TAFT PLANS INVASION OF MEXICO IN NEXT FEW DAYS; CALL FOR 200,000 VOLUNTEERS READY TO BE ISSUED

President Has Already Called In Faithful Newspapermen and Outlined Plan for Forcible Entry.

FORCED TO ACT BY POWERS Administration Knows European Governments Will Disregard Monroe Doctrine if U. S. Troops Are Not Rushed In to Protect Property Interests.

Administration Knows European Governments Will Disregard Monroe Doctrine if U. S. Troops Are Not Rushed In to Protect Property Interests.

(Special to The Call.)
WASHINGTON, May 4.—Some day between now and May 20, possibly within a week, 15,000 American soldiers and marines will invade Mexico by way of Vera Cruz and march on the City of Mexico. Simultaneous with this invasion, President Taft will issue a call for 200,000 American volunteers to assist in the second conquest of Mexico. This information is absolutely correct. It is a brief description of plans already perfected and approved by President Taft.

The knowledge of this stupendous plan of conquest is today in possession of perhaps one hundred newspaper proprietors in the United States.

President Taft took the representatives of these newspapers into "executive session" late Tuesday and imparted to them the secret design of the administration with regard to Mexico.

If any proof were needed of the correctness of this statement, it is supplied in abundance by the stories printed this morning in the newspapers referred to.

Without a single exception these newspapers this morning began the campaign of inspired articles which are relied upon to prepare the public for the invasion and call for volunteers.

"MUST PREPARE PUBLIC."—TAFT.

This campaign is begun also as a part of the instructions issued to the newspapers by President Taft.

The Chief Executive made it plain to the reporters that such a campaign of stories to prepare the public mind was absolutely essential to the success of the invasion.

He pointed out that there was a growing sentiment in the country against warfare, and particularly against wars of conquest.

He even went so far as to state that if the American public should know of the contemplated war against Mexico two weeks in advance they would make it impossible to raise an army of volunteers.

Indeed, he urged, such a cry of protest was likely to go up that it would be impossible for the administration to use the regular army men in such an enterprise.

No surprise need be felt that Taft should ask for a great army of 200,000 volunteers. Several of the reporters with whom the President talked in secret asked him why this great number of volunteers were to be recruited. The President made it perfectly plain

LONG WAR IN PROSPECT.

As one of these reporters wrote to his employer:

The President explained that his own experience and that of the McKinley and Roosevelt administrations in the Philippine Islands has shown that it was folly to suppose that a small number of troops, however highly trained and perfectly equipped, would be able to subdue Mexico.

He stated that the invasion of Mexico would certainly mean many months and perhaps years of hard fighting against a people who would split up into guerrilla bands as the war progressed and continue to harass the American troops from their mountain retreats.

Taft's reason for this conquest of Mexico, indeed his very necessity, from the administration point of view, is found in the fact that the Monroe Doctrine must be upheld.

MUST DEFEND MONROE DOCTRINE.

That sacred doctrine, which stipulates that no European nation shall set foot on the Western Hemisphere, is in greater peril today than it ever has been before.

The German Government is leading in the demand upon Taft that European subjects and investments be rescued from the state of "anarchy" now prevailing there.

Great Britain and Spain are also bringing strong pressure. The approach of the Mexican insurgents to within a few miles of Diaz's capital, the killing of many Spanish subjects and the spread of the revolution beyond all possibility of Diaz to control, have made it imperative for Taft to act or to see himself and his administration thrust aside by foreign warships and men under arms.

The order to invade Mexico will be given the moment American or other foreign residents in Mexico City are harmed or seriously threatened.

The preparations for the invasion are complete to the point of being startling.

THE COMPLETE PLAN OF WAR.

There are 2,000 American marines stationed at Guantanamo, Cuba, within fifty-six hours' sailing of Vera Cruz. It is calculated that this number of men, armed with rapid fire guns, will be sufficient to effect a landing at Vera Cruz and establish a beachhead.

These will be followed immediately by 10,000 soldiers, including the thirty-six companies of coast artillery, infantry and cavalry from Galveston, Tex.

When the marines leave Guantanamo their number will be greatly increased, perhaps doubled, by detachments from New York, Philadelphia, and Norfolk.

At least 15,000 men, armed with the most destructive weapons of modern warfare, will constitute the first wave of invasion.

The newspapers with which President Taft has shared the secret preparations. The call for troops will be sprung at the psychological moment. This campaign of preparation has already begun with the publication of the terrible danger now facing American and other foreign residents in Mexico.

HAS U. S. NO DESIGNS ON MEXICAN LAND?

We Shall See---Entire Northwestern Slice Likely to Be Eaten Up.

During the past few days Taft and his various mouthpieces have laid great stress upon the contention that the United States have no designs upon the territory of any other nation. They make this statement in the face of facts of history which show that this country has never waged a victorious war without taking vast areas of its beaten rivals' domain.

In 1848 the United States wrested from Mexico more than half of her territory. In 1898 the United States took from Spain the Philippine Islands, Porto Rico, Cuba and many smaller possessions. In each of these possessions the American flag is now supreme.

Cuba is allowed to play at house-keeping, but the marines which will form the advance guard in the invasion of Mexico are at this moment garrisoned on Cuban soil.

The truth is that Mexico is about to lose the entire northern half of her territory to the United States with the probability that a Provisional Government will be inaugurated under American auspices in the command of her domain.

It has been pointed out in The Call's Washington dispatches that Wall Street (the Morgan-Rockefeller-Guggenheim interests) intends to take from Mexico all of that vast territory lying north of a line drawn straight from the mouth of the Rio Grande westward to the southernmost point of Lower California.

In the dispatches referred to it was stated that agents of the Steel Trust had found the entire peninsula of Southern California to be composed of a great iron deposit. To quote further from The Call's news columns of April 19, in which an Englishman just returned from Mexico was quoted as saying:

"Within recent years foreign investors have learned that Mexico is rich in mineral wealth far beyond the knowledge generally held. Mining experts have ascertained that the great gold, silver and copper veins which have been tapped here and there throughout the Rocky Mountains and coast range as far north as the Yukon River and beyond have really preserved their greatest riches for Mexico.

"It is as though the mineral deposits of the North had been drained off into Mexico during some ancient geological movement, leaving man to discover the paltry pockets of the United States and Canada before he came upon the reservoir of riches in the Sierra Madre. Truly the mother promises to become the most prolific parent of precious minerals.

"It is interesting and significant at this time to know that recent mineral explorations there have resulted in the discovery of considerable deposits of tin, that rarest of the base metals.

"The great capitalists of the world were quick to grasp the meaning of this discovery. The Welsh tin mines long since gave out, and those of the Strait Settlements are in their last years of productiveness. The finding of tin in Mexico must serve to make capital even more covetous of that land."

TROOPS MASSES IN READINESS

It must be remembered that almost the entire number of American troops now on the border, numbering about 15,000 men on a complete war footing, are centered in that terrible triangle of Southern Texas with San Antonio on the northern base and the army post at Brownsville at the southern apex.

Galveston, the port from which these troops will sail for Vera Cruz, lies a few miles to the eastward. The entire army corps is within less than a day's travel from Galveston.

Army transports are in waiting at New York, Philadelphia, Norfolk and Guantanamo, Cuba. When Taft gives the word, as he has planned to do in a few days, the combined force of 15,000 troops will be on the ocean before the American people realize what has happened.

Down in that little Texas triangle are thirty-six batteries of coast artillery. Armed with heavy caliber guns, they will embark with the first troops out of Galveston.

It is possible that a few additional regiments of the regular army will be sent across the border into Chihuahua and Sonora, but the administration relies on the 200,000 volunteers to reinforce the first invaders.

CONGRESS HEARS TRUTH SPOKEN

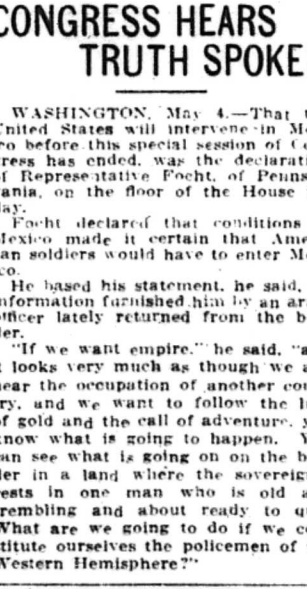
WASHINGTON, May 4.—That the United States will intervene in Mexico before this special session of Congress has ended, was the declaration of Representative Faeth, of Pennsylvania, on the floor of the House today.

Faeth declared that conditions in Mexico made it certain that American soldiers would have to enter Mexico.

He based his statement, he said, on information furnished him by an army officer lately returned from the border.

"If we want empire," he said, "and it looks very much as though we are near the occupation of another country, and we want to follow the lure of gold and the call of adventure, you know what is going to happen. You can see what is going on on the border in a land where the sovereignty rests in one man who is old and trembling and about ready to quit. What are we going to do if we constitute ourselves the policemen of the Western Hemisphere?"

Showing how easy it will be for the United States to overrun Mexico with troops, Galveston, San Antonio, New Orleans, and Guantanamo are within easy striking distance of Vera Cruz, which is only eight and one-half hours' ride from Mexico City. The first corps of 2,000 marines will be rushed from Guantanamo, Cuba, to Vera Cruz, Mexico, where they will be joined by the 10,000 heavily armed and perfectly equipped soldiers from Galveston. Guantanamo is about 1,000 miles by sea from Vera Cruz, while Galveston is some 700 miles distant. Troops leaving Guantanamo and Galveston one morning will be at Vera Cruz before the following night.

OPPORTUNITY FOR INTERVENTION COMES

European Diplomats Having Fled, "Anarchy" Howl Is Raised.

It will be recalled that on April 20 The Call printed a special dispatch from Washington in which it was announced that certain European powers were about to execute a naval demonstration off the coast of Mexico in order to compel the Taft administration to intervene.

At that time it was supposed that England, France and Germany would spring this sensation in order to excite the American people to a pitch which would permit the United States to undertake the invasion.

It must be remembered that the financiers of these nations are losing millions every month that the revolution against Diaz continues and they are willing even that this country should become ruler of Mexico rather than permit things to continue as at present.

On the date mentioned The Call dispatch said:

"The most significant of these circumstances is that the diplomatic representatives of England, France, and Germany have fled from Mexico. This is precisely the state of affairs which existed just prior to the invasion of Mexico by the allied nations of Europe leading up to the establishing of the empire of Maximilian during the American Civil War.

"Several weeks ago the French Minister of Mexico boarded a French warship at Vera Cruz, which conveyed him to Havana, Cuba. Persons interested in the Mexican situation learned that the French Minister was busy exchanging cablegrams with his government during his stay in Havana. The exact purport of these messages is, of course, not known."

The Ministers of England, France, and Germany did flee from Mexico many weeks ago and they have not returned since. All of them left Mexico by way of Cuba. It is presumed that they knew what was up and wanted to have a look at the American military preparations at Guantanamo and vicinity.

It now appears that Taft changed his plans for a European naval demonstration following the publicity given the scheme and promised to find other grounds for intervention. The desired grounds have come with the continued success of the Mexican rebels, which Wall Street newspapers are rapidly converting into "anarchy" and peril to foreign residents in the country.

LOCAL PRESS IS OBEDIENT

The big newspapers in league with Taft, according to The Call's Washington correspondent, received their momentous tips from the White House on Wednesday, yesterday (Thursday) morning, the very day following the receipt of the big news, the New York Times had two first-page stories on the Mexican situation.

The biggest of these stories followed a headline which read: "Anarchy Rules Mexican States—Unless Diaz and Madero

In Face of Plans to Fight for Powers of Capitalism in Mexico, Taft Acts Hypocrite.

INTONES SONG OF BLESSED PEACE

Assistant Secretary of State Wilson Tells How the Capitalist Press Can Make Itself Useful by Being Careful in This Emergency.

In this situation of vital peril, almost without parallel in the history of the nation, the hypocrisy of President Taft, who attended the big Peace Conference at Baltimore and magnified his duplicity in a public address, is of unusual interest.

When Taft arose to address the peace advocates he knew that the very words he uttered concerning the pacific intentions and aspirations of his administration would be drowned in a tidal wave of carnage before the month was out.

He knew that the plans were all made for this carnage. He knew that he himself helped perfect these cold-blooded plans and that his word would spring the death trap on thousands of American and Mexican people.

To quote the President's own words:

"NO TERRITORIAL AGGRANDIZEMENT."

"One of the difficulties the United States finds is the natural suspicion that the countries engaged have of the motive which the United States has in rendering its good offices. Asseveration of good faith helps but little where the suspicion is real.

"Yet I like to avail myself of an opportunity in such a presence as this to assert that there is not in the whole length and breadth of the United States among its people any desire for territorial aggrandizement, and that its people as a whole will not permit its government, if it would, to take any steps in respect to foreign people looking to a forcible extension of our political power."

But even as he spoke these words, designed to counteract the charges directed against the United States from the little republics of Central and South America, and more especially intended to betray the intelligence of the American people, upon whom he will call for 200,000 volunteer soldiers within a fortnight, William H. Taft was smitten by a recollection of the black secret within his heart.

He paused a moment, and then continued:

"RESPONSIBILITY THRUST UPON US."

"We have had wars and we know what they are. We know what responsibilities they entail, the burdens and losses and horrors, and we would have none of them. We have a magnificent domain of our own in which we are attempting to work out and show to the world success in popular government, and we need no more territory in which to show that.

"But we have attained great prosperity and great power. We have become a powerful member of the community of nations in which we live, and there is therefore thrust upon us necessarily a care and responsibility for the peace of the world in our neighborhood and a burden of helping those nations that cannot help themselves, if we may do that peacefully and effectively."

"If we may do that peacefully and effectively," The President's words had skimmed so near to his secret that he seemed to fear their effect and in trepidation added, "If we may do so peacefully and effectively."

Those words must have rung hollow and faint in his own ears. What could "peace" have to do with 2,000 marines mobilized at Guantanamo, 10,000 soldiers at Galveston, more at San Antonio, and the plans already laid for hurling them against Vera Cruz?

What have 200,000 American soldiers invading Mexico to do with "peaceful assistance to those nations in our neighborhood that cannot help themselves?"

ANGLO-SAXON ARBITRATION TRICK.

At that precious peace conference Taft heard himself lauded for his great service to mankind as a peacemaker in having negotiated a treaty of arbitration with Great Britain.

Andrew Carnegie, who might utilize any genuine humanitarian instincts he possesses by alleviating the hideous condition of his steel slaves instead of shouting for international peace simply because peace has suddenly become profitable, almost wept in eulogizing Taft on account of that treaty with England.

But both Carnegie and Taft knew as they faced that Baltimore audience that plans for war with Mexico had been perfected and that the hasty treaty with Great Britain was only a part of the great international defense necessary to the carrying out of the conquest of Mexico.

It is definitely known that the investments of English financiers in Mexico are even greater than those of Wall Street. The fact is that while the whole of Northern Mexico is the property of American capitalists, the southern part of the country is owned by the Britishers.

ANGLO-SAXON MONEY BAGS.

When the invasion of Mexico is sprung on the world a howl will go up from the rivals of the Anglo-Saxon financiers, and England and the United States will find it necessary to stand absolutely shoulder to shoulder to defend their money bags.

European rivals will hesitate to start a war lest they violate the newly formed treaty of "universal peace" between the two great English speaking races.

Cardinal Gibbons has pointed to the beautiful rainbow of promise which has made its appearance as a gorgeous arch spanning the Atlantic Ocean, and the patriotic American people are relied upon to stiffen their backbones and growl fiercely at the nation daring to spoil the picture by calling armed attention to the bloody

NO CONFIRMATION OF ARK STEALING STORY.

LONDON, May 4.—No confirmation has yet been received of the alleged theft by a party of English of valuable relics from the Mosque of Omar in Jerusalem.
