B. OF M. OPPOSED TO 8-HOUR STRIKE

Claims Object Is to Break Up Brotherhood--2,000 Members Present.

At a mass meeting of the Brotherhood of Machinists held in the Murray Hill Lyceum, 34th Street and Third Avenue, yesterday afternoon, the eight-hour strike of the International Association of Machinists was called inopportune and it was charged that the motive is simply to break up the Brotherhood.

Resolved, That while we are heartily in favor of securing shorter hours for all the workers in the machine industry, we do not consider that the strike called by the International Association of Machinists is opportune in view of the present poor condition of business in the industry.

After the meeting the Press Committee gave out the following statement regarding the Brotherhood's position in the present strike:

It is considered an inopportune time to call a strike in view of the exceedingly poor condition of the trade, carrying with it an army of unemployed in every city, who, because of necessity, would be more ready than usual to take the places of the strikers.

THOUSANDS MADE HOMELESS BY FIRE

Tents Give Shelter to Victims of Bangor, Me., Calamity.

BANGOR, Me., May 1.—With scores of sister cities standing by ready to render any kind of assistance deemed necessary, Bangor today declared she can take care of her own. The fire which started Saturday was the worst in this State in half a century.

FLAGRANT GRAFT IN OHIO LEGISLATURE

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 1.—Latest developments today indicate that one of the greatest bribery scandals in the history of the United States is about to be exposed in the Ohio Legislature by the Franklin County Grand Jury, which begins its investigation tomorrow.

It is declared that 19 members of the Senate alone will be charged with hoodling before the investigation ends. In the House even a greater number are said to be involved and the detectives say that at least 30 there will be charged with hoodling.
