably die. The child ran upon the snake as it was coiled to strike and it darted its fangs into her left hand.

FARMER ENDS HIS LIFE.

NEWBURG, N. Y., July 26.—Lewis Claussen, a former resident of Brooklyn, who came here five years ago to take up farming, committed suicide during the night by hanging himself to a limb of a tree in a lonely place on his farm, near Leptondale. The cause for the act is known. He was about sixty years of age. The body will be taken to Brooklyn for burial.

STEEL CORPORATION'S REPORTED STEALINGS

Stockholders "Earned" \$40,170,000 Through Their Wonderful Brain Capacity and—Others Labor.

The United States Steel Corporation, after the market closed yesterday afternoon, declared the regular quarterly dividend of 1 1/2 per cent on the common and 1 1/2 per cent on the preferred stock. It had been persistently rumored in Wall street all day that the common dividend would be cut, and the announcement that it would be continued was welcomed, although it came too late to have any effect on the stock market.

MAD SCRAMBLE FOR DEAD WOMAN'S MONEY

WHITE PLAINS, July 25.—There promises to be a bitter fight before the will of Mary E. Brinkerhoff, who died in April, leaving about \$7,000,000 to a few relatives and friends, and several charitable institutions, is admitted for probate. The matter came up this morning before Surrogate Millard, and was adjourned until September 19.

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BARCELONA, Viceroy, Franco-Spanish Frontier, July 26.—Owing to the report of government spies that a bloody revolution is imminent, 10,000 troops and 2,000 additional gendarmes, armed with rifles and riot cartridges, today occupied strategic positions all over the city of Barcelona, which is practically under martial law, though the constitution has not yet been suspended.

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In the two former cities and the troops are being held in their barracks so that they can depart without the delay of a minute.

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TURTLES AND DIPLOMACY.

Nicaragua Franchise Transferred From English to Yankee Control.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, July 26.—The government has been informed that the Nicaragua revolutionists under the leadership of General Estrada have abrogated the treaty by which British subjects are given the right to catch turtles on the Cayman Islands and in the waters thereof, and are making arrangements to give the rights to an American, who is trying to corner the turtle supply.

FOUR DEAD IN TIDAL WAVE.

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, July 26.—Four persons are known to have perished in a destructive tidal wave which swept the harbor here this afternoon, and it is feared that the death toll will mount higher.

CLOUDBURST KILLS 25.

BUDAPEST, Hungary, July 26.—Twenty-five persons perished in a flood that followed a cloudburst at the town of Dees today. The damage to property and crops was heavy.

A CARROLL BAIL BOND REFUSED

Magistrate O'Reilly Wouldn't Accept Former Court Clerk's Surety. Case Goes to Supreme Court.

When Lawrence F. Carroll, the former chief clerk of the Manhattan Avenue Police Court, Williamsburg, went before Magistrate O'Reilly, in the Bedford Avenue Police Court, yesterday, to furnish a bail bond for three men who had been arrested on a charge of intoxication, the magistrate declined to accept him as a surety, because of the criticism from Commissioner of Accounts Fosdick to Mayor Gaynor, relative to Daniel J. Carroll, a son of Lawrence F. Carroll, who declared that the former clerk's son had several times given the house he lives in on North 2d street as surety.

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LABORERS MAY LOSE VACATION

Alderman James J. Mulhearn, of the 26th district, has sent a protest to Cyrus C. Miller, president of the Bronx, in regard to the report that day laborers on city work in that borough are not to have a vacation, as required by a new law.

"I cannot see for the life of me how you can refuse to give the men a vacation," writes Alderman Mulhearn. "You are obliged to obey the law, and inasmuch as the legislature makes the laws, and as the act emanated from the legislature, and is constitutional, therefore you are in duty bound to obey it. The men employed under you have worked harder and more conscientiously with the expectation of receiving a two weeks' vacation as a reward since the law went into effect."

Alderman Mulhearn declares that the per diem system of payment for employees of the highway and sewer bureaus and the department of parks should be done away with, the men being placed on the salary list, at a stated amount per annum, and made use of, in winter, in clearing away snow and ice.
