WAR CLOUDS GATHER FAST ON EUROPE'S POLITICAL HORIZON

Delcasse Pledged France to Agreement With Spain Giving Her Tangier With England's Consent, None but Ministers Knowing of Dangerous and Provocative Deal.

The special correspondent in Paris of the Evening Post gives the following account of international political relations in Europe, which have long been strained.

PARIS, Nov. 11.—When the Crown Prince of the German Empire openly applauds these words of a political leader in full Imperial Parliament—That which can secure peace with France is not treaty-making; it is the German sword—then every thinking Frenchman knows that he has to stir up his lions for the battle.

A recent historian has found material for copious volumes on the secret diplomacy of France under the Regent and Louis XV, the worst period of the Old Regime.

This secret agreement, which no government knows, for government in France means the Prime Minister for the time being—was made known yesterday in the Matin newspaper, which is supposed to have received it from the Spanish Ambassador.
