The report of the Anglo-American Commission on Palestine has been condemned outright by every section of public opinion in the Arab world; only a few days after its publication all Palestine was shaken by a complete Arab General strike, organised by the Arab Higher Committee.

We are now reaching towards the end of that ten years, and I think it is correct to say, and you will no doubt ascertain this more fully when you visit Palestine, that there is not an adequate system even of local government based on an adequate democratic franchise recently elected and effectively in operation in many parts of Palestine.
