SUBWAY TO SHOW BREAKDOWN SIGNS

P. S. C. Issues Order to Take Effect Within Five Days.

In order to prevent delay, danger, and inconvenience from overcrowding on subway platforms, the Public Service Commission passed a resolution yesterday requiring the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to display bulletins announcing blockades on its lines, immediately after trains had been stalled. The order reads: "That the Interborough Rapid Transit Company shall display conspicuously a proper notice to the public at or near the ticket office of every station directly affected, whenever the train service is stalled or blocked on any of the tracks of its subway lines; that between the hours of 6 o'clock a.m. and 12 o'clock midnight said notice shall be displayed within ten minutes and between the hours of 12 o'clock midnight and 6 o'clock a.m. within twenty minutes, after the time when said train service is so stalled or blocked."

ANOTHER SUBWAY DELAY

Thousands of passengers were delayed fifteen minutes in getting downtown yesterday when trouble in the "control wiring" caused an express train from Dyckman street to stop just after leaving 72d street station. The accumulated delay of following downtown expresses amounted to as much as twenty-five minutes.
