ASKS ELUCIDATION OF WARREN DECISION

Even Capitalist Paper Can't See How Court Made Distinction.

A singular case, arousing widespread attention throughout the West and very little in the East, is that of Mr. Fred Warren, editor of the Appeal to Reason, a Socialist monthly published in Girard, Kan.

Nevertheless, the Supreme Court, by a majority vote, decided that the kidnapping was legal. So Mr. Warren thought of a novel plan by which to test that decision.

Mr. Warren did exactly what police officials in Kentucky did. He sent out circulars offering a reward for the return of Taylor to the Kentucky authorities, and before mailing the circulars he was assured by the postmaster at Girard that they were not in violation of the mailing laws.

Kidnapping of the labor leaders was legal and proper. Mr. Warren's offer of a reward to any one who would kidnap a man under indictment for murder and return him to the state where the crime was committed, is so the court says, a crime.
