CONGRESSMEN JOIN REYISTA MOVEMENT

Their Action Shows Strength of Mexican Revolutionary Cause.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 29.—The Reyista movement has gained such headway in Mexico that several Congressmen have openly left their seats to join the cause.

The chairman, Mr. Levi, told the accusing Congressman that he must send a written motion to the secretary, asking the discussion of the matter.

Polta did as directed and after the document was read, he spoke in behalf of the measure. He dealt at length with the danger of American intervention and contended that this menace was ever present and must be avoided, stating that the only way to avoid the situation, one that was realized even by ex-President Diaz himself, who had expressed his fears in a recent statement in Europe.

During the speech, Polta declared that "it is true that the United States claims to have a desire of hugging her bosom her sister republic, Mexico, but only so that she can choke the said sister by means of that hug."

Polta ended his speech by asking the Chamber to call the absent Reyista Deputies, so that their behavior might be examined, and if found guilty that they be expelled from the body.

As showing the growing strength of the Reyista movement, the people of Camas Grandes, State of Chihuahua, have elected Enrique Portillo as their Jefe Politico, although he is a prisoner in jail, accused of giving assistance to the revolutionists.

Several rebels were killed in a fight with federal troops in the territory of Tepic, near La Labor, and their leader, Abel de la Mora, captured and shot, according to official dispatches. The number of dead is not given.

The execution of the leader after his capture further confirms the statement that the central government has given orders to execute leaders of the rebellion. No denial has ever been made here of this statement, however.

Compulsory military service is to be established by President Madero at once and to this end a new plan is being worked out by the Chamber of Deputies for the reform of the old system of recruiting soldiers.

The proposition approved by the Cabinet provides for two years of active service and three in the reserves. Lots will be cast among the young men of 18 to 20 years of recruits.

Each State will be asked to recruit one soldier for every thousand inhabitants so that out of the 16,000,000 inhabitants it is estimated that the republic will be able to count 16,000 soldiers. In addition, each State will have bodies of militia ready to enter active service at any time. Soldiers will be admitted into the army up to 40 years of age.

MONTEREY, Mexico, Nov. 29.—Word has reached this city that a band of Reyistas is operating near Lampazos in this State. Telegraph lines were cut between this city and Lampazos and Guadalupe, ten miles from Lampazos, and the Reyistas made visits to the ranches of San Patricia El Sauz and Alamo, property of Pat Milmo, a banker of this city.

WANKING LOST TO IMPERIAL FORCES AFTER BATTLE

Rebels Flanking City's Defenders, Cut Way to Victory.

NANKING, Nov. 29.—The rebel troops are now in possession of practically the entire city of Nanking. The Imperial forces, under Lieutenant General Fong Kwo Chang, have lost heavily during the last two days, and are in imminent danger of annihilation unless they are speedily reinforced.

The rebel forces succeeded in entering the city through three different gates, late yesterday. The Imperial troops, which had withstood a withering fire from the revolutionists, concentrated at the east gate for a last desperate stand and succeeded in driving the rebel forces back into the city.

A fierce encounter ensued in the center of the city and many were slain on both sides. The rebels lost heavily and the city probably would have been retaken had not a wing of the revolutionary army, entering through the east gate, flanked General Fong's forces. The Imperialists were forced to turn and flee out of the east gate after cutting their way through the flanking troops.

The loss to the Imperial troops is estimated at about 1,600. General Fong is said to have made a stand just out of the eastern part of the city.

SHANGHAI, Nov. 29.—Rumors of the capture of Wu Chang and Han-Yang by the imperialist forces, with attempting wholesale slaughter of rebel troops are rife here today, but thus far lack confirmation.

Because of the advent into the city of a turbulent Chinese element and freedom exchanges, the police, the Governor of Hongkong, Sir Edward Lugard, has proclaimed martial law here. The Chinese element is wild with excitement over the recent events in the Chinese revolution.

PEKING, Nov. 29.—Doubts are now cast on the circumstantial official report of the surrender of Wu Chang and Han-Yang yesterday. The exact situation cannot be learned and it seems that the government itself has no definite information.

Colonel Willoughby, a British officer, who has just arrived here from Hankow, is not in favor of the report that the soldiers on both sides. He praises their heroic courage, energy and contempt of death, but confines the statements as to the superior discipline of the Imperial army. He says the best troops in Europe are no better fighters than these men.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—The State Department today requested the War Department to hold ready at Manila a force of 500 Chinese soldiers for dispatch to China on short notice.

HONGKONG, Nov. 29.—Anarchy seems to be the condition prevailing in the provinces of Kwang-tung, Kwanki and Yun-sai. The Central Government's control is fast disappearing. None of these revolted provinces has been able to find a strong man to direct affairs, which are in a most chaotic condition.

ST. LOUIS POLICE FEED HOMELESS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 29.—To carry into effect his plan of preventing crime, Chief of Police William Young declared today that the Police Department will feed the 300 or more homeless men who seek shelter in the quarters of 184 men in the basement of the Four Courts Building last night and the district police stations accommodated 195 others.

RUSSELL SPEAKS IN PHILLIPS' HONOR

Socialist Tells of Great Abolitionist's Fight for Human Emancipation.

Several hundred men and women gathered at the Plymouth Church, from the pulpit of which Henry Ward Beecher, the famous abolitionist, preached the abolition of slavery fifty years ago, to commemorate the centenary of the birth of Wendell Phillips, the famous leader of the abolition movement.

Charles Edward Russell, who was one of the speakers, talked on Phillips' life and work for the abolition movement, and called him the "greatest American in history."

"When Phillips had an audience he was speaking on anti-slavery, and when he had not, he wrote on the subject, and his whole life was devoted to the cause of human liberty," said Russell.

Phillips did not pursue in the slightest degree his own interests or advancement and gave himself, and all that he had, to the rescue of the victims of the most monstrous crime in history.

Corporation Would Disestablish Identity With the Big Interests.

The letter read in part as follows: "A considerable amount of stock of the corporation appears to be held by you directly or indirectly."

"If you have no objection, we should like to have you give us a statement divided into classes, or number of actual owners of stock preferred or common."

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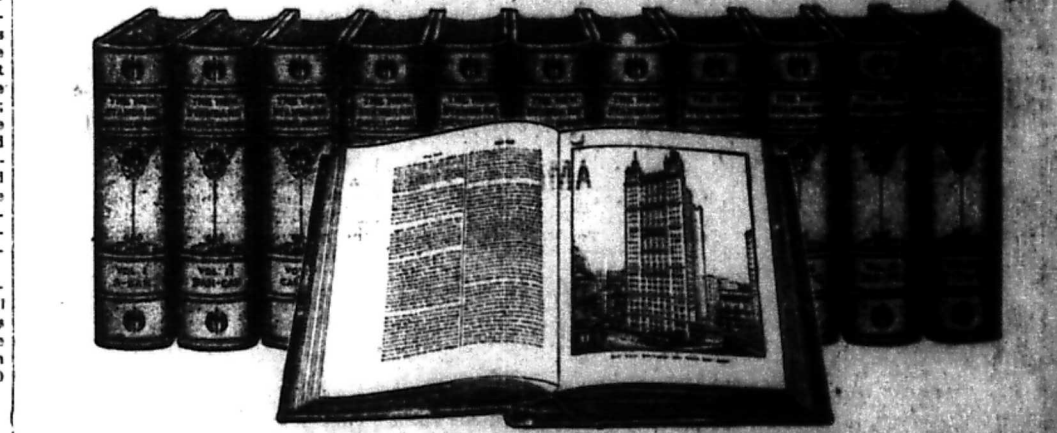
NEW MESSAGES COMING.
