



SUPREME COURT SHOWS UP MUNSEY

'Conservative' Magazine Accepts Transportation for Advertising Railroad.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—That railroads under the Elkins and Hepburn acts cannot legally exchange free transportation for advertising space in newspapers and magazines was the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States today.

Y., caused a sensation in the county courthouse here today when he said that he and another patient in the Matteawan State Hospital saw John J. Nugent, whose death in the hospital is now being investigated by the state, murdered by attendants.

DIAB MINISTER SAYS REBELS WILL WIN

PARIS, Feb. 20.—In a review of the crisis in Mexico today Jose Yves Limantour, minister of finance in the cabinet of President Diaz, declared that the only basis for peace was that the insurgents lay down their arms pending negotiations with the government, which, on its part, should grant a reform of the evils that made the revolution possible.

Charles A. Belling, third vice president of the Bronx National Bank, who got \$3,000 from the Knickerbocker Trust Company on forged securities, pleaded guilty before Judge Foster in Part 1 of General Sessions yesterday, to forgery in the first degree, and will be sentenced on Thursday.

PARDONS SOUGHT FOR 16 MINERS IN JAIL

DENVER, Colo., Feb. 20.—Following the refusal of the Supreme Court of Colorado to interfere in the case of the sixteen miners illegally jailed for violation of an injunction issued by Judge Crowley Whitford, organized labor, under the leadership of the officers of the miners' unions, is preparing to make an immediate effort to get Governor Shafer to pardon the men.

BOILER MAKERS CALL A GENERAL STRIKE ON N. Y. C.

Superintendent of Motive Power D. R. McBain, issued the following statement: "The boiler makers really have no grievance. About half of them were put on piecework and their wages increased from 50 to 55 per cent as a result. It appears, however, that piecework is contrary to their constitution, and a change was demanded."

DEPEW MEN GO OUT

RUFFALO, N. Y., Feb. 20.—One hundred and twenty-five boiler makers in the New York Central shops at Depew went on strike today in compliance with the general strike order issued at Kansas City.

THIRTY-FIVE MEN AT OSWEGO OUT

OSWEGO, N. Y., Feb. 20.—Thirty-five boiler makers employed at the New York Central shops here struck this morning in sympathy with the boiler makers at Collinswood, Ohio, who are on strike over the introduction of the piecework system there.

EAST SYRACUSE MEN JOIN

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Feb. 20.—Twenty-five boiler makers at the New York Central shops at East Syracuse went out this morning following the general strike order issued by the national executive council this morning.

100 WEST ALBANY MEN REBEL

ALBANY, Feb. 20.—One hundred boiler makers employed at the New York Central shops at West Albany struck today as a protest against being paid by piecework, demanding that they be paid by the hour.

N. Y., N. H. and H. Not Hit

NEW HAVEN, Feb. 20.—At the offices of the New Haven road word was given out today that no trouble was expected from a strike of boiler makers. The local officers expressed the belief that the labor troubles would be confined to the New York Central and its affiliated roads, of which the Boston and Albany is one.
