"RULE OF REASON" REVERSES DECISION U. S. Circuit Court Finds No "Restraint" Where a Shipper Discriminates.

The "Rule of Reason" is making a hit. The United States Circuit Court for this circuit, which will pass upon the reorganization plan of the Tobacco Trust, is a firm believer in such "rules" as laid down by that most worthless of judicial bodies, the Supreme Court, when the latter body held up the "Rule of Reason" in the Standard Oil and Tobacco cases.

Yesterday's majority opinion called attention to the fact that when the case was on appeal previous to the Standard Oil decision the question of reasonable restraint was not deemed material, but in view of the position now taken by the Supreme Court this question must be taken into consideration.

SHIPPING TIED UP BY MEXICO STRIKE

Vessels Unable to Discharge Cargo—Employees of Waters-Pierce Oil Co. Quit—Trouble Spreads. TAMPECO, Mexico, July 27.—The strike situation here has assumed a serious phase. All shipping has been tied up for several days on account of the strike of dock laborers.

CHICAGO'S MAYOR THREATENS STRIKERS

CHICAGO, July 27.—"Rioting by striking peddlers must stop, even if you have to pack them in cells three deep," was the order issued today by Mayor Carter H. Harrison, and as a result assistant Police Chief Schuetter detailed 500 reserves to duty in the commission house section and in the residential districts where the strikers have clashed with the police.

LOS ANGELES LABOR MEN STILL IN JAIL

Connors, Maple and Bender Likely to Be Kept There Till After Mc-Namara Trial.

LOS ANGELES, July 20.—Through a mistake on the part of a news service the impression has gone abroad that Connors, Maple and Bender, the striking metal workers who are accused of conspiring to place explosives near the Hall of Records, have been released from custody.

AUBURN, Ind., July 27.—The damning hypocrisy of Governor Marshall of this State was never before more clearly manifested than today when he appeared in this little town to tell the country folk about the abuses visited upon the American people by institutions of judicial procedure, which are in reality abortions of justice, and Governor Marshall himself has been proven to be a malpractitioner after rape had been committed upon justice.

"JUSTICE" METED OUT TO MACHINISTS

More "justice" was meted out to the striking machinists in Brooklyn yesterday when Chief Magistrate Kempner, sitting in the Adams Street Court, fined Ernest Henry, a striker, \$10 on the charge of assaulting a scab employed by the E. W. Bliss Company, 53d street, South Brooklyn. Henry produced six witnesses that he did not assault the scab, but the magistrate thought that Policeman Resard's testimony was good enough for him to fine the striker \$10.

Chopak's dress making establishment, because the firm compelled its employees to work sixty hours a week and reduced their wages \$4 per week. This firm had recently moved here from New York, where it operated a plant at 189 East 59th street.

No Trace of Murderer Who Killed W. H. Jackson, Near Dist. Atty. Whitman's Apartment. A thief slipped, early yesterday morning, into the Hotel Iroquois, at 49 West 44th street, just across the way from the Bar Association and the Royalton apartments, and murdered William Henry Jackson, an old man of means who had been the cashier of the brokerage concern of Van Schaick & Co. for thirty years, as well as a customer of that house in stock trading.

Got \$3 First Week. "The strike for an eight-hour day occurred on May 1, and I came out on strike, without knowing about it a week ahead. I stood out on strike for three weeks, and at the end of the third week I received \$3. I spoke up in the meeting of 434, I. A. of M., that night and complained that I could not get along on \$3 a week, as I had a family and a sick child. President Mortimer told me that this question was out of order and that I had nothing to say. Nothing more was said about this until later in the evening, when Stigenbauer, the business agent of 434, arose in the meeting and said that those who were complaining about receiving \$3 a week as a strike benefit should go ahead and scab it, and they would be taken care of in a more simple and cheaper way.
