

TEXTILE WORKERS IN BUSY SESSION

The convention of the United Textile Workers of America, now in session at 8 Union Square, after hearing the report of the committee on resolutions yesterday, unanimously went on record as favoring woman suffrage, and all the delegates pledged to help the movement for the enfranchisement of women.
