





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First Stop Intervention!

THE PROPOSAL jointly made by France and England for mediation in Spain for the purpose of carrying out a plebiscite ignores the rights of the Spanish people in the same way as the so-called "non-intervention pact' 'ignored those rights. Contrary to international law, this latest proposal again places both the regular democratic government of Spain and the Fascist Franco and his Moorish hordes on an equal plane.

Nevertheless the Soviet Union, always striving for peace, has adhered to the proposal, declaring it is ready to discuss with the other countries the form of mediation. The Soviet government points out that the actual decision as to whether or not a plebiscite shall be carried out must remain in the hands of the Spanish government.

No foreign pressure on the Spanish govsernment to force it to go through with a plebiscite against its will can be tolerated. This government was elected under conditions when the Spanish people were able freely to express their choice.

But if the Spanish people are to be given the possibility of freely expressing their will at this time—ALL INTERVENTION AGAINST THE SPANISH GOVERNMENT MUST BE HALTED IMMEDIATELY!

Germany and Italy should immediately withdraw their troops who are fighting as units on the side of the Fascists! Wholesale shipments of arms and munitions to France must be halted.

While the mediation proposal made by France and England does not provide for this essential-the Soviet Government will meet with the other powers to discuss the proposal. The Soviet Government, in accordance with its policy, supports any initiative which contributes to the cause of peace in any way.

Pan - American Meet Fails to Forge Effective Peace Weapon

THE Pan-American Peace Conference has not succeeded in forging effective weapons for peace. True, the agreement for mutual consultation of all countries involved in case of war in the Western Hemisphere is a step in the right direction—but the failure to agree upon the policy of mutual assistance against a war-making aggressor robs the consultative pact of its effectiveness as a deterrant of war.

Also—there is no formal recognition of the necessity of collaboration with the peace forces of the rest of the world, particularly with the collective security program of the Soviet Union.

Roosevelt declared that the struggle against war is today unthinkable without a struggle for the defense of democracy. We hail Roosevelt's implied condemnation of the Fascist doctrine of self-sufficiency in his statement that the nations which have carried furthest this doctrine have achieved only "falling standards for their people" and "ever-increasing loss of the democratic ideals in a mad race to pile armament on armament."

Unfortunately the action of the United States in agreeing to a consultative pact without the policy of mutual assistance against an aggressor, and the failure to establish machinery for collaboration with other peace forces throughout the world do not translate these utterances into action.

We must turn to Hull's calling for the building of a people's peace movement—a call with which we fully agree. Murder Points a Lesson

THE MURDER of a striking picket of the Sun Shipbuilding Yards in Chester, Pa., carries with it a sharp and unanswerable lesson in practical politics.

The murder was perpetrated during a combined attack by police and fire-fighting apparatus against a picket line, in which fire engines rode into the striking workers and streams of water were turned against them at the same time that police swung their clubs over the heads of the strikers.

This massacre of the workers was ordered by John G. Pew, head of the Sun Shipbuilding Yards and a member of the reactionary "American" Liberty League.

Asylum for Assassins

THE GROUP of misguided intellectuals who have fallen into I the trap of demanding the right of asylum for Trotzky, may not realize that they are endangering the fight for the right of asylum, and playing into the hands of the enemies of freedom and democracy. Sentiment can have no place in dealing with the counter-revolutionary leader of all the anti-Soviet forces, who has not hesitated to plot murder and assassination against Soviet leaders, with the help of the Fascist secret police of Hitler, the

The right of political asylum cannot include the defense of assassins. Who uses the weapon of assassination as a politi instrument? The Fascists have time and again demonstrated that they do not hesitate to resort to murder of political opponents when it suits their purpose. Will any honest worker or intellectual shed any tears over the fate of Fascist murderers who are caught red-handed? And if the Trotskyists, who still proclaim loyalty to the revolutionary principles which they have shamefully betrayed, resort to the same method aimed at the existence of the land of Socialism, then they can be treated no different.

The right of asylum for political refugees from the land of Hitler and Mussolini, is a sacred right that must be defended, and the fight for that right becomes a weapon in the struggle against Fascism. But to defend that right for one who has become the rallying-point for all the anti-Soviet elements throughout the world, plays into the hands of the Fascists and thereby objectively strengthens the anti-Soviet front of those who aim to overthrow the Soviet regime and Socialism, and restore capitalism. Even those who hate Communism the most, the Hearsts and their kind, suddenly become admirers of Trotsky and extol his virtues, oecause they recognize in him a most valuable tool in their cam-

The trial of the 16 terrorists in Moscow, who openly conressed the Trotskyist murder plot against the Soviet leaders because they were caught with the goods, leaves no doubt as to frotsky's guilt. The conduct of the trial, in the presence of the foreign press, was praised by such world-famous lawyers as the British jurist Pritt, thus exploding the ridiculous contention of the fascist press that there was something suspicious about the confessions.

It is regrettable that Socialist leaders like Norman Thomas, can lend themselves and their names to a campaign of slander against the Soviet Union under the guise of "defending" Trotsky. per, zinc, and tin. You have what is termed "metal fume fever," caused by breathing in the zinc fumes at your

Whooping Cough, Diphtheria, and Small Pox Can and Should Be Prevented in Every Child

Alameda, Calif. DEAR DOCTOR: Is it wise to have a small baby injected to prevent typhoid fever? What other disease can be prevented

ANSWER-In the large cities, there is very little danger of typhoid fever, as the same water systems supply the wealthy and so they are very careful to see that no typhoid germs get into the water. For this reason, it is better not to subject a small baby to such injections. However, if it is planned to go some place where you are not certain of the water supply, by all means have the child injected.

Very important is that you have the child injected against whooping cough. This dangerous disease causes more deaths in babies under two years of age than diphtheria, measles, and scarlet fever combined, and is much more wide-spread among workers' children because of unhealthy-living conditions. These injections should be given as early as six months of age, if possible.

Four months later, the child should be injected against diphtheria, and four months after this he should be vaccinated.



Phleger found the present situation on the waterfront very difficult to argue from the employers' standpoint. Apparently, he found it impossible; because in his broadcast over Station KPO, Wednesday night, December 9th, he discarded the situation completely and invented one of his own.

The situation as he presented it made the maritime workers look like pretty unreasonable fellows. Of course, no such situation existed; nevertheless, it made the maritime workers look like unreasonable fellows, and that was all Attorney Phleger was paid to do.

According to Phleger, the longshoremen have been receiving very good wages since the 1934 strike. That much is true. They naven't been receiving a penny more than they deserve, but nevertheless, it is only fair to agree that their wages have been good during this period.

The rest of Phleger's argument is based on sheer imagination. He made it all up himself out of his own head.

He declared that now the longshoremen want still HIGHER wages and that when the employers refused to grant these still HIGHER wages, the longshoremen walked out on strike,

'He further said, that the employers begged them to come back to work on the proposition that the question of HIGHER wages should be submitted to arbitration; and that the longshoremen refused to arbitrate.

To the uninformed public ear, this might sound like a very serious indictment of the longshoremen. That is exactly why Phleger invented it.

The fact of the matter is, however, the longshoremen are NOT striking for higher wages. They are not striking for anything new. All that the longshoremen are striking for is continuation of the union hiring hall system which has been in effect since the 1934 strike; and continuation of the six-hour day, which they have also enjoyed for almost two years and which was granted to them by previous arbitration.

Apparently the employers believe that if any issue is submitted to arbitration a sufficient number of times, sooner or later, by the law of averages, it will be decided in their favor. Their motto seems to be: If at first you don't get what you want through arbitration—arbitrate, arbitrate again.

What actually happened was, the employers demanded that the longshoremen relinquish control of the hiring hall and increase hours from six to eight. When the longshoremen refused to submit these issues, which have already been arbitrated, to and Sunday Worker, with the still further arbitration, the employers summarily locked them out, shut down operations, and said that they would remain shut

> Of course, the other maritime unions have issues too, and all of the unions are standing firmly together. One will not return to work until justice has been established for all. The other unions want to retain their hiring halls the same as the long-

The London Daily Worker, organ of the British Communist Party, commented on King Edward's abdication, as follows: "The abdication of King Edward VIII expresses the success of Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin's maneuver to replace an unsuitable royal figurehead by a more pliant tool. . . .

"The real aim of the reactionary forces associated with Baldwin is to strengthen the monarchy as an instrument of class rule and reaction against democracy and the working class. . .

Fascist Italy Plans New Robber War In Africa, Says Professor

SAN FRANCISCO-Fascist Italy is preparing for new robber wars, Professor Howard H. Martin, of the University of Washington geographic department, told the Commonwealth Club here last week.

"French armed forces in North Africa are busily preparing to meet Italy's next step-moving into Algeria and Tunisia," he said. "All Europe believes Italys grabbing of Ethiopia is only her first move in Africa. She needs wheat, mineral resources and colonizing space, and Ethiopia can supply only a small part of these.

"Mussolini thinks the Mediterranean is essentially Italian property, anyway."

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
