### COURT FORCED TO ACT TO PROTECT WORKERS

#### Ban Placed on Factory Until Owners Obey Fire Regulations.

Supreme Court Justice Kelly of Kings County issued an order yesterday restraining Samuel Schindelman & Co., owners, and Jacob Pastor, Morris Scholnick, Morris Blum, Henry Buchman, William Marx and Charles Roudinsky, tenants of the five-story brick factory, building at 131 Boerum street, Brooklyn, from continuing the use of the building until they have complied with the installation of adequate fire escapes and other protective appliances.

Following the fact that yesterday was a Jewish holiday the order was not served on the tenants, each of whom conducts a tailoring establishment in the building.

There are four sweatshops in the building employing more than 100 persons, and the building has been known to be a fire trap for a long time. The dark stairway leading through the building is only three feet wide and there is a very narrow fire escape with a winding stairs.

1 KILLED, 5 FATALLY HURT IN EXPLOSION. CINCINNATI, Ohio, April 20.—One man was instantly killed and five fatally injured when a huge tank at the Fischmann yeast establishment in Riverside exploded today.

CHOOSE EQUITABLE HEAD. At the meeting of the directors of the Equitable Life Assurance Society yesterday afternoon William A. Day, who has been acting president of the organization since the sudden death of Paul Morton, was formally elected president. It was reported that there were only three votes cast in opposition to Day, although the trustees of the majority stock had asked that no election be held yesterday, as it might interfere with the proposed mutualization of the society.

R. H. LEE, DOCKMASTER, FREED. On the motion of an assistant district attorney, Jacob, the indictment found against Richard H. Lee, formerly a city dockmaster, on information furnished to the Mayor by the Commissioner of Accounts, R. B. Fockler, was dismissed yesterday by Judge Swann in General Sessions. Lee was discharged.

FAKE MEDICINE CONCERNS RAIDED BY POSTAL DEPT. Five Managers Held in Bail, Charged With Fraud. HAD LARGE INCOME

Firms Vouched to Cure Ills by Fakes, Thus Swindling Poor. Acting under the instructions of Chief Postal Inspector Dickson, several of his men swooped down upon fake medical institutions yesterday with the result that several alleged proprietors were arrested and held in bail. It is understood that the raids yesterday are but a part of the postal authorities program to put out of business men who by their craftiness swindle the poor and ignorant of their few dollars, which in a year amounts to many thousands.

Doctors Arrested. Those arrested include Dr. Ferdinand Hartmann, of the Hartmann Medical Company; Frank Donnelly, treasurer and manager of that company; Albert Deland, alleged proprietor of the Universal Medical Institute; Dr. W. W. Taylor, its prescribing physician, and Dr. Leonard Lardes, of the Vienna Medical Institute.

Convict at Old Trade. According to Chief Inspector Dickson, the Hartmann Company and the Universal Medical Institute have been receiving \$75,000 annually, or more, from patrons of foreign birth, principally laborers. When the raid upon the Universal Institute was made, the postoffice inspectors were surprised to find in its employ one Stephen Gabelch, who only eleven days ago finished serving a sentence on a charge similar to that made against his employer today.

How They Work It. Of the Vienna Medical Institute, Dickson said: "The business is conducted in about 15 different languages, but no English correspondence is attempted. Persons inclined to open correspondence are sent letters by mail promising or guaranteeing to effect cures by sending medicine and by electricity."

At the Hartmann Medical Company on East 14th street the inspectors found the largest establishment of all. It was this concern that did the largest mail order business. In comparison it seemed to be very little with calling patients, but the correspondence with South American countries was its specialty. Over a dozen persons were taken from there to Police Headquarters.

Dr. Ferdinand Hartmann, head of the business, was arrested and so was Frank Donnelly, his draughtsman. In the correspondence office were found seven "translators" and nearly a dozen stenographers pounding away on typewriters in various languages.

Dr. Dickson's memorandum about the Universal Medical Institute is as follows: "A medical mail order business is operated at the address given by Dr. William W. Taylor, in the name of the Universal Medical Institute, similar in all respects to that conducted by William R. Rudolph in the name of the Collins New York Medical Institute, but it is understood that one Albert J. Deland is the owner. The latter was prosecuted in 1909 by the Medical Society of the County of New York for practicing medicine without a license, and since that time Dr. Taylor has been the active manager. Translators are employed to read and translate the various inquiries received in the foreign languages, and to advise the doctor as to the diseases with which the patients and prospective patients are suffering. The average amount of mail received daily is about seventy-five orders and ten registered letters. It is estimated that \$75,000 annually, or more, is received from victims."
