

Workers in these organizations should understand that Kramer has no "labor record"—only very vicious anti-labor record.

If the above story isn't true, which we sincerely hope, let's hear from some members of these unions, to set us straight. If it is true, we cannot urge these unions strongly enough to reconsider this serious mistake.

Kramer is co-author of the Russell-Kramer Sedition Bill introduced in the last Congress, which, if adopted, would put into effect an antilabor statute on a national scale similar to the infamous Criminal Syndicalism Act of California. This bill would be a sledge-hammer in the hands of the worst openshoppers in the United States, with which to smash the organized labor movement.

WEBB DELAYS

Sonoma Grand Jury Lets Terrorists Go Scot Free

SAN FRANCISCO—A year ago vigilantes terrorizing workers and small farmers in Sonoma county, tarred-and-feathered two men in the streets of Santa

Several weeks ago Attorney General U. S. Webb announced that, after a wave of protest demanding action against the vigilantes over a year's time, he would take steps against the known leaders of the terrorists in Sonoma county.

Last week the Sonoma County Grand Jury refused to return indictments against the vigilantes, even though these terrorists are known throughout the country and their crimes can be absolutely pinned to them.

Attorney General Webb then admitted that he "has not decided" whether he will prosecute the leaders of the tar-and-feather outrage, although he has the power to prosecute the terrorists in Santa Rosa Superior Court.

Webb said the former "G-Man" who had been investigating has been called off the case. but that he would be put back on the inquiry if he, Webb, decides to prosecute.

Trade unions, progressive groups, and people's organizations generally are urged to send protests to Webb in San Francisco, demanding that he prosecute the vigilantes immediately and that steps be taken to crush once and for always, the vigilantes who ride terror through the agricultural regions of Cal-

HARD STRUGGLES FINALLY MEET WITH VICTORY FOR **ALASKA CANNERY WORKERS**

Embarcadero Restaurants Give Generous Response In Food; Workers Secure \$250,000 In Wage Increases

By an Alaska Canner

(This is the continued story of the organization of the Alaska Cannery Workers Union, which won agreements for the workers last spring for the first time in history. This installment picks up with the workers on the picket line to win their victory.)

The relief kitchen ran out of coffee, and credentials were drawn up and presented to two of us to go out and get some coffee. We were given no money. The financial status of the union was dangerously low, so from that moment on, we were officially known as strike relief committee.

No Objections

We got the coffee in one of Leighton's and one of "The Boys' Cafeteria. We were not asked to get any canned milk, sugar or snails. We did not think there would be any objection if we did. We did, and as we suspected, there was no objection.

From then on we were on the go for 22 consecutive hours. We stormed the gates of some of the leading bakeries with poor results. We had no locomotion, except, of course, foot power. Our efforts were meeting with very unsatisfactory results, until I finally hit on an idea. Restaurants inclined to be symasked to take any amount of men they chose to feed directly

WHEREAS: Among other provisions of the Copeland Bland Act is one which calls for suspension or revocation of certificates for "misbehavior, neg-ligence or unskillfulness," descriptions which officers or shipping companies could easily, if so inclined, apply to seamen who are outspoken for decent conditions or enforcement of existing agreements with the unions, and


