"Not Yet!" Frantic Cry Against Seating Workers Party Delegates in N. Y. Labor Party Conference

Against the demand of the Workers Party for admission to the Second Conference of the American Labor Party, New York, those in control, evidently feeling themselves on the defensive, raised the hypocritical cry of, "Not yet!"

Under these circumstances it was announced that at almost the same time, the Workers Party of America was also being organized in the city of New York.

The Farmer-Labor Party delegation was small and inconsequential. It was made up of a few of the Socialist Party delegates who are anxious and sincere in their desire to build up a real united front of the independent political forces of the workers, not merely a "Socialist front."

Those delegates from trade unions who were not affiliated with the Socialist Party, and whose sympathies were not with the Workers Party, were so few and inarticulate that they played practically no part except, as in the case of Delegate Antonio Jose of the Carpenters, to profess allegiance to "90 per cent Americanism" and antipathy to anything Russian.

Exposure Put Spy Agencies on Toboggan

CHICAGO—The testimony of Albert Ballin, given in his deposition in the Michigan criminal syndicalist trial, will have a triple effect which is to begin in St. Joseph, March 12, cannot be overestimated. There can be no doubt, however, what beneficial effects this testimony will have on the labor movement.

For if there has been one arch labor buster in America, that man is William J. Burns. And if there is one thing that Ballin's testimony has accomplished it is the raising of those who have been in the habit of employing detective agencies to destroy the movement of Burns' reputation and the reputation and prestige of the agencies through which Burns has for so long been perpetrating outrages on the American labor movement. Along with the Burns Agency, which has the reputation of all the notorious "labor-dropping" detective agencies.

Ballin's charges that the Burns Detective Agency and Burns himself have framed up "red plots" for the purpose of influencing the American labor movement are not only a revelation, but a corrective investigation that the Burns Agency and other agencies are responsible for practically all violence charged to labor during the years that detective agencies have been spread in practically every state newspaper in the country. In spite of the expected denials by Burns and his associates, these charges are more than sufficient to be discarded as fabrications.

The labor movement has long known that "detective agencies" among its worst enemies. The world now knows that the agencies before that the private detective business consists of arranging "man-ups" for the employers and "trading money" from the employees and "putting away" active spirits in the labor movement.

It cannot be proved that manufacturers, associations and the like have knowingly incited detective agencies to destroy the labor movement. They have always been suspected of such activities, but there has been no simple enough to continue to employ detective agencies to fight their labor struggles will bear an equal responsibility with Burns and Co. for future crimes.

It is safe to say that the Ballin exposure has caused a panic among the owners of detective agencies. For even if they escape the just punishment which their crimes demand they are sure to meet with similar fates. The Burns Agency and the other agencies which have been exposed are now in a state of confusion and are unable to carry on their business.

In Ballin's testimony it was brought out that the activities of these private detectives were directed not only against the radicals and their organizations, but also against every kind of labor law. The Burns and other agencies in this respect have been in the forefront of the attacks on labor. They have been sending their operatives into union meetings and into contact with union workers. No trade unionist but welcomes this exposure as a means of ending trade unionism in one of its worst enemies.

Trade Union Delegates Fie-Protest Against Exclusion of Workers Party Delegates

Thirty-five delegates are officially on record in the minutes of the Second Conference of the American Labor Party, New York, as objecting to the exclusion of the Workers Party Delegates.

The protest was presented from the floor of the conference by Delegate Ouellet, of the Socialist Party, interrupted with a demand that the protest go into the minutes, what was Delegate Kuecher's intention. The protest declared:

"We, the undersigned, trade union delegates to the American Labor Party Conference held in New York City, Feb. 24-25, protest against the exclusion of the Workers Party Delegates as an attempt to divide the forces of the workers on the political field, and as an act to sabotage the formation of a re-organized Labor Party of all organizations that believe in independent political action of the workers."

Delegate Ouellet had previously carried out the clever coup against delegates wishing to voice their disapproval against the actions of the Socialist Party in the Cleveland Conference for Progressive Political Action in December.

When he offered the resolution on this subject, while reporting for the minutes, he presented a motion that immediately made to table it, discussion was shut off, and the resolution rejected. But immediately Delegate Ouellet under cover of replying to a statement that had been given by the delegates on behalf of the excluded Workers Party delegates, launched into a tirade against the Workers Party, winding up with something incoherent about the "Socialist Party."

The resolution that was tabled read as follows:

"We condemn most emphatically the conduct of the Socialist Party in the Cleveland Conference for Progressive Political Action in December, in excluding the Workers Party delegates, and in attempting to divide the forces of the workers on the political field, and as an act to sabotage the formation of a re-organized Labor Party of all organizations that believe in independent political action of the workers."

The statement of the excluded Workers Party delegates was as follows:

"The decision of the convention of the American Labor Party of New York City, Feb. 24-25, excluding the delegates of the Workers Party of New York City, was dictated by a group of delegates who are seeking to use the new movement of the workers and their organizations as a means of dividing the forces of the workers on the political field, and as an act to sabotage the formation of a re-organized Labor Party of all organizations that believe in independent political action of the workers."

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Murders, Assaults, Rapes, Record of U. S. Troops on the Rhine

IRELAND—Twenty-five murders, assaults and rapes are officially attributed to the now disbanded American troops of occupation in the Rhineland out of a total of 200 such crimes.

The list was compiled from official reports by the German department of the interior and submitted to the British government as an inquiry by a member of the body.

The 15 murders, 9 rapes and the assault by road credited to the American forces constitute one-twelfth of the total, which is out of proportion to the small number of American troops relative to the force of the allies stationed in the Rhine valley.
