HOW TO DISTRIBUTE SOCIALIST LEAFLETS

Methods of Doing This Discussed at Party Meeting Yesterday.

"Literature Distribution" was the subject discussed at the general meeting of Local New York, Socialist party, held yesterday afternoon at the Labor Temple, 243 East 84th street.

Heidemann began his talk by disclaiming any intention of saying the final word on the subject of literature distribution.

He said that he only wanted to tell something of the methods employed by Branch 5 in the distribution of leaflets in its territory.

The speaker went on to say that the records showed how successful the work had been.

Continuing, Heidemann explained that the main difficulty of this work was in getting volunteers to do the distributing.

Various means were used to get workers. Appeals in the party press proved effective and Heidemann added that the present literature agent, A. I. Wolfson, was having appeals for distributors made at open air meetings, with good results.

The speaker gave his opinion of the value of the different methods of distribution, whether from house to house, at subway and elevated stations or at meetings.

In telling of the distribution itself, Heidemann said that ninety-nine out of a hundred people to whom the distributors hand leaflets at the doors of the flats or apartments are polite and ready to accept the reading matter offered.

The workers ring the door bell of every flat and hand the leaflet to the one who answers, with a polite request that it be carefully read.

Heidemann warned against giving the distributee too large a territory to cover. If he has too many places to call at, the last of the work is apt to be done in a mechanical manner.

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"Your donation of \$50 is but a small one to relieve the distress among the families of thousands of strikers. But it was not, and it is not, financial aid that we ask of you.

"We thought that recalling to your mind that you were once a wage earner would awake the memory that a job was the most important thing to you at that period, and that impressed with this you would understand the those who work for wages are more interested in what relates directly to that question than they are to the one you gave out in your bid for votes.

"Your mistake may be corrected. Please state publicly whether the business men's votes are more important to you than the votes of men forced to strike to protect old wage earners in their right to work to make a livelihood."

"No reply was made to this exhortation, and no reply was received to the following letter which was sent to 'Brother Ed,' the campaign manager for 'Brother Bill.'"

"We are workmen and our interest in any candidate for public office is governed by what he can or will do for us. Our first consideration is the welfare of ourselves and families. Our welfare rests upon the jobs we work at and the treatment we get from those who hire us."

"We make these statements to you because we understand that you are the campaign manager for your brother, W. S. Vane, who is now seeking the nomination for Mayor on the Republican ticket, and we want to know where you and he stand in the fight we are making to have the Baldwin Locomotive Works keep in its employ old hands whose toil have made it a world-known corporation. We want to be in a position to tell the voters who sell their labor for wages, whether you and your brother put the dollar before the man, or whether you will stand for the right old wage earners to be kept at work by the bosses they have made wealthy."

"We speak plainly, for our fight is a life and death struggle. To us the question of employment after reaching middle life is far more important than who shall draw the salary paid to the Mayor. And as our votes give him the job, we want to know what the candidate for Mayor will do for us in relation to our jobs. As the campaign manager of your brother, we ask you to declare publicly whether you are on the side of the Baldwin Locomotive Works, or on the side of the strikers."

ESTIMATE BOARD HITS NEW CHARTER

Twelve of Board's Sixteen Votes Are Against Objectionable Tammany-Gaynor Instrument.

The committee of the Board of Estimate which was appointed last April to pass upon the new charter reported yesterday that, despite the amendments which have been made in the charter, it is still objectionable to the majority of the board.

The committee is opposed to the proposition to take from the Board of Estimate the control of transit matters. The committee also objects to the provision which puts in the Mayor's hands the naming of the committee of the Board of Estimate for the preparing of the budget.

Another clause in the charter opposed by the committee is the proposal to take the appointment of the city engineer from the Board of Estimate.

"The fact," the report says, "that he is to be appointed by the Mayor, and to be answerable only to him, would absolutely divest from the board the authority over the engineering side of the immense amount of public work now committed to it by law, which it has exercised for years."

The report is signed by Controller Prendergast, Borough Presidents McAneny of Manhattan, Steers of Brooklyn, Miller of the Bronx and Cromwell of Richmond. It was added that President Mitchell, of the Board of Aldermen, who is on his way from Europe, had authorized the committee to sign his name to any protest against the new charter.

The vote in the Board of Estimate are against the charter, the other three belonging to Mayor Gaynor and the one vote of Borough President Gresser, of Queens.

TROOPS ORDERED TO SMASH STRIKE

South Carolina Governor Directs Soldiers to Man as Well as Guard Street Cars.

SPARTANBURG, S. C., Sept. 24.—Saying he is going to stop the "rioting" which has marked the strike of the street car conductors and motormen, Governor Cole Bleasie has ordered three companies of State troops to proceed here tonight and aid tomorrow in the operation of the trolley cars.

The strike has been in progress here for several days and the car lines are well tied up.

Mayor Lee has asked for a conference with Adjutant General Moore to discuss the advisability of placing troops in charge of the operation of the system until the strike is settled.

The Mayor admits that the Spartanburg police are unwilling to furnish protection to the trolley company so that it can operate its scab cars.

The strikers were greatly angered tonight when they learned that troops had been ordered here, and it is predicted that there will be trouble if the soldiers attempt to operate the cars.

Governor Bleasie thinks the troops should be used to operate the cars and break the strike. Every day since the strike was called there has been more or less disorder.

Public sentiment is still with the strikers.

CHARTER COSTLY PRODUCE

Cost of Printing, etc., Has Already Amounted to \$100,000.

Including the cost of printing several editions, the expense of stenographers, typesetters and incidental costs, the much discussed charter of New York City, which is a model, according to its makers, has involved an expense of \$100,000.

What is characterized by several reform societies as the biggest collection of "jokers" ever drafted, is still far from being a law. Its framers, however, state that with several of the objectionable features eliminated it will receive sufficient votes to pass.

According to the present plan a vote will be taken on Wednesday, but it is agreed by all that the roll will be closed.

ELIOT DEFENDS OWN 'PROGNOSTICATIONS'

"Religion of Future" Bound by No Dogma or Creed, Declared Harvard Savant, Replying to Critics.

BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 24.—In defense of "The Religion of the Future," recently attacked by Professor Benjamin Wiener Bacon, of the chair of New Testament Criticism and Exegesis at Yale, who declares that this theory does not "get to the bottom of the thing," President Emeritus Charles W. Eliot, of Harvard, points out that his attempt has not been to lay down new religious dogmas for future generations, but merely to make a forecast of probable future developments of beliefs.

Professor Bacon has criticized "The Religion of the Future" from an entirely new angle. He maintains that the fault of Eliot's prognostication lies in the attempt to identify modern scientific and philosophical doctrines with the older dogmas of the religion of mystery.

President Emeritus Eliot has not advocated a creed or a gospel, he has merely made a prognostication, he says.

"The religion of the future will not be bound by dogma or creed," says Dr. Eliot. "Its workings will be simple, but its field of action limitless. There are already extensive signs of co-operation among the various phases of religious belief, democracy, individualism, idealism, a tendency to welcome the new and preventive medicine."

"The religion of the future will approach the whole subject of an evil from another side than that promised by churches," says the author of the "Religion of the Future."
